Southwest: Spring chinook fishing excellent in Yellow creek area of main Umpqua; Idleyd area producing good fishing; North Umpqua reservoirs fair with Lemolo best; Loon lake has been murky; Tenmile lakes good with more trout to be planted; lower Rogue has slowed up for salmon.

Central: Suttle lake fair to good for kokanee; Wickup fair to good; Metolius river fair on wet files; Deschutes below Bend low and clear to Crooked river; Lake of the Woods excellent still fishing.

Academics Most Important, Becken Brings Out at Dinner

"In academics and athletics you've got a combination that is hard to beat," Elliott Becken, assistant Medford school superintendent in charge of curricula, declared last night at the Hedrick Junior High school athletics banquet.

"Let's never sever the two," Becken said in concluding his talk.

The dinner was attended by athletes in all sports in all three grades and by their parents.

Athletics is not the "essence" of school, Becken told the boys. "The most important thing you young people are doing in school," he said, "is getting that training academically."

The assistant superintendent said further, "It is important that you get the academic background that is within your grasp." He brought out that the jobs of the future will go to skilled personnel.

Team Membership
Becken, however, pointed to the lessons of life that can be learned from athletics. Along with tedious practice, it is learned that life is not easy. One thing that stands out in athletics is being a member of a team, Becken said. A young man places himself in a subordinate role

and puts his aspirations down with the rest of the team. The speaker stated that the "aspect of team membership is important and is why we can condone a strong athletic program."

Athletics, nevertheless, is just one means of helping learn life's lesson, Becken brought out. He warned against using athletics as a reason for not getting the academic job done.

The speaker also declared that "the bench is the essence of a top team aggregation."

The dinner was put on by the parent-teacher association and was served by Future Homemakers. Scientists Consider Right Eye Stronger
Chicago—UPI—Although a person has normal vision, his right eye may be more efficient than his left—particularly if he is right-handed.

British scientists report in the "Archives of Neurology," a medical journal.

Drs. Maria Wyke and G. Ettlinger, of London, tested the ability of a group of normal persons to identify meaningful drawings on the right and left side of the visual field. They found that even though a person had identified a picture presented on his right, he remained unable to identify a picture presented simultaneously on his left.

Fairbanks House May Be Oldest Wood Home
Dedham, Mass.—UPI—The Pilgrims of Plymouth had hardly got their powder dry when the Fairbanks family started to build their home a few miles away in Dedham.

Built in 1936, the same year Harvard College was founded, the Fairbanks house is reputed to be the oldest wooden house in America. It has never been restored or rebuilt. Furnished with family heirlooms, the house is open to the public from May to October. This landmark is located about 10 miles south of Boston.
