

King and His Men Turn Back John Wheeler. Logging in Softball, 5-4

How a four-man softball team can defeat a nine-man aggregation was demonstrated at Memorial field, White City, last night as the King and His Men turned back John Wheeler Logging of Medford 5 to 4.

But, the score was what might be called coincidental and entertainment was the real purpose as the King, pitcher Eddie Feigner, demonstrated his pitching prowess and his associates their batting and fielding ability.

Feigner held back the Loggers with a diversified chucking repertoire which included an assortment of trick pitches and windups. He struck out Logger batters 13 times, issued three walks and hit a batter.

Three free passes figured in the Wheeler runs. But,

Feigner was pitching blindfolded when he walked Charles Mickelson and hit Milan Kurtz in the fifth frame and throwing from second base when he free passed Kurtz and yielded a single to one of the Wheeler Bob Smiths in the sixth.

Blindfolded Strikeout

The King whiffed Jack Brown while pitching with the blindfold on. Feigner whipped the ball behind his back and between his legs on some of his pitches. He even slapped some behind the back tosses into the glove on his other hand while receiver Mike Mellicke popped his mitt to simulate a catch. The battery, however, did not fool plate umpire Darrell Copeland.

Three of the Court combined to pick Bob G. Smith of Wheeler's off first base. Feigner walked Smith. Then, Smith led off after a pitch. Mellicke fired the ball back to Feigner, who snapped the ball behind his back over to Jerry Jones at first base. Jones tagged the surprised Smith out.

Biggest blow in the game for the Loggers came in the second inning. Mickelson slapped a fly into right field. First baseman Jones went back but didn't get his hands on it before it hit the ground. By the time the Court member retrieved it, Mickelson was headed for third base. But, Jones threw to Sease for a putout. The Loggers got even for this in the sixth inning.

When outfielder Fuz McCay threw to Jack Brown at third base to put out Jones who was trying to stretch a two-base hit.

Mellicke Homers

Mellicke doubled and homered in the second inning when the King and His Court got all their runs. Jones singled off the glove of pitcher Kurtz and there were two errors in the stanza to figure in the scoring.

After the two free passes in the fifth inning from Feigner, Ready Berg singled off a slow looping pass and McCay and Bob G. Smith got hits to provide two runs. The other Bob Smith's hit, the walk, an error and McCay's hit gained the other two runs in the sixth.

Feigner followed up the game portion of the program in which he demonstrated pitches, including a history of softball chucking.

The King and Court have a fabulous record of victories and it was apparent that they could have kept the Wheeler scoring down to less than the four runs. They aimed rather at making a more entertaining and appealing game.

King and Court have just

started their 1962 tour. Regular shortstop Al Jackson, however, has not joined the combine and Jack Sease, from Albany, who has played for the four-man crew, filled in at the spot.

Columbia, S.C. — (UPI) — The University of South Carolina named Chuck Noe, who never had a losing season at Virginia Polytechnic Institute (VPI), as its new head basketball coach on Monday.

Noe's assistant, Bill Matthews, was elevated to the top page spot at VPI, succeeding Noe.

South Carolina Athletic Director Marvin Bass said the university felt Noe, 35, was the most qualified of more than 50 coaches who applied for the job left vacant by Bob Stephens, 1962 Atlantic Coast conference basketball coach of the year, who accepted a similar post at the University of Oklahoma.

"I am delighted he has accepted," said Bass. "His record at VPI speaks for itself as an endorsement of his coaching ability."

During Noe's seven seasons at VPI, the Gobblers compiled a record of 109 victories and 51 losses. His 1961-62 team won 19 and lost 6.

Noe was signed to a four-year contract, Bass said, and will choose an assistant shortly. Stevens' assistant, Gordon Stauffer, went with him to Oklahoma.

A Regular Day Off Majors Engage in Three Exhibitions

Rookies are blooming in the major leagues in record numbers this season with Bo (no-hit) Belinsky of the Angels, Maury Jimenez of the Athletics and Dick Rollins of the Twins the early standouts in what may turn out to be a bumper crop come September.

Not since the war years when many of the established stars were in khaki and blue have there been so many rookies still on major league rosters beyond the first month's cut-down date — a whopping 20 per cent of the total number of players in the two leagues.

Expansion, no doubt, has had a lot to do with it, but the caliber of the newcomers this season is surprisingly high. A breakdown of the two leagues shows 50 rookies in the AL, which expanded a year ago, and 47 in the NL, which added two new clubs this season.

There were no major league games played Monday, but in exhibitions the New York Yankees beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-3; the Chicago White Sox defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 5-4, in 13 innings.

Belinsky, an eccentric left-hander who had a so-so 9-10 record at Little Rock in 1961, has won all five of his major league starts, including a no-hit, no-run game against the Baltimore Orioles on May 5.

Jimenez, who batted .325 at Vancouver last year and came to the A's in an off-season trade with the Milwaukee Braves, currently is leading both major leagues in batting with a .382 mark. Rollins, who batted a modest .274 at Charlotte in 1961, has a .353 batting average with 6 homers and 25 runs batted in. The two rank as the top hitters in the first five weeks of the season.

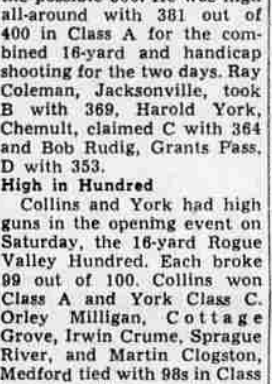
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
