The Medical Roundup

Woman With Fallen Bladder
Scores of letters come from women who ask if they should have an operation for the repair of a bad pelvic tear which has caused by the bladder and return to fall. Many of these unhappy women have frequency of urination, sometimes because the stagnating urine has become infected with germs. Some women are embarrassed by the tendency for a little urine to come away when they cough or sneeze or walk up or down stairs. Sometimes, an infected bladder causes the woman to wake several times during the night. The weakness in her "pelvic floor" makes it difficult for her to stay on her feet all day at work.

Last week, a young-looking woman of 70 came to ask me about this problem. Her main question was: Should she, at her age, accept the risk of an operation, or should she yield to the strong urging of her grown children, and go on suffering for the rest of her days? I sent her first to an able gynecologic surgeon for his opinion. He thought that she was still a good surgical risk; her blood pressure was low, her heart was strong, her lungs were good, and she had never been seriously ill in her life.

She was willing to accept the slight risk of getting a heart attack or stroke or pneumonia after the operation, and so both the gynecologist and I were in favor of her going ahead and having the work done. A good heart examined her and felt that, barring accident, she should do all right. The woman said, very wisely, that her life was now of very little use to her the way she was, so why not take the risk? I told her, and not her children, should make the decision. She was doing the suffering. She now plans to have the operation, and I think she is wise. She may live another 10 years or more.

Many of these women who are thinking of being operated on write and ask: "Will I get a good result? Will I stay well?" Naturally, I cannot answer such questions. Much will depend on how much muscle the surgeon can find on each side to bring together, and to sew together. Much will depend on how well her wound heals, and probably much will depend on how well the arteries in her heart and brain stand up to the strain.

Throughout the country, I have many very grateful old ladies who are now very glad that once I stood up for them, and backed them in their desire to get relieved of a condition that made them miserable day and night.
