McNamara To Visit South Viet Nam

Washington—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara has announced that he will make an inspection visit to embattled South Viet Nam on his way back to NATO meetings this week in Athens, Greece.

The defense secretary has gone to Honolulu four times to confer with leaders of the U.S. effort to help out Communist guerrillas from South Viet Nam, but this will be his first appearance at the actual scene of the fighting. While in the area, he also will visit Thailand.

McNamara left Monday for London. He will proceed from there to Athens for a meeting of NATO defense ministers Thursday.

He will leave Athens next Monday for Bangkok, Thailand, and reach Saigon, the capital of South Viet Nam, May 9. He will leave there for the United States May 11.

In the Day's News

At Los Angeles, the Society of Television and Motion Picture Engineers opens its annual convention. The opening session was on optics, and a large spotlight was unveiled. It is described as a pencil-thin beam of light with the brilliance, the power, and the intensity of the sun itself. It was announced that the new spotlight can signal a vacuum tube away from the earth which is to say: A signal can be sent today to the star selected and it will be received ten years from now.

THE speed of light, in a vacuum outer space beyond the earth's atmosphere is assumed to be a vacuum) is 186,284 miles per second. There are 60 seconds in a minute. There are 60 minutes in an hour. There are 24 hours in a day. There are 365 days in a year—except for leap year, which adds another day and 24 more hours.

With that to start on, you can figure out for yourself how far away from the earth the selected star will be. Assuming that the signal carries a message, I'm afraid the news it carries will be rather old when it is received. Besides, the distance at which the news originates will be so great that one fears the people (if any) on the selected star will feel that the Earth is so far away that news originating there isn't of much interest to them.

FROM astronomy, let's move on to politics.

In a speech to 300 business and industrial leaders at De Pauw University in Greencastle, Indiana, the other day, George Romney, former President of American Motors Corporation and now a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of Michigan, told his hearers:

"The nation's anti-trust and labor laws need to be updated in order to deal intelligently with the hard reality of excess economic power. Unless this matter of concentrated power of unions and industry is resolved, this country's economic problems may become impossible to solve."

HE WENT on to say:

"One of the most regrettable aspects of American life is the present situation where union and employer power can be concentrated to the point where a basic industry can be shut down by either group's position."

"I think that is an unheard of concentration of private economic power. I think any time we put a few men in labor or a few men in industry to reach the point where they can cripple the economy and adversely affect the public interest we have created a condition COMPLETELY CONTRARY to the spirit of America."

"What is needed is not MORE law, but MODERN law. Anti-trust as well as labor laws are outdated. The collision of excess power of labor and industry presents the necessity of government intervention to protect consumers. The end result of the road we are traveling now will be some form of CAPITALISM."

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PP&L Expected To Complete 55-Mile Line During June

Pacific Power and Light company construction crews are expected to complete in June the last 15 miles of a 55-mile-long transmission line that will be the final link of the large-capacity 230,000-volt network of the company's Copco division power system.

Already finished for the \$2,000,000 project, which began last summer, are the terminal installations made at the Lone Pine substation near Medford and at the Canyonville and Dixonville substations at the northern end of the new circuit, according to Frank Bash, the company's Copco division manager.

Work remaining to be completed will bring the line into the Canyonville substation. Crews still have nearly three miles of right-of-way clearing, six miles of poles for 10 frame structures to erect, and almost 15 miles of the large conductor to string between the towers.

Will Complete Circuit

Bash reported the new line, together with BPA circuits east of the Cascades, will complete a 230,000-volt loop from The Dalles to Klamath Falls and Medford and thence northward into the Willamette valley.

"For the power users of southern Oregon, the completion of the loop will provide additional power protection by assuring an alternate source and also provide the means for transporting large amounts of power around the Copco division to serve customers in each district," Bash said.

Scheduled for completion later this year is a 230,000-volt line that will reach from Dixonville north to Albany and permit PP&L to integrate its hydroelectric generating systems in southern Oregon with its plants on streams further north.

The Copco division manager said the company's line from Dixonville to the substation serving the Hanna nickel mining and reduction mill will begin operating at 230,000 volts May 8. Built several years ago, it has operated at 125,000 volts in the interim.

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Investment Outlook Discussed at Rotary Meeting in Medford

"It is necessary we adopt a level-headed recognition of the need for tax reform coupled with a reduction in the tax rate," according to Earl B. Dusenberry, vice president of sales manager of Pacific Northwest company who spoke at a luncheon Tuesday of the Medford Rotary club.

Dusenberry, whose home is in Seattle where he has been active in the securities investment field since 1946, discussed the current investment outlook at the Rogue Valley Country club.

The two steps are needed to make U.S. economy more robust and the economic growth more vigorous, he said. Immediate tax reform is vital, with emphasis upon a more realistic allowance for depreciation so that capital investment will be encouraged.

Ironically, the depreciation rates permitted in this country are those which were adopted in another country. West Germany to discourage enterprise in order to quiet down an investment boom considered to be excessive, he noted.

Second Step Urged

The second step urged by Dusenberry is immediate reduction of both corporate and individual income taxes. The former will strengthen profits, a key source of funds for expansion and modernization, and the latter will increase demand for goods and services and put more pressure on existing productive capacity.

In opening his discussion of the current investment picture, Dusenberry pointed out that those who evaluate the investment climate as cloudy and uncertain must bear in mind that this situation is normal for business.

"I can't remember a period when there hasn't been some matter of concern to business and the investor—the threat of war or postwar problems, or perhaps inventory glut, poor car sales, etc.," he observed.

Some investors are uneasy over investigations taking place in the securities field. Most investment firms conduct their business in a creditable fashion and openly invite investigations, recognizing that their own success depends upon sound public confidence in the investment market.
