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Pierce To Take Mound For Giants

San Francisco—UPI—Little Billy Pierce, who carries on a mutual admiration affair with the City of San Francisco, goes to the mound tonight for the Giants against the St. Louis Cardinals.

It's the opening game of a long home stand and about 20,000 fans are expected at Candlestick Park to see Pierce duel with the veteran Curt Simmons of the Cards.

Simmons and Dick Farrell of the Houston Colts are the only hurlers in the National League to go the distance against the Giants this year in 32 outings. Simmons has a 5-0 record and Pierce is 4-0.

San Francisco enters the game holding a four-game lead over Los Angeles, five over the Cards—and with Willie Mays hitting only 265.

"But we are in a better situation and playing better ball than we were last year," says Mays. "I'm not hitting as good as I should. But somebody seems to pick us up when we need the hits. That's the way championship teams work."

Nobody's worried about Willie's hitting. Although his average is down, he has smasher 10 home runs and driven in 25 runs.

The pleasant surprise are infielders Chuck Hiller (.311), Jose Pagan (.293) and Jim Davenport (.337). While their averages have not been overpowering, they have hit in the clutch—and their fielding has been brilliant.

"We played good all-around ball on this road trip," says manager Alvin Dark. "But it's still far too early to talk about a pennant. There are tough teams in this league. Our pitching will have to stand up if we are to stay on top."

So far this year the pitching has been a pleasant surprise. Giant hurlers have gone the distance 17 times out of the 32 games played.

Ortega Helps Spokane Win Over Seattle

Indiana AAU Suspends 11 College Trackmen

Indianapolis, Ind.—UPI—Amateur Athletic Union officials in several states today were reluctant to follow the lead of the Indiana AAU which Monday suspended 11 college track athletes for competing in the Ohio State University Relays.

The AAU suspended the performers from Purdue, Indiana, Notre Dame and Butler who placed in relays, which were not sanctioned by the AAU, April 21.

Suspended were Cornelius Miller and Steve Hibler, Indiana; Nate Adams, Purdue; Frank Carver, John Mulrooney and Pete Whitehouse, Notre Dame; Jack Krebs, Butler; Dave Edelman, who has completed his eligibility.

James Moore, Dan Jones and Al Washington, all of Purdue. The suspensions were considered a direct blow by the national AAU against the college coaches, who seek to gain control of competition in track, baseball and gymnastics.

Powell Moorhead, executive secretary of the Indiana AAU, said the suspensions were made on orders from the national AAU.

But other states turned their backs on the orders or delayed action. Moorhead said the relays entry blanks warned the meet was not AAU sanctioned and that Ohio State refused to allow the sanction.

Three meets this week end will close out the prep track states on southern Oregon fields.

Barring rain or a first place deadlock, the Southern Oregon conference baseball season also will conclude.

The track meets are the District 6 A-1 at Klamath Falls and the District 6 A-2 at Southern Oregon college in Ashland, both on Saturday and the freshman meet at the Ashland high track on Friday.

In A-1 baseball Medford high was to play Ashland this afternoon. Ashland is scheduled at Klamath Falls on Friday and Grants Pass at Central Point against Crater on Saturday.

Florida Trying To Lure Teams From Arizona

Fort Lauderdale, Fla.—UPI—The Florida Chamber of Commerce baseball committee today set its sights on five major league baseball teams training in Arizona and said it would try to get them to train in Florida.

The first target will be the Boston Red Sox, who hold spring training at Scottsdale, Ariz., according to committee chairman Robbie Robison.

Ted Groves, sports promotion manager of the Florida Development Commission, said the logical Florida spot for the Red Sox to train would be Bradenton, which loses the Milwaukee Braves to West Palm Beach next spring.

"We're doing everything we can on the state level to help Bradenton get the Sox," Groves said. "If Boston leaves Arizona, that state's due for trouble because of scheduling problems."

Robison commented that attendance at Grapefruit league games in Florida was about 400,000 in 1962, a 10 per cent increase over the previous spring. Fourteen major league teams currently train in Florida.

Alonzo Johnson Faces Big Cat Williams At Houston Tonight

Gubner To Meet Long In Shot Put

Los Angeles—UPI—Southern California's Dallas Long and New York University's Gary Gubner, two muscle-bulging athletes who handle a shot put the way most people do a tomato, meet Friday night at the Coliseum Relays. The result should be a 65-foot put.

USC's track coach, Jess Hill, told the Southern California track and field writers Monday that Gubner's competition is all Long needs to get over 65 feet with the 16-pound ball.

Dallas, who as a freshman was getting the shot out around the 64 foot mark, had appeared lethargic in some meets this season. Many bitters said Long—now a Senior and Trojan captain—was getting old, or something, because he was tossing "only" 61 feet.

But Long threw a college record last Saturday at the Fresno, Calif., relays—and was selected as field athlete of the week by the writers.

"He has been coming along slowly," Hill explained about Dallas' marks this season, "but I think he is ready for his best."

Predictions
USC frosh track coach and high jumper Bob Avant said Long would better 6 feet 10 inches against Gubner. Avant also said it would take a leap of 7 feet to win the high jump at the Coliseum meet.

The writers, polled on the outcome of various events, evidently thought so too. Most of the 70 ballots cast had the winning high jumper getting over 7 feet, the mile time below four minutes and the pole vault over 16 feet.

Sixty two of the experts voted that New Zealand's great Peter Snell would run a sub-four minute mile Friday, and of that number 49 said he would do 3:59 or faster.

In the pole vault, with the world's only 16 foot vaulters—Dave Tork and John Uelses—entered in the competition, 35 ballots predicted the winning height would be 16 feet or better.

Chairman of the Coliseum Relays selection committee, Willis O. Hunter, called the field the best ever assembled and said he was hopeful a crowd of 40,000 or better would be in attendance for the 22nd edition of the meet.

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\$7,000 first prize thinks Palmer should be handicapped, like race horses, with a 20-pound weight to pack on each round.

That was Pott's jocular comment Monday after Palmer had thrown a birdie barrage at him on the back nine for a four-stroke victory. It was Palmer's third tournament title in a row, his sixth of the year and the 32nd of his 224 tournament pro career.

Palmer toured Colonial Country Club's wind-raked 7,112 yards in a 37-32-69, hitting only one bad drive all afternoon and putting superbly in the clutch.

Pott could do no better than a 38-35-73 after erasing a seven-stroke deficit on the final round Sunday to tie Palmer at a one-over-par 281 at the end of the regulation 72 holes.

The triumph, Palmer's second playoff victory of the year and the eighth in 11 such post-tournament matches, boosted the Latrobe, Pa., native's earnings to \$59,308, well within shouting range of his own PGA record total of \$75,262 set in 1960.

In fact, the nearness of a new record has caused Palmer to change his playing plans a bit for the remainder of the year. He earlier had said he planned to concentrate on the four big ones—the Masters, the British and U.S. Opens and the PGA. He already has won the Masters.

"But, now that I'm so close to the record," Palmer said, "I'm going to add a few more tournaments to my schedule."

Pott won \$3,500 for his runner-up finish here to build his year's bank roll to \$14,431, good enough for 11th rank among the money winners on the tour.

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
