It was held in the dining hall of the First Methodist church. It was stated that 21 churches were represented and a number from other towns were present.

The luncheon chairman was Mrs. Arnold Bohnert. Tables were centered with May baskets of colorful spring flowers and refreshments too, were in a spring theme.

Mrs. Lyle Schoppert, program chairman, presided during the program hour.

The Rev. Clifford Young gave the table prayer and Mrs. Schoppert introduced ministers and their wives. Mrs. D. G. MacDougal, accompanied by Mrs. Leslie Boardman, sang an English air of the 17th century and a prayer by St. Francis of Assisi.
