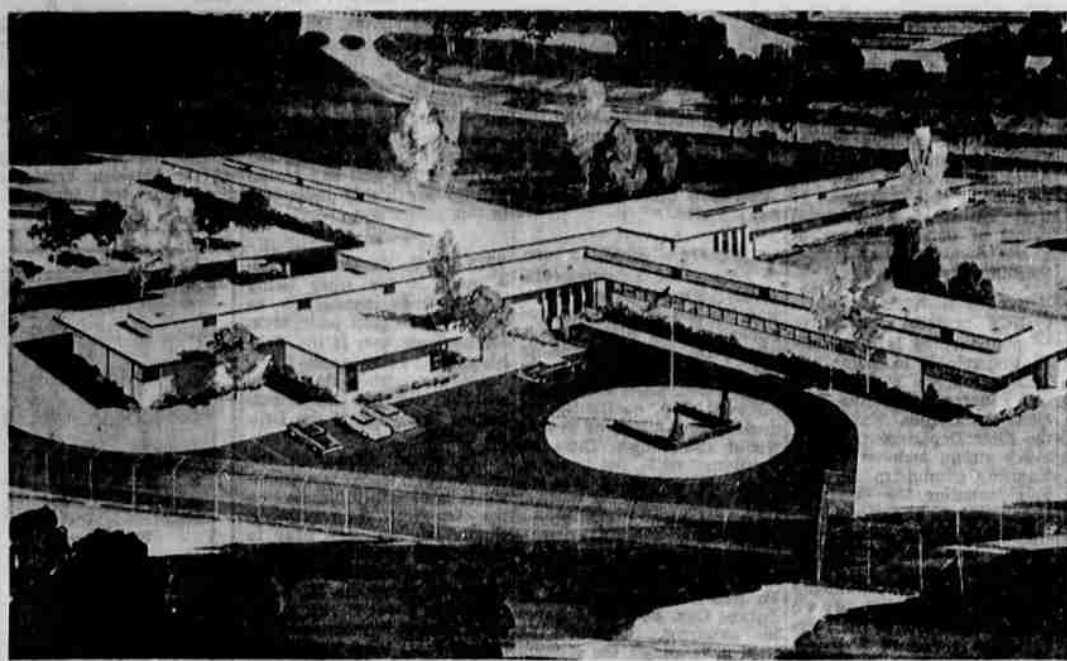




WOMEN'S PRISON—This is an architect's sketch of the new women's prison to be located next to the present penitentiary at Salem. The structure will house 56 inmates

Indians Planning Big Potlatch in British Columbia

Washington—UPI—Indians of the Pacific Northwest are planning a big potlatch, or winter festival, to be held late this year, according to the National Geographic Society.

The society says the last potlatch is being planned in British Columbia to commemorate a distinctive feature of aboriginal social life among West Coast Indians such as the Tlingit, Haida, Kwakiutl, Bella Coola, and Nootka tribes.

Special Occasions

The traditional potlatch was a gay and colorful "give away" program, at which Indian status-seekers tried to prove their superiority by giving away their wealth.

Traditionally, clan chiefs held potlatches to mark special occasions at which they distributed gifts such as canoes, food and furs with such

liberality that they often stripped themselves of possessions. The Indian concept of "keeping up with the Joneses" required other chiefs to hold bigger potlatches at which even more valuable gifts were made to guests.

According to the society, Indian leaders sometimes committed suicide rather than face the shame of being unable to surpass the potlatches of their competitors.

Gradually Faded

The potlatches gradually became more infrequent as Indian cultural life declined and as the result of discouragement by the government.

Severe competition also robbed the traditional potlatches of much of their gaiety.

The potlatches had no religious significance, the society says. They were held to mark the assumption of chieftainship, the naming of a child, building of a new home, or erection of a totem pole.

