

Duncan Documents News Reports in Squabble With Porter

Eugene—(UPI)—Oregon House Speaker Robert B. Duncan Wednesday night documented 1959 news reports quoting former Congressman Charles O. Porter in favoring recognition of Red China, admission of Red China to the United Nations and trade with Red China.

Duncan, Medford Democrat, declared that "if the Congressman has changed his views on these issues, let him say so and I will congratulate him." He spoke over a television station here.

At the same time Duncan denied Porter's charge of "smear tactics" by Duncan in their campaigns for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the fourth district.

"Honest disagreement on fundamental issues requires open and frank discussion so the voters can make a choice," Duncan said.

He said Porter "honestly and sincerely holds views on the admission of Red China to the UN, recognition of Red China, and trade with Red China with which I disagree. I cannot remain silent while he and others say that there are no differences in our views when there are."

Duncan quoted from an Oct. 29, 1959 news dispatch from San Francisco and an Aug. 30, 1959 editorial from the Eugene Register-Guard. In both items, Porter was reported to favor the new relations with Red China.

Duncan declared that "one day, China may return to the family of nations, but not now."

Duncan charged that Porter has switched his position on the Oregon Dunes park proposal. Duncan said statements by Porter indicate that Porter no longer favors the park under the National Forest Service, but now favors it under the U.S. Forest Service.

Duncan said Porter's "switch" can "only lead to further controversy. I want the park." Then he asked his audience: "Is this a smear?"

Duncan, who is giving up his seat in the House to run for the Senate post now held by Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), said in Ontario Wednesday night adjustments were needed in tariffs and import quotas of certain farm products to protect the American farmer from low-priced imports.

Morse spoke at the other end of the state in Newport and pledged support for Sen. Maurice Neuberger's Dunes park bill, subject to an amendment eliminating the right to condemn private property for National Park purposes.

The lumber situation caught attention of three candidates. Harold Livingston of Corvallis, seeking the Republican Senate nomination, said in Klamath Falls that about half of Oregon's lumber mills have disappeared in the last 10 years. He said hard work "and nonpartisan senators working with the lumber industry for a common goal, prosperity," were needed.

Duncan and Porter are also opposed by Robert Straub of Eugene and Eugene fireman Pat Flynn for the fourth district Congressional nomination on the Democratic ticket.

Duncan is opposed by Sig Unander of Portland, Livingston, H. F. Cook of Scotts Mills, Portland contractor Jim Bacaloff and Glenn Brixey of Corvallis.

RED CHINA ACCUSES UNITED STATES
Tokyo—(UPI)—Communist China accused the United States today of aggravating international tensions by its nuclear weapons tests in the Pacific.

GRANDMOTHER HELD BY COMMUNIST POLICE
Berlin—(UPI)—A 78-year-old West Berlin grandmother who wanted to see her grandchildren in East Berlin was detained by Communist police after climbing a six-foot wooden fence. She was sent back to West Berlin after being interrogated by Communist police for an hour.

CZECH CRIMINALS RECEIVE AMNESTY
Vienna—(UPI)—President Antonin Novotny of Czechoslovakia marked the 17th anniversary of V-E day Wednesday by proclaiming an amnesty for several categories of civil criminals. Novotny said the amnesty did not apply to political prisoners.

FRANCE TO BE ASKED TO RELEASE GERMANS
Bonn, Germany—(UPI)—France will be asked to release from the Foreign Legion any German who wants to be discharged when Algeria becomes independent, the West German foreign ministry said Wednesday.

A spokesman said France itself does not know how many Germans are in the Foreign Legion because many of the corps' recruits refuse to state their nationality.

WEST GERMAN POPULATION GROWS
Wiesbaden, Germany—(UPI)—West Germany's population in a census last June was 53,975,000, according to the federal statistical bureau here.

A report Wednesday said that if West Berlin is considered part of West Germany the figure is 56,172,000.

RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE IN BRAZIL GROWS
Rio de Janeiro—(UPI)—Russia's economic offensive in Brazil gathered speed today with an announcement by the foreign ministry that trade between the two countries would double this year.

The ministry said total trade in 1962 should reach \$80 million.

Stocks Continue Downward Trend As Steels Mixed

New York—(UPI)—Stocks continued to slide today after falling to their lowest level in more than 14 months Wednesday.

Steels and chemicals were narrowly mixed and autos easier. The majority of domestic and international oils moved fractionally lower. American Can, Johns-Manville and American Telephone fell a point or more.

Finance shares were hard hit for the third consecutive day reflecting President Kennedy's defense of pending legislation providing withholding taxes on dividend and interest payments.

Electronics, stores, foods, utilities and rails weakened and drugs see-sawed.
