Bob Duden Triumphs In Oregon Open Golf

Tualatin - (UPI) - Polished Bob Duden "rapped up his fourth Oregon Open golf championship here Thursday.

The Portland professional, driving and putting magnificently, captured the 72-hole tournament and \$500 with a 10-under-par 274.

He carded a 69 and a 71 in the final two rounds on the final day of the tourney. He finished 11 strokes ahead of the field.

Duden was 12 strokes ahead after 63 holes. "At that point I knew I had it won," he said, "and I knew I didn't have anything to shoot for."

Chuck Congdon of Tacoma was second with 285 and Jerry Mowlds of Portland finished third with 286.

Lou Stafford of Portland, an amateur, was fourth with 288 and Boots Porterfield of Grants Pass was fifth with 289.

Duden's winning total was within two of the all-time 72-hole mark set by Bob Littin in 1941 at Gearhart.

Congdon got \$300 for runner-up and Mowlds \$250 for third place.

Second low amateur behind Stafford was Stu Schroeder, Oregon State university.

Woods, Water, Wildlife

Several people have been asking what can be done about the so-called fishermen who find great sport in taking those large fish that are trying to find a spawning area. These "Sports" can be seen round the creek mouths at Howard Prairie, and it is reported that some of the younger ones - those under 60 years old - even chase them up and down the creek and try to catch them by hand.

LOTS OF COLOR

It's always a source of wonder to many of us how some people will prize a fish that we wouldn't want to keep except by accident. The fisheries people who spawned out the salmon of the Klamath river this winter tell of the long line of anxious hands that couldn't wait to get a spawned-out salmon carcass for - for what, I can't imagine. It's tough enough to try to eat a Klamath river salmon that's a couple of months away from spawning, and then the only thing that makes it halfway palatable is to smoke it a long time. Anyone who has had fresh salmon from the ocean or steelhead that has just started up river finds it no pleasure to eat a dark, skinny spawner that some people say has lots of color.

NO BIG FISH

Our trout lakes will produce no big fish if the bigger fish aren't left alone when they are most easily caught. The same issue comes up every year at Diamond Lake when the shoreline is loaded with those characters that want to catch one of the big spawners that is cruising just a few feet out from shore. The only real explanation to this is that to a lot of people a fish is a fish, is a fish, is a fish. They aren't really interested in trying to keep up the average size of the fish; they are more interested in trying to keep a fish - any fish.

ANOTHER LAW

The easiest and most effective way to prevent fishing for spawners is to get rid of all the spawners in the lakes and just keep those in the hatcheries. A harder and less effective method of stopping the "Sports" would be to pass a law that prohibits fishing within a certain distance of the spawners, be they in the tributaries or along the shorelines. It seems very easy to come to pass a law and think that this will eliminate the problem. They don't like to be reminded that the law will create its own problems. This is a lesson we learn very slowly.

SNAGGERS?

The salmon season is in full swing, almost, and the snaggers are starting to whet their hooks. A new barrage of uncomplimentary remarks will have to be created in order to impress them with their lack of popularity. This really doesn't make much of an impression when compared with a court fine of over a hundred dollars, but one must use whatever weapons are available.

THE ANGLER'S LOG

The weather has been anything but the kind of weather

that creates a keen desire to go out onto a lake in a small boat and fish for the small trout that are most eager to take a hook. The salmon fishing hasn't been any better than the weather in terms of the enthusiasm one gets from the reports. The canneries are getting a few fish a day, but a few fish at this time in the season is little better than nothing at all. This may be the best time to shine up the spinners and sharpen the hooks.

Emigrant Lake - Still has a few fishermen trying the creek arm of the lake. Rumors have it the water skiers are restive and may try an invasion.

Fish Lake - Fishing has been fairly good. Those who know how are getting what they want, but the fish aren't as big as they will be later when the weather warms up. Roads are in bad shape.

Howard Prairie Lake - Has been putting out limit catches for some. Spawners up to 21 inches are being taken in the shallows. Most of the keepers caught on the lake proper are running from 8 to 12 inches.

Lake of the Woods - Has been giving up some nice catches of Kokanee. Fishing here has somewhat the same pattern as at the other lakes - slow because the fish aren't biting.

