Rochester, N.Y. — The original manuscript of "The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag" is in the University of Rochester library. The author, Francis Bellamy, a Rochester alumnus, wrote the pledge in 1892 in honor of the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America and the establishment of Columbus Day, Oct. 12, as a national holiday. Although the pledge of allegiance became a national tradition soon after it was written, it was not recognized officially by Congress until 1945.

Portland Told To Consider Airport

Portland — It's time for Portland to start thinking about another major airport, the State Aeronautics Board was told Tuesday.

L. S. White, former member of the Port of Portland, said studies show that by 1965 the city will need a satellite airport and "someone is going to have to spearhead that."

He said some major airlines were switching to larger jets and that Portland stood to lose flights unless it had facilities large enough to serve them.

White said the new airport should be within 10 miles of the downtown area. He added the city should consider a helicopter landing site in the downtown area.

Children Out To Save Battlefield

Chicago — The children of the Hoover school in suburban Calumet City are out to save the battlefield of Gettysburg from hot dog stands, frozen custard vendor and taverns.

Already, their faculty advisor says, an automobile junkyard, ice cream stands, motels and some homes adjoin the field. And there is no way to keep them out, warns the Gettysburg Battlefield Preservation association (GBPA), so long as 700 acres of the field are still privately owned.

Demonstration of Painting Scheduled

Sam Roberts, Portland, will demonstrate oil painting on black velvet and how to use different media at the Colorama Paint Center, 315 East Main st., Medford, Thursday and Friday.

The demonstrations are scheduled between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. those days.

Roberts, who is with the J. K. Gill artist supply company, Portland, which is assisting in the local sponsorship, attended the California school of fine arts in San Francisco and the Portland advertising art school.

Beginners and professional artists of this area have been invited to watch the demonstrations.

The GBPA had tried and failed to raise enough money to buy up the remaining acreage for the National Park Service which has custody of 2,805 acres of the field.

The worst part of it is, according to GBPA spokesmen, that the privately owned parcels of land slice right through the battlefield.

But, with the price of land in the area up to \$8,000 an acre, the GBPA had practically given up hope of buying up the remainder of the field and eliminating the burgeoning commercial enterprises.

Pupils Rally

Then, the 216 pupils of the Hoover school entered the picture. They took their cue from the children of the last generation who rallied to save the Revolutionary War frigate, "Constitution," known as "Old Ironsides." The youngsters took up a collection for the Gettysburg battlefield. They raised a total of \$187, then asked their history teacher, Martin Brill, how they

could carry the campaign into other schools.

Brill sent the money to the GBPA. At his suggestion, the organization agreed to back a nationwide drive among school children to save the Gettysburg battlefield.

Brill calculated that, with some 45 million school children in the United States by the 1960 census estimate, it would take only about a dime from each pupil to buy up the remaining 700 acres of the battlefield at prevailing prices.

He emphasized that the Hoover school was not heading the drive. He said schools interested in participating should write to:

The GBPA has agreed to give each participating school a certificate, suitable for framing. Each child who contributes a dollar or more will receive a medal.

Brill said he has received letters from former Presidents Hoover and Truman and Cliv-

War Historian Bruce Catton, praising his school's plan to let the children save the battlefield.

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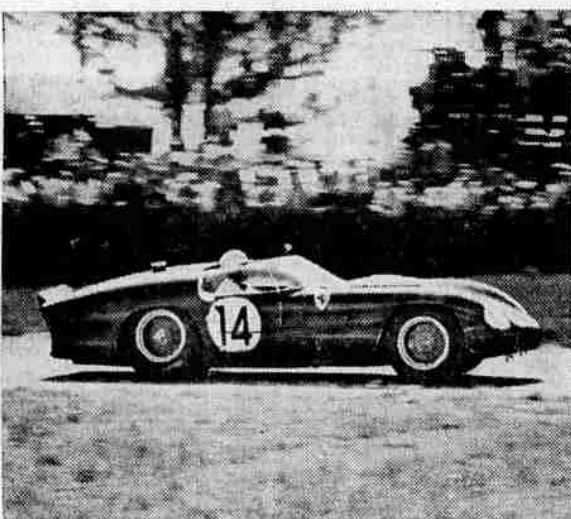
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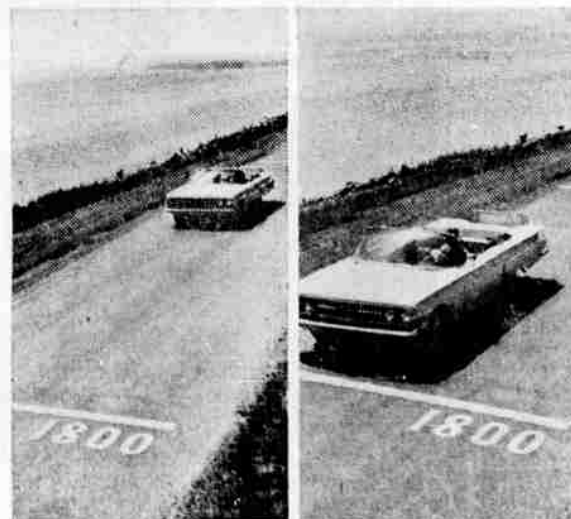

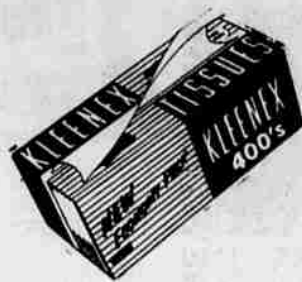
