Smallest Known Star Discovered

Minneapolis—A University of Minnesota astronomer has announced the discovery of what he believes to be the smallest known star in the heavens—a white dwarf with a density 200 millions times that of water.

Prof. William J. Luyten, chairman of the university's astronomy department, said the identity of the new star, called Luy 32-110, was confirmed by comparing photographic plates taken 11 years apart.

Luyten said the new star is about 100 light years, or 600 trillion miles from the earth. It was discovered with the 48-inch Schmidt telescope on the Mt. Palomar Observatory in California.

State Highway Jobs Unaffected by Strike

Small Worlds Around Us

"Hello, Weatherman, Make It Sunny for the Picnic!"

"Making two blades of grass grow where only one grew before" had its meaning a few decades ago, and it worked.

Two actually did grow, and in some instances four or five. Now technology goes out on the limb. Its farthest and most flexible tip by promising 50 or 60 blades will grow where the two grew before. And not only grass but everything else, especially food crops that an ever-expanding population will need in order to survive.

New advances in technology, they tell us, will make food raising to a chemical formula. Electrical tubes, tapes, transistors, and whirling spools will take all the guesswork out of food raising.

These gadgets will tell us how to make more peas grow into the pod, and when to water the rhubarb. They will tell us what "trace elements" are needed and when, how much moisture, and how much to raise or lower the temperature.

More Slogan Than Fact
"Improving on Nature," they call it. But so far it is more slogan than fact. It has never been too successful. But there are optimistic folks who tell us with a faraway gleam in their collective eyes, the vegetables in the field will be guided and directed in the way they should grow and how they should develop by a panel in a white shirt sitting behind a control board, his bony eyes glued to the panel where red, green, black and blue lights are blinking and flashing a message.

Outside his control room, the fields will be spotted with electronic sensing devices that will measure soil fertility, amount of moisture present or needed, shortage or abundance of specific trace elements, soil temperature, and how each row, acre and section is doing. So that he will know what goes on, there will be a battery of computers which will translate the data into understandable language.

Expressive Faces
In air-conditioned comfort, the human controller will glance up at the expressive faces of the dials. The spools will whirl, the computer will translate. The man, his well-trained and eager, button-pushing thumb poised over the row of buttons, will watch and act. The mechanical voice speaks.

"Attention, control center. Here's report YXB. There's a worm eating on radish number 745 in Row 8. Row 21 is lacking magnesium. Cabbage 415 is over-supplied with zinc, but is a little short of iron. Turnip 22 has grown against a rock; obstruction must be removed or it will be out of shape. There's a worm gnawing on a carrot in Section C and a blackhead hole two kernels from the upper section of Grainfield A."

The man pushes the buttons; electronics take over. This is all just dandy, provided the human animal can reshape his age-old behavior patterns or is glib enough to swallow whole all this wifful thinking that is so calmly promised for tomorrow.

The chances are against all this happening, but if it does, the man in the central center might as well kick out the last glowing tube, glance at the dials for the last time and leave. There will be little left to accomplish.

Pilot Blamed For Fatal Crash

Washington—The Civil Aeronautics Board Wednesday blamed pilot error for a Sept. 9, 1961, airplane crash near Salem, Ore., in which Oregon State Policeman Fredrick C. Kiehn was killed.

The pilot, David J. Tindie, survived the crash.

The CAB said its investigation had shown that the probable cause of the crash was running out of fuel and misjudging the final landing approach.

The CAB's report said fuel exhaustion probably was the result of "inadequate flight preparation."