Selma Lake - Slower and slower. Not much has been happening because of the weather.

Willow Lake - Has been pretty good for the boaters. The fish size has been pretty much on the small side, but they are taking on most trolling gear.

THE OPTIMIST'S CORNER There are some very optimistic characters operating on the Rogue right now. They are talking of catching nice salmon that weigh around 5 to 7 pounds, and that is rather remarkable when you consider that salmon average 16 to 20 pounds while steelhead average 5 to 7 pounds. Let's hope these fellows know the difference between these two fish.

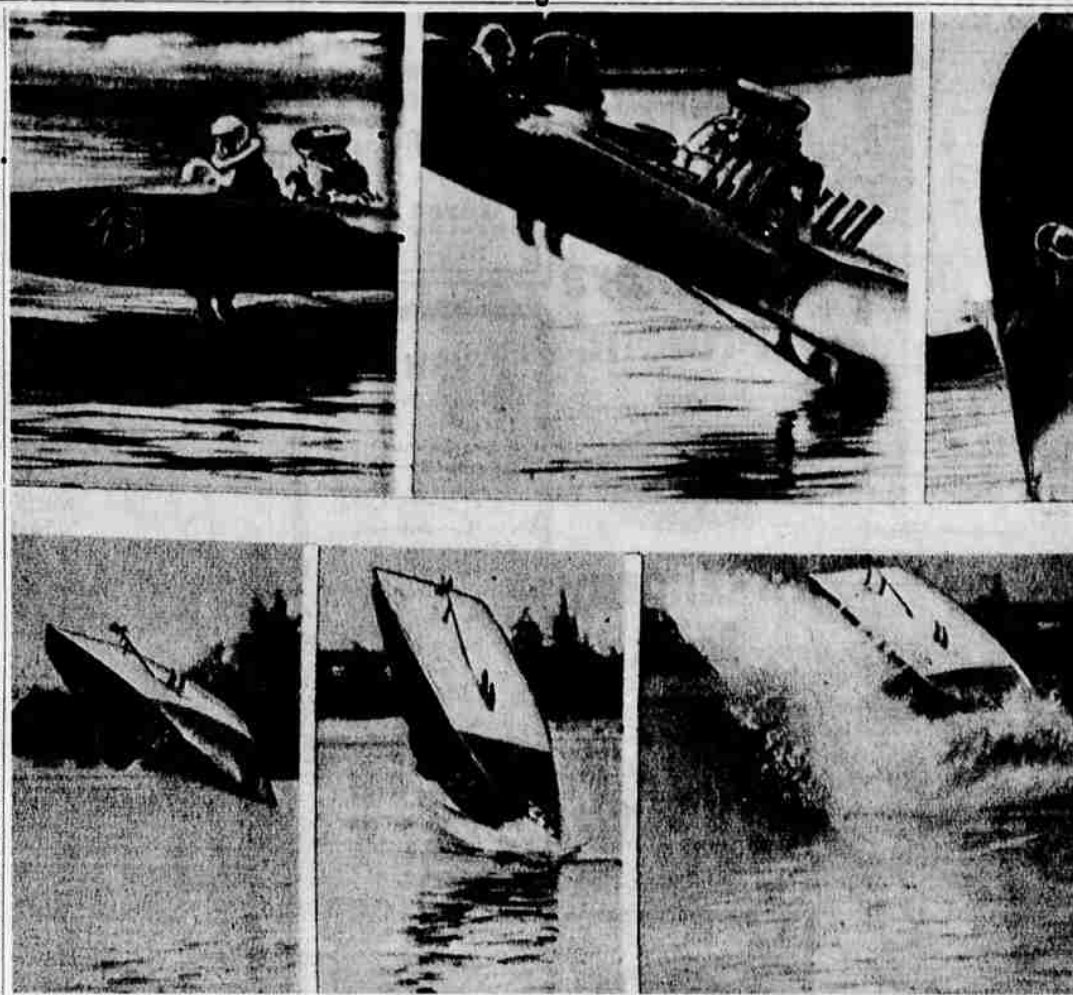
