Salt Lake and Seattle were the only teams playing winning ball in the Pacific Coast league today as they continued their hot pace.

The Bees Bill Dailey and the Rainiers Pete Smith sweated out victories in a pair of classic pitchers' duels Tuesday night to keep the Bees in the league lead and the Rainiers a half-game back.

Dailey tossed a five-hitter and ran his record to 3-0 as

he hurled Salt Lake to a 2-1 win over Vancouver. Max Alvis whacked a two-run homer in the first inning and the Bees were unable to score again off tough luck loser Al Schroll.

Smith, a 23-year-old right-hander, not only hurled a 7-hitter, but contributed two hits and two runs batted in and the Rainiers nicked San Diego, 3-1.

Other Pacific Coast League action Tuesday night found Spokane halting a three-game losing streak to dump Tacoma, 5-2. Hawaii's game at Portland was postponed because of rain.

Roman Line Winner of Derby Trial

Louisville, Ky.—(UPI)—Roman Line, runaway winner of Tuesday's Derby Trial stakes at Churchill Downs, today was less likely to start in the Kentucky Derby Saturday than some of the horses he so soundly trounced.

Sixteen 3-year-olds still were counted among the probable starters in the first of the Triple Crown classics, Roman Line among them.

"But I don't know whether I'll run him, and the boss owner T. Alie Grissom said it was up to me. I'll see how he acts the next few days and if I like the way he's acting I may start him. But I know there are five or six horses in there that can beat him at a mile and a quarter," said trainer V. R. (Tennessee) Wright.

Sir Gaylord remained the solid favorite for the 88th running of the Derby. Christopher T. Chenery's colt is the horse most rival owners and trainers fear.

"He's in perfect shape," said trainer J. H. Casey Hayes, who intends to enter Cicada and Sir Gaylord in the Derby.

"But we'll only run one of them," he insisted, indicating Cicada, the hard-hitting filly, would be held in reserve as a substitute in case anything happens to Sir Gaylord.

Crater junior varsity baseball nine nipped Medford high's jayvees 10 to 9 at Central Point yesterday with two runs in the bottom of the seventh and first inning.

It was the second win of the season for the Comets over their Medford counterparts.

Medford tabulated three runs in the top of the seventh for a 9 to 8 edge. In Crater's seventh batting turn, John McNichols drew a walk and Don Patterson faked a bunt and punched a single. Mike Anhorn then sacrificed. With the one out Larry Mason was walked intentionally to fill the bases.

Harold Allen beat out a squeeze play for a single, scoring McNichols, and on a overthrow of third base Patterson tallied ending the game.

In Medford's seventh inning batting Dick Breedon and Bill Piche were hit by pitches, Gary Griffin tripled them home and he scored himself on an error on the relay from the outfield.

Crater had a six-run second inning on five hits, an error, a walk and a sacrifice. Harold Allen and John Wiser doubled, Allen with the bases filled.

Jumping Oak Gall May Be Controlled Now

Spray to control jumping oak gall should be applied now since the wasp that lays eggs causing the galls is now out, according to County Agent John McLoughlin.

A spray containing two pounds of Chlordane WP and two pounds of Diazinon WP per 100 gallons of water should reduce the number of galls as well as control aphids and the oak leaf miner. The ground underneath the tree, as well as the tree should be thoroughly sprayed, he said.

Red Raiders Entertain Mounties

Ashland—Given a week's respite from the baseball wars, thanks to the weather and a brief lull in the schedule, Southern Oregon's baseball squad resumes play in the Oregon Collegiate Conference this weekend against Eastern Oregon here on the Red Raider diamond in a three-game series.

Southern Oregon will host the Mountaineers in a nine-inning single game on Friday at 3 p.m., and the two clubs meet again on Saturday in a double bill starting at 10 a.m. Both of Saturday's clashes are slated for seven innings.

The Raiders, who claim a 4-1 win-loss record in OCC play which places them in second place behind leader Portland State, were rained out of an important three-game series with the Vikings in Portland last week end.

The last Conference action for Ted Schop's crew was a 1-0 triumph over Oregon Tech two weeks ago, but since that time have won three of six "Kings-X" encounters against non-league opponents.

Gunyon Paces
Setting the hitting pace for the Red Raiders leading into this weekend's series with EOC is senior catcher Jess Munyon who is sporting a .367 batting average in 15 games. The 1961 all-conference backdrop from Glendale has 18 base hits, including five extra base blows, in 49 trips to the plate.

The only other Raiders above the .300 mark are freshman outfielder Paul Blinka who is hitting the ball at a .308 clip in 7 games, and pitcher Don Johnson with a .375 mark in 8 contests. Blinka tops the squad in home runs with two, both coming in the recent Humboldt State series.

