Eagle Point - Eagle Point realized another step toward growth and progress this past week when the Town and Country Market and Lockers opened for business.

This is the first business to have off street parking with both an entrance and exit provided to avoid congestion of traffic on the main street of Eagle Point in the future.

The new business is jointly owned by Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Johnson and Mrs. Johnson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Jun, Jun has been in the grocery business for over 25 years, most of which has been in Southern California. Johnson has been in business in the Rogue River valley for the past 23 years, a large percentage of the time in the retail meat business.

The new market has approximately 3,000 square feet of floor space with 100 warm room lockers located in the rear of the store. A quick freezer was installed along with an extra large cooling room where meat can be hung and aged. The market will supply everything from fresh meat and produce to picnic supplies, toiletries, and grocery items.

Farm Plan Criticism
We are hearing a lot of criticism about the new farm plan, some going so far as to say they will keep on until they get all the farmers in jail. We don't need to worry about farmers getting into jail; they are not that lucky.

We haven't been in the local jail for some time, but according to our Oklahoma friend the boarders there are eating high on the hog, with a daily ration of well-cooked, tasty food, roast turkey, cranberry sauce, and all the fixings. According to our friend, we Oregonians are miles behind in the handling of law breakers. Where he came from he says they have a large farm where the prisoners are taken each day to do the various jobs on a producing farm. Fund Drive Starts For Hospital Home

Happy Camp - The Happy Camp Citizens Hospital committee is now in the process of making a local drive for funds to erect a building to house an emergency hospital for use in this area.

The cost of the building in round figures is predicted to be \$1,000. This building is to be set up on county owned ground near the airport.

In a letter sent out by the chairman, Frank Looten, he states: "If every one in the Happy Camp area would invest two dollars or more each to be used for the construction of this building, the Civil Defense and the Siskiyou County Supervisors, under the auspices of the Federal Government will donate a \$40,000 emergency field hospital fully equipped to administer mass medical aid with utmost efficiency."

It was stated in a recent public meeting here that in case of any disaster, fire, flood, attack, or accident where many persons were hurt seriously, that medical supplies here would be depleted almost immediately.

The emergency hospital would consist of 200 beds and bedding, one x-ray unit, one large and one small generator to be used in case of power failure, bandages, plasma, surgical instruments and the equipment necessary to operate a field hospital.