Teen-Age Group Will Tour Mission Fields

Minneapolis—UPI—A special summer tour of three mission fields in the Orient has been scheduled by 25 teen-agers of the American Lutheran church.

The group will spend 16 days visiting missions in Japan, eight days in Formosa and four days in Hong Kong. Stops also are scheduled in Alaska and Honolulu. Departure date from Seattle, Wash., has been set for July 7. The youngsters will return August 13.

Trades Union Told Duncan Is Choice Representatives

The Jackson County Building and Trades Union was told Wednesday night that Robert (Bob) Duncan was the wisest choice for Democrats in the congressional race in the fourth district.

\$13,394 Collected In Cancer Crusade

The American Cancer Society's 1962 Crusade promises to set an all time high in the number of people in Jackson county who have learned how to protect themselves against death from cancer, and in the amount of funds raised to step up the fight against cancer, according to Reese Alexander, Crusade chairman.

To date, \$13,394.06 in contributions has been received toward the county unit's goal of \$17,500.00.

In commenting on funds raised, Alexander said "60 cents out of every dollar we raise stays here in Oregon. This money is used for local and regional cancer control programs of research, education and service to the cancer patient. Of the 40 per cent of the funds that will go to the national Crusade, the largest part of it will support research. Why the emphasis on research? Because it is in the research laboratories that scientists will find what causes cancer, new ways to cure it, and ways to prevent it."

Alexander urged a strong finish to the Crusade to hasten the realization of these goals.

Jim Redden, campaign manager for Duncan in Jackson county, and himself a candidate for state representative, spoke before the group pointing out the importance of nominating in May a man that could win in November.

Redden pointed out Duncan's record as a legislator and as speaker of the house. Duncan was the first man in history to be twice elected speaker of the house.

Pointing out the necessity of picking a winner May 13, Redden pointed to the record of Charles Porter, also a candidate, and stated that Porter had won only two of the four political contests he entered.

Referring to Duncan's other main opponent, Redden pointed out that Straub was unable to be effective in the State Senate although it was controlled by Democrats and Straub was state chairman at the time.

Redden urged the group to back Duncan and to cooperate with various groups attempting to turn out a heavy

Sweet Home - Experience gained in Congress pushing the Green Peter dam will help secure funds for Foster and Holley dams, Charles O. Porter, Democratic candidate for Congress and former congressman, said here this week.

Porter told a luncheon meeting of Democrats that none of his opponents in the primary had criticized his record in Congress. "They all campaigned for me and are good friends of mine," he said.

Discuss Taxes At Grange Event

State Representative John Dellenback and State Senator Lynn Newbury were guests at a meeting to study taxation Tuesday.

About 100 persons were present at the Phoenix Grange hall, among them representatives from the Farm Bureau, the Grange, and the Dairy-men's association, and a number of ranchers.

The group discussed the need for ad valorem tax relief, because of lowering incomes and increasing property taxes.

Senator Newbury reported on a bill considered by the last session to relieve personal property taxes, and a bill permitting ranchers owning property adjacent to cities to classify this property as farm rather than subdivision property.

Representative Dellenback stated that in his opinion real property tax relief could come only in certain ways. These alternatives he listed as:

1. Lowering the amounts spent for schools and local government.

2. Having the state assume a higher percentage of the cost of maintaining and operating local schools.

3. Devising some new form of taxation.

4. Shifting the school costs from real property taxes to another type of taxation.

Those attending decided that a committee should be appointed to further study the problem of taxation and the most feasible means of lowering real property taxes. Members of the committee will be chosen from the five county organizations representing the Farm Bureau, the Grange, dairymen, cattlemen, and fruit growers.

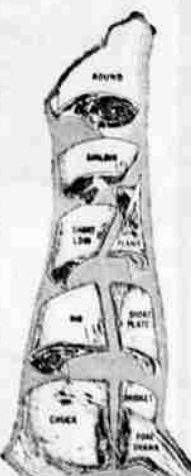
