

Belle To 'Aid' Livingston; Durno Raps Medical Plan

Belle, the famous Portland elephant mother, has made political news.
One of the six candidates for the Republican nomination for U. S. senator, Dr. Harold Livingston of Corvallis, said he was offering the post of honorary campaign chairman to Belle. He visited the Portland Zoo Wednesday and said, "Belle and I have much in common. Both of us like peanuts. In fact, I am running on peanuts."
Long Wait for Elephants
"Belle and Oregon waited for a long time for the birth of Baby," he said. "Our Re-

publican elephant too has waited for a long time to give birth to a candidate who can match Sen. Wayne Morse on the platform as well as in pulling independent voters in Oregon." He said he was that candidate.
Livingston told the Exchange club in Albany today that what America needs now is "not a New Frontier but a True Frontier." He charged that more than 700 agencies of Federal government have more than 47,000 publicists "whose job is to 'sell' more federal services to the people."

"Government by propaganda is a characteristic of a police state rather than a free society, and objective reporting is not the purpose of a publicist," he said.
Rep. Edwin R. Durno, another GOP senatorial hopeful, campaigned today in the Portland-Oregon City area. Jim Bacaloff, another candidate, was on a tour of the state he said would take him to 19 cities.
Durno said in Salem Wednesday night President Kennedy's medical care for the aged plan is a "bad, bad bill, irrespective of the concept of Social Security."

CAT'S 'Mandarin Jet' Is Richly Decorated

Washington - (UPI) - Not too long ago, a U.S. airline official came back from the Orient and committed the ultimate sin for any airline official.
He raved about another carrier's plane.
"I've never seen an aircraft cabin interior like it," he marveled. "It's got anything in this country but a mile."
The airliner in question was a Convair 440 jetliner, operated by Civil Air Transport (CAT) - the Formosa-based airline founded by the late Gen. Claire Chennault of Flying Tiger fame.
CAT's Convair is dubbed the "Mandarin Jet." And its unique interior has impressed more people than just the aforementioned official.
The predominant color is brushed gold. The seats are a deep black threaded with silver and gold. Above the windows, splashed in rich colors of Chinese black, red and peacock blue, is a series of murals depicting the story of Confucius' travels.
The cabin bulkheads are decorated with authentically-styled moon-gates, dragons, lion-knobs and a Chinese Phoenix. The jet's exterior is only slightly less colorful. The big plane is painted in CAT's traditional colors of beige, silver and gold with a five-toed dragon emblazoned on the front end of the fuselage just under the cockpit windows.
The interior of this flying Oriental palace is so unusual that when the 880 was being built, Convair employees kept sneaking over to the assembly line to see if it was true.
The "Mandarin Jet" in a

sense has kept faith with Chennault's dreams, plans and hopes for the struggling airline that was born Oct. 25, 1946. That was the date Chennault signed a contract with the China National Relief and Rehabilitation Administration for the job of airlifting food, clothing and medical supplies into war-weary China.
In those days, Chennault's baby airline was called CNR-RA Air Transport but was later reorganized under the name Civil Air Transport. The postwar revolution forced CAT to evacuate 30 bases on the mainland before reaching Taiwan (Formosa) early in 1950.
Today, CAT is the officially-designated airline for the Republic of China, with a payroll of 3,000 and serving seven countries in the Orient. Its flight crews are both American and Chinese.
Plant Hormone May Control Blossoming
Washington - (UPI) - A plant hormone that can make the cocklebur bloom out of season and which may be the trigger for blossoming many varieties of plants, was described at the annual meeting of the American Chemical Society.
Dr. Darwin L. Mayfield, of Long Beach college, said availability of the hormone named florigen - may allow growers to time production of plants and prevent flowering in crops grown solely for their leaves or stalks. The California scientist said the hormone has been concentrated from an extract of the cocklebur plant.

He said Oregon gets those things which are left over after Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) has taken care of his own state but at that "Magnuson has done better by us than the two incumbent Oregon senators."
He said he had no quarrel with defense spending but criticized the "massive social schemes of the present administration."
Robert Duncan of Medford, candidate for the Democratic nomination to Congress in the fourth district flew to Washington, D.C., today to participate in a two-day session of the President's Advisory Commission Intergovernmental Relations. He is the lone member of the commission from Oregon.
Porter Endorsed
Charles O. Porter, another fourth district Congressional candidate, said today he had been endorsed for nomination by Railway Labor's Political League. He said he was proud of the endorsement by H. C. Crotty, president of the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees.
Democrat Robert Y. Thornton, candidate for governor, leaves Saturday for a four-day campaign swing into central and eastern Oregon, he said today.
Thornton said this will be the final downstate effort of his campaign and from now until the May 18 primary he will concentrate the campaign in Multnomah, Clackamas and Washington counties.

Vienna - (UPI) - The Budapest city council has changed the names of Stalin street, Stalin square, and Voroshilov street, according to Radio Budapest.

'Kissin' Jim Folsom Trails in Alabama

Birmingham, Ala. - (UPI) - A dapper young state senator held a slim but apparently decisive lead today over former Gov. James (Kissin) Jim Folsom in a race to decide who will face former Circuit Judge George C. Wallace in Alabama's May 29 gubernatorial runoff.
Wallace, former state amateur boxing champion, and state Sen. Ryan deGraffenried, 37, apparently outdistanced the six-foot, eight-inch Folsom, who sought an unprecedented third term.
A board meets in Montgomery Friday for an official count of the ballots in the Democratic primary.
A late count showed Wallace had 201,494 votes with all but 200 of the state's 3,432 precinct reporting. DeGraffenried had 157,120 votes to 154,602 for Folsom, one of the South's most colorful campaigners.
Wallace, a 150-pounder who likes to be called "The Little Judge," once promised to go to jail if necessary to shield the state from court-ordered integration.
DeGraffenried, hand some scion of a politically prominent Alabama family, sounded a call for fresh, young leadership to stimulate industry, improve schools and get the farmer out of the cost-price pinch.
Folsom, who tells voters "You let me grind up the ham and I'll see that you get the gravy," traveled throughout the state with his hillbilly band called "The Meat Grinders."
But he apparently did not draw as much support from rural areas as he did in his two previous races.
Wallace, who drove a dump truck during the Depression, was a strong runnerup to Gov. John Patterson in 1958. Patterson, who did not back a candidate in the primary, cannot succeed himself.
Rusk Expects China To Explode Bomb
Washington - (UPI) - Secretary of State Dean Rusk has told Congress it would not surprise him if Communist China exploded an atomic device any time after the next two years.
In testimony before the House Foreign Affairs Committee made public Wednesday, Rusk said he believed Red China is "working on missile delivery systems. We think it will take some time for them to work those out. I would think the schedule would be somewhat the same as it would for the bomb."
He said he would be surprised if Red China exploded an atomic weapon "within one year."
Tillamook Man To Be Daily Emerald Editor
Eugene - (UPI) - Ronald A. Buel of Tillamook, has been named editor of the Daily Emerald, University of Oregon student newspaper.
He will assume duties in the fall.
Buel is a junior majoring in journalism.
