Public Is Invited To Wedding Music Concert

In planning the program for a concert of suitable wedding music scheduled for Sunday, May 13, at 4 p.m., in the sanctuary of the First Methodist church, Mrs. Leslie Boardman, church organist, has prepared a statement of purpose for the concert. Explanations of the prelude music, the processional and recessional and the solos is included.

The public is invited to attend.

Mrs. Boardman explains that in planning a wedding, many persons automatically think of the church as a nice place to have the event, with music and flowers to enhance the occasion. Some need to be reminded, she explains, that the real reason for a wedding in a church is that the marriage is ordained of God, and in being solemnized at the altar, the marriage relationship is placed under His blessing and commandment.

Certainly, then, the entire nuptial service should be thoroughly in keeping with the reverent and God-centered spirit of ecclesiastical worship and ceremony, Mrs. Boardman explains. The music should be a part of the prayer and praise of the event.

For some reason, she adds, many people never question the propriety of using secular music or theatrical love songs in this sacred service.

"It is then our purpose," the writer explains, "to present a selection of music for weddings which is more appropriate than that which is often used."

To this end, the musicians and soloists have prepared three types of music, prelude, processional and recessional, solos and a duet.

Singers who will participate are Mrs. D. G. MacDougall, soprano; Otis Swisher, tenor; and Lawrence Hobson, bass.

Program Given

The program will open with the processional, "Trumpet Tune," by Purcell, and continue with solos by Mrs. MacDougall, "Entreat Me Not To Leave Thee," by Goldman, and "Wedding Prayer" by Williams. The first section will close with the recessional, "Trumpet Voluntary," by Purcell.

The second section will consist of prelude music and will include "O Gott Du Frommer Gott," by Bach; "Arietta Pia-caveale," by McKay; "Old Hundred," by Van Denman Thompson and "Rhosymedre," by Vaughn Williams.

The third section will feature the processional "Larghetto," by Handel; solos by

Otis Swisher, "Lord's Prayer," by Forsyth, and "God of Love," by Dietrich; and the recessional "How Thank We All Our God," chorale by Cruger and free accompaniment by Noble.

Prelude music will be played for the fourth section, and will include "Andante" (Concerto in F) by Handel; "Bell Symphony," by Purcell; "All Glory Be To God on High," by Walther, and "Pastorale," (d minor sonata) by Guilmant.

The last or fifth section will open with the processional, "The Heavens Are Telling," by Marcello, and continue with solos by Larry Hobson, singing "O Love That Casts Out Fear" by Bach, and "Wedding Song," by Schutz. Mrs. MacDougall and Mr. Hobson will furnish a duet, "Let Us Love One Another," by Stainer, and the closing selection will be the recessional, "Allegro," (d minor sonata) by Guilmant.

Mrs. Boardman is the originator of the program and has spent more than a year in preparation for the concert. To make the selections for the program she has done a lengthy research in organ and vocal music.
