Bible Conference Set at 1st Baptist

Speaker for the conference will be Dr. Arthur Whiting, Portland, dean and professor of Bible at the Western Conservative Baptist seminary. Dr. Whiting, born in England, came to the United States in 1927 and received his doctor of theology degree at Dallas Theological seminary. He has served as professor at the Philadelphia Bible institute and at the Los Angeles Bible institute before going to Portland. He has also pastored churches, including the First Baptist church of New York City.

Dr. Whiting will speak each evening at 7:30 p.m. in the First Baptist church. There will be music at the services and a nursery will be provided.

Sunday morning the girls' trio with Virginia Gandi, Linda Scott, and Beth Wilcox will sing for the service. At the Sunday School hour, recognition will be given to the mothers of the church. The mother of the year will be selected and honored at this time.

Ashland Presbyterians To Meet in New Church Sunday

Ashland - For the first time in 83 years there will be no Sunday morning service in the Presbyterian church at the corner of Helman and Main sts. The old bell that has called worshippers to the frame building near the downtown plaza will be silent. Instead, the doors of a new church will be open.

The contemporary style sanctuary and adjoining educational buildings have been erected on a 2½-acre site at the corner of Siskiyou blvd. and Walker ave. The architects, Edson and Pappas of Medford, took full advantage of the tree covered corner in their plans, and the landscape architect, C. E. Corry, Ashland, has developed surroundings in indigenous to southern Oregon.

The steeply roofed sanctuary with a seating capacity of 300 is connected to the lower buildings by covered walkways. All are constructed entirely of native regional materials. Included in the educational-administration group are a kindergarten, nursery, parlor and kitchenette with fireplace, the pastor's study with fireplace, an office and various smaller storage and rest room facilities.

Emphasis on space and symbolism is evident in the high ceiling and the cedar paneling of the sanctuary. The wide center aisle leads to the raised chancel and communion table.

Seventeen or eighteen members of the children's confirmation class and of the current adult membership class will be accepted as communicant members of the congregation in the 11 a.m. service. It was on Aug. 28, 1875 that 22 charter members met to form the Ashland Presbyterian church under the ministry of Father Moses Williams, who had held services in southern Oregon settlements since 1857. He conducted Sunday morning meetings in the Dunn home on Neil creek, and continued as pastor until 1877 when the Rev. J. B. Donaldson arrived from the east and began his ministry in the old school house.

The original church building was erected on the present North Main st. site in 1878 at a cost of \$2,500. Many additions have been added during the years. Until they are sold the building and manse will be used for some of the church school meetings and other church group activities.

Congregational Church Buys Lot

The Medford Congregational church, 2100 Oakwood dr., has purchased property at the corner of Jackson st. and Berkeley Way. George Weir, chairman of the church's board of trustees, has announced the acquisition of the three acre tract on which the church plans to build new facilities within the next two years.

The church has been considering the purchase of a new building site since last fall, Weir said, and on March 20, the membership approved and accepted the recommendation of the building committee. The property on Jackson st. is just two blocks east of Hedrick Junior High school.

Plans for the erection of new worship and educational facilities are under way, Weir said. The building committee, with Gatewood G. Smith as chairman, is now discussing design with architects. The Building Fund Canvass committee, under the leadership of Dr. M. Donald McGeary, is making arrangements for a capital funds canvass of the membership early in October.

It is expected the project will start within a year and be completed by the end of 1963.
