

Duncan Slates Appearances

Speaker Robert B. Duncan, Jackson county Democratic candidate for Fourth district congressman, left Monday for a series of appearances in Douglas, Lane, Coos and Curry counties, following a conference with campaign workers here last week end.

He will return to Jackson county as guest speaker at the Southern Oregon college general assembly at 10 a.m. Wednesday, May 2, under the sponsorship of the Young Democratic club of Southern Oregon college. All Democratic county candidates are invited to attend the meeting.

Following the SOC appearance, Duncan will leave for Myrtle Creek where he will be the sponsor of a Lions club meeting at noon and a high school assembly at 1 p.m.

The congressional candidate will be back in Jackson county, Thursday, May 3. A reception and coffee hour will be held at the Duncan headquarters, 311 East Eighth st., from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. He will briefly address the gathering. All interested in the Duncan campaign are invited to attend and meet the candidate, according to James A. Redden, campaign chairman.

Appearances at several Jackson county schools, centers and super-markets are on the day's schedule. At 5 p.m. Duncan will leave by plane for Washington, D.C., to attend a meeting of the President's advisory committee on intergovernmental relations to which President Kennedy appointed him earlier this year. He will spend Thursday and Friday in Washington, returning to Jackson county on Saturday, Redden said.

Dr. Mulling Discusses Stuttering at Meeting

Ashland — Facts and fallacies concerning stuttering were discussed in a talk to the Kerby Parent Teacher's association by Dr. Leon Mulling, director of the Southern Oregon college speech and hearing center recently.

Public Power's Importance Cited

"By 1965, Oregon will be faced with a critical power problem unless dramatic and far-sighted measures are adopted promptly," State Sen. Robert W. Straub told the Central Point Grange in Jackson county last week end.

Straub is a candidate for the Democratic nomination to Congress. He pointed out that he was the sponsor of a bill in the last session of the legislature to create a State Power commission which would have helped insure Oregon's holding on to its share of low-cost Bonneville power.

"I was very disappointed that there was not more support from my fellow legislators for this vital, sound, beneficial state power agency. By 1965 the preference clause in the Bonneville law will begin penalizing Oregon at the benefit of Washington. Eighty-five per cent of the power sold in Washington is sold through public power agencies and will have the protection of the preference clause. In Oregon only 15 per cent of Bonneville's power is distributed through public agencies," Straub said.

"Bold and far-sighted action is needed in this field or Oregon's future economic growth will be severely curbed. A state power agency, designed to qualify under the preference clause, would have an extremely beneficial effect," Straub pointed out. Listed as other important measures are: speedy enactment of federal legislation insuring regional preference for Bonneville power to prevent prime power from being sent to California; federal construction of an adequate power inter-tie between Oregon and California; construction of the Hanford Nuclear reactor; and speedy conclusion of the Canadian Treaty to permit additional storage dams to be built on the California system," Straub said.

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Confirmation Rite Set at Shady Cove

Shady Cove — The Rt. Rev. Richard A. Kirchhoff, D.D., formerly bishop of the Episcopal diocese of Indianapolis, will confer the apostolic rite of confirmation on a class of children and adults in St. Martin's Episcopal church, Shady Cove, on Wednesday, May 2, at 8 p.m.

Bishop Kirchhoff retired in 1959 and makes his home in Sonoma, Calif. Although retired, he has consented to assist Bishop Carman of Oregon in confirmation at several churches in the diocese.

To assist parents who have children who are beginning to show signs of stuttering, Mulling directed them not to call direct attention to the speech problem but rather to test their own parental procedures to determine whether their standards are too high and to experiment with ways in which to make the child feel self-confident and relaxed.

He reminded them that many pediatricians and psychologists agree that the best discipline is that which is fair, understandable to the child, consistent, quiet, and administered with love.

The program ended with a recording of a high school student who discussed how speech therapy had aided his stuttering problem.

Red Cross Class on Baby Care Slated

The Jackson County chapter of the American Red Cross will conduct classes in mother and baby care at Rogue Valley hospital starting May 7, and a second class beginning May 8.

The first class will be conducted on Mondays and Wednesdays for three weeks, and the second on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Classes will start at 7:30 p.m.

The classes have the support of the Jackson County Medical association, and will cover prenatal as well as postnatal care. Expectant mothers, fathers, grandmothers and mature baby-sitters are encouraged to register for the classes which are being given without charge by Red Cross-trained, registered nurses.

The course consists of 12 hours of instruction, and will include a tour of the maternity department at the hospital.

Additional information may be obtained from the Red Cross office, SP Ring 2-4405. Interested persons are urged to call as soon as possible to register either for the Monday and Wednesday class or the Tuesday and Thursday class.

Crater Teacher Gets Fellowship

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Dellenback at State Meeting

John Dellenback, Medford attorney and state representative from Jackson county, was in Salem Monday and today to attend a meeting of the interim education committee of the state legislature.

Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, reported on the Oregon Project, which is being financed by \$3 1/2 million granted by the Ford Foundation to the state to improve teacher education and education in the classroom. Oregon is the first state to be selected for this experimental project, and Dr. Minear advised the committee on the present status of the project and his recommendation as to the best ways to utilize the grant monies.

The committee also met to formulate legislation to present to the 1963 session of the state legislature. The legislation to be proposed will be based on an evaluation of the studies made by the committee since the last session. During recent months, committee members have visited the offices of county superintendents throughout the state to determine if the duties performed by the intermediate unit of the school system should be changed.

Dellenback will attend a teachers' meeting at Jackson school, which will be open to interested parents, at 8:30 o'clock tonight, immediately following the Jackson school PTA meeting. Dellenback will report on the Oregon Project, and will discuss Dr. Minear's recommendations.
