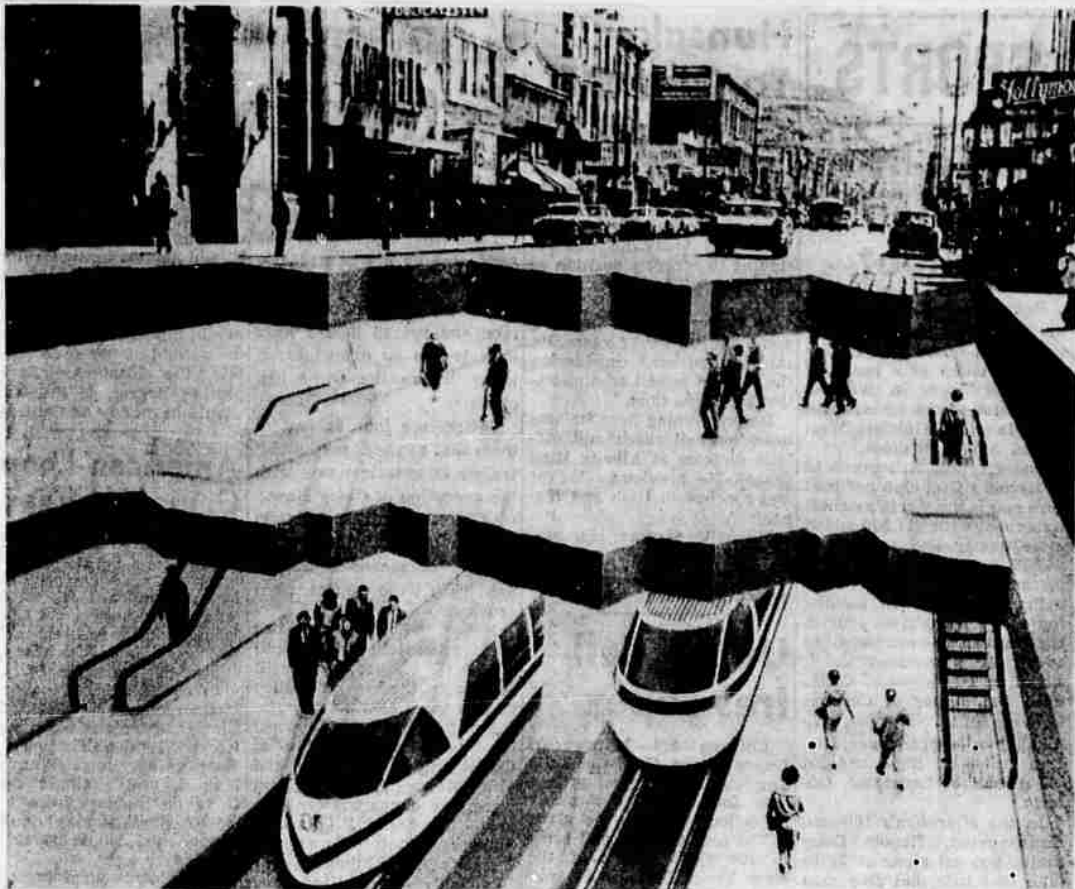

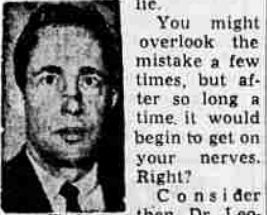

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The Wrong Name

Head of Smithsonian Institution Irked by Wrong Name for Domain

Washington — (UPI) — Suppose your name were George and people kept calling you Charlie.



You might overlook the mistake a few times, but after so long a time it would begin to get on your nerves. Right?

Consider then, Dr. Leonard Carmichael, the tall, distinguished head of the Smithsonian Institution. For years, he has had to listen to people call his domain by the wrong name.

For some reason, nearly everyone calls it the Smithsonian "Institute." Even those who should know better make the error.

I don't see how Carmichael has managed to maintain his equanimity. If I were in his shoes, I would long ago have cracked under the strain and attacked someone with a stuffed owl, or whatever museum piece was handy.

Made of Sterner Stuff

Fortunately, however, Carmichael is made of sterner stuff, as witness the control he exhibited during a double-header ceremony at the Smithsonian.

At one of the rites, Carmichael accepted for the museum's permanent collection a rare 13-volume set of the first edition of the encyclopedia Americana, published in 1829.

The presentation was made by Vincent E. Sutliff, president of the Americana corp.,

who, in keeping with the pattern, repeatedly alluded to the Smithsonian as "Institute."

After this ceremony, Carmichael went immediately to another building to accept a plaque presented to the Smithsonian by a trade organization.

Caught His Breath
When I saw the name of the donating group, I caught my breath. It was the American Bicycle Institute. I figured its officials would mislabel the Smithsonian from force of habit.