Versatile Dave Hughes, who has a 2-1 pitching record along with 23 strike outs and a 2.05 ERA in 26 1/2 innings pitched, in second behind Munyon in hits with 17 and leads in runs-batted-in with 14.

Senior Earle Tichenor tops the mound corps with a 3-1 record and 1.85 ERA.

Stirling Moss To Be Advised To Quit Racing

London—(UPI)—Stirling Moss will be advised by family and friends to give up auto racing as a result of his track smash-up Easter Monday.

The 32-year-old driver is slowly regaining consciousness at Atkinson Morley hospital, Wimbledon, where a bulletin said his "periods of consciousness are increasing in length."

His friend and racing sponsor, Bob Walker, said Tuesday night he heard Moss muttering lap speeds and racing jargon and believes this indicates the driver's determination to get back on the track.

"I am certain he will race again," Walker said. "But if he asks me what to do, I shall tell him to retire."

Moss's parents also have said they intend to ask their son to quit the track.

"I have never asked him before," Mrs. Moss said. "But I think I shall when he recovers sufficiently."

Only last Friday night Burnside had been bombed by the Yankees, allowing seven runs and nine hits in 3 1/3 innings.

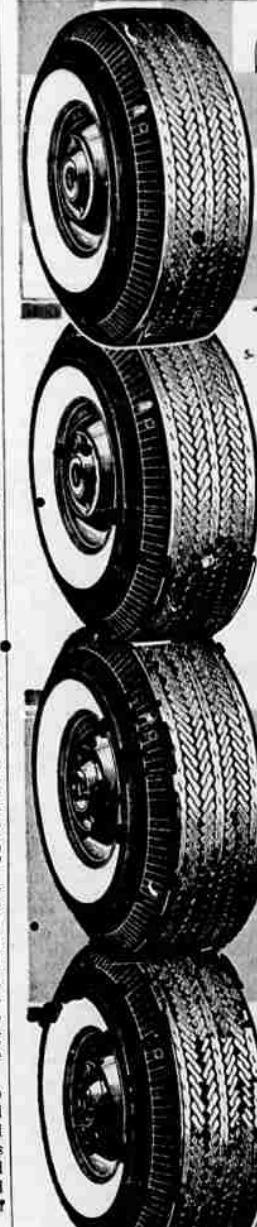
"After that happens to you," Burnside said, "you begin to wonder whether you still have it. All I did last night was try to get the guy over with something on it. The boys played good ball behind me."

The women also told Dr. Eric Riss, director of the Scientific Introduction Service, that the husbands should be able to express themselves with regard to the more intimate aspects of marriage.



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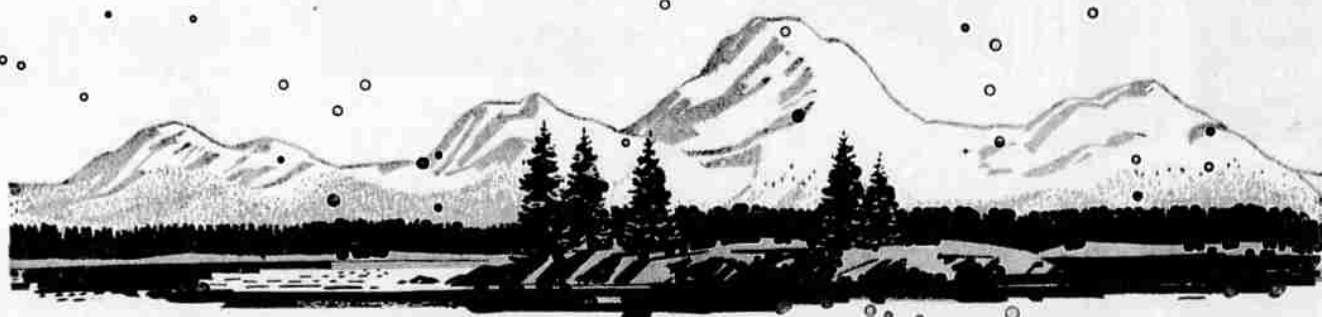
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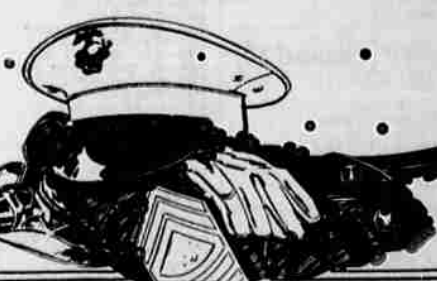
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
