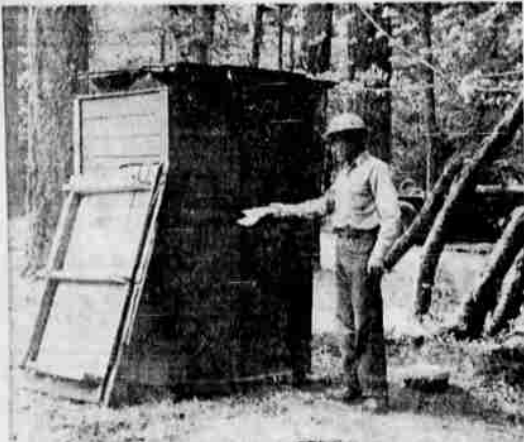
Also on special display are books concerning the two World Wars, Indian wars and the Civil War.

### Strong Competition Shown for Two Butte Falls Timber Sales

Butte Falls—According to Randall F. Perkins, Butte Falls District ranger, strong competition was shown for two National Forest Timber Sales, which were sold at the Butte Falls Ranger Station.

In the first sale B, and R. Logging of Gold Hill, Oregon was declared high bidder on 385 thousand board feet in the Foul Creek area.

The total price bid was \$11,868.75 as compared to the appraised value of \$5,586.50, which was set by the Forest Service.

Keen competition was seen in the second sale with nine bidders competing for 160 thousand board feet of National Forest Timber in the Innaha area.

The high and low bidders were separated by only \$750.00, with Elder Logging Co. of Shady Cove, Oregon, being high with a total bid of \$6,064.00 followed closely by the Hanscom Brothers of Eagle Point, Oregon. The appraised value set by the Forest Service was \$3,194.25.

## New Administrator Employed By Happy Camp School Board

Plans for summer school were discussed. According to Sonneborn, there are still a few more students needed to complete the program. It was brought up by one board member that some of the mills may be giving vacations during the week of the Fourth of July, and this could be the reason why more students were not signing up for summer school. Sonneborn said more notes would be sent home explaining that this week could and would be taken off the summer school calendar if mills shut down.

The Rogue Wonderland association is a group of business persons and others in the Upper Rogue area, who are interested in the betterment of the area and the stimulation of business and tourist attractions.

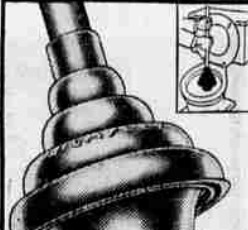