Strangely enough, they all got the name right. It was a guest speaker, Dr. Carl A. Troester of the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, who made the slip.

Many Feel Kennedy Administration Is Unfriendly Toward Businessmen

Editor's note: How do businessmen feel about the Kennedy Administration now that the heat has gone out of the steel crisis? In a speech in Washington Monday President Kennedy renewed his plea for cooperation between business and government. United Press International interviewed businessmen across the country, and the following dispatch gives a cross-section of the opinion of the business community.

Washington — (UPI) — Most of the businessmen interviewed in a spot check across the country said today they considered the Kennedy Administration to be unfriendly toward them. All who held that view predicted relations between government and business would get worse.

President Kennedy made a speech Monday to the 50th annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce. It was his first appearance before a business organization since his knockdown fight with the major steel companies. The tone of the speech was conciliatory. He asked for a better understanding between government and business, and obviously referring to the steel crisis, said the government did not want to take on the "added burden" of having to set prices on individual products.

Nobody rose up in the audience to grasp the olive branch of peace from the President. The olive tree thrives best in a warm, friendly climate and there was a touch of frost in Constitution Hall. The applause at the end was polite rather than tumultuous and reporters who have attended these meetings for years contrasted it with the thunderous

cheers that always greeted Dwight D. Eisenhower.

After Kennedy departed, Richard Wagner of Chicago, president of the Chamber, made a speech in which he said a build-up of power in the executive branch of any government ultimately leads to the police state.

One thread that ran through the conversation of delegates after the meeting was recessed was that they were waiting with interest the administration's attitude toward a big labor union that would insist on a wage increase.

Two Questions

United Press International reporters across the country put two questions to businessmen:

1. Do you consider the Kennedy Administration friendly or unfriendly and why?
2. Do you believe the relationship between business and government will get better or worse and why?

No businessman or group of men can speak for everybody and in no sense should the answers that follow be considered a scientific opinion poll. Heads of many-including some of the country's biggest-for one reason or another, asked to be excused from commenting. But the interviews did cover a wide geographical range and a variety of businesses.

About two-thirds of those who replied felt the administration was unfriendly to business.

Sample opinions: Marvin E. Purk, acting executive vice president of the Dayton, Ohio, Chamber of Commerce who is attending the meeting here: "When the showdown comes, the administration feels labor ought to have what it seeks, but we seldom see the time when the needs of business are justified in the mind of the administration. There is no indication that the Kennedy Administration will change its thinking and therefore the hope for better relations lies

in a change of administration."

Vigorous Campaign

E.O. Germany, president, Lone Star Steel Co., Dallas, Tex.: "The record reveals that the attorney general's office has pursued a vigorous campaign in several areas of business and industrial activity. On the other hand we find no such action against organized labor or other sectors of the American economy. We have but to look at the stock market decline since the President brought on the fiasco in

steel to realize that we face a worsening of relationship instead of an improvement."

David I. Welt, president, Greater Miami Manufacturers' association, Miami, Fla.: "I think the Kennedy administration is absolutely unfriendly to business. One example is the seven per cent capital gains tax credit for expansion. It's simply an attempt to buy off business. I think big steel made a mistake, but they didn't deserve to be called traitors. I just don't see any signs of things improving."

Issue Taken

Sample opinions from the one-third who consider the administration friendly:

Thomas L. Phillips, executive vice president, Raytheon Co., Boston: "I certainly do not feel that the Kennedy Administration is unfriendly, although Raytheon has taken issue with at least one of its proposals. I refer to the provisions of the revenue act of 1962 which would make income by a foreign subsidiary immediately taxable at the source. To predict improvement in the relationship between business and government would presuppose that there is something lacking in the present relationship. Speaking for Raytheon, the current relationships are excellent."

John J. Neely, president Southern Land (pulp wood products), Atlanta, Ga.: "I think the Kennedy Administration is friendly. I do feel

Nilsen Refuses File on Infante

Salem — (UPI) — Oregon Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen has refused to supply the Legislative Interim Committee on Agriculture with the personnel file of Mark M. Infante.

In a letter to Cecil L. Edwards, executive secretary of the committee, Nilsen said "It is not the policy of this agency to release personnel files or documents on employees or former employees to unauthorized persons."

Edwards noted that the Oregon Civil Service Commission "cooperatively turned over their dossier on this man to the committee."

The requests to the commission and to the State Labor Bureau for data on Infante's past employment, Edwards said, "in no way reflects an investigation."

that at times it will be necessary for the good of the country to put some restraint on labor as well as business. I believe the relationship between business and government already is in good condition. The administration must keep a balance between business and labor and it will probably be criticized severely by both parties many times in the future.

A small minority of the businessmen interviewed declined to take either side of the issue, but urged closer cooperation between the business community and Washington.
