

San Francisco Tips Cards; Minnesota Within One-Half Game of First Place in AL

Miller Not Forgotten

The San Francisco Giants' rivals may have forgotten about soft-spoken, soft-throwing Stu Miller, but manager Alvin Dark hasn't.

Miller, the little relief ace who had a 14-5 record and 2.66 earned run average last season, hadn't worked for the Giants since May 5. Part of the reason was the nine-inning route-going ability of San Francisco pitchers and part was the surprising early relief work of Don Larsen.

Miller was ready Tuesday night, however, when lefty Bill Pierce faltered in the eighth inning of a 6-3 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals that kept the Giants' early National League lead at four games.

Miller replaced Pierce after Doug Clemens and Ken Boyer singled to open the eighth and threatened the Giants 6-2 lead. The little curveballer yielded a run-scoring single by Gene Oliver but pitched out of the jam by retiring Julian Javier with the bases filled.

Wins Fifth Straight

The win was the fifth straight for Pierce, who needs only six more victories to reach the 200-mark for his career. The Giants backed him with an eighth-inning attack and handed Curt Simmons his first defeat after five straight triumphs.

The Cincinnati Reds shaded the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Milwaukee Braves, 5-4, the Los Angeles Dodgers outslugged the Houston Colts, 10-7, and the New York Mets beat the Chicago Cubs, 6-5, in a four-hour and 54-minute 13-inning contest.

In the American league, the Minnesota Twins topped the Detroit Tigers, 4-2, the Boston Red Sox routed the New York Yankees, 14-4, the Kansas City A's downed the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, the Chicago White Sox beat the Washington Senators, 4-3, and the Baltimore Orioles scored a 7-1 victory over the Los Angeles Angels.

Pinson Aids Jay

Vada Pinson's 12th homer paved the way for Joey Jay to win his fifth decision with Bill Henry, Dave Sisler and Ted Wills.

The Dodgers scored six runs on six hits and a walk with two out in the seventh inning to present relief pitcher Larry Sherry with his second triumph.

Smoky Burgess' 10th-inning single scored Dick Groat with the decisive run for the Pirates, who snapped a six-game losing streak. Rookie Denis Menke accounted for all the Braves' runs with a grand slam homer.

Rookie Cal Koonce walked Hobie Landrith with the bases filled and two out in the 13th inning to force in the Mets' winning run and end an ordeal of frustration in which 37 players saw action. The Mets left 10 runners on base and the Cubs wasted two homers by George Altman and solo homers by Ernie Banks and Billy Williams.

The Twins moved to within a half game of the AL lead

SF Pitching No Longer Question

San Francisco (UPI)—The San Francisco Giants' pitching, once considered a big question mark, is so strong these days that manager Alvin Dark can announce his mound rotation 10 days in advance—and very few managers can make that claim.

Little Bill Pierce ran his record to 5-0 Tuesday night with a 6-3 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Today Juan Marichal was to hurl against Ray Sadecki of the Cardinals. Thursday it will be Billy O'Dell.

"And on Friday night against Houston, it will be Jack Sanford," says Dark. "On Saturday we'll give Mike McCormick another try."

And so the jubilant Dark rattles off his rotation. The club goes into today's battle with a four-game bulge over Second-place Los Angeles. St. Louis now is six games off the pace.

Fought Wind

Pierce fought the wind and some booming St. Louis bats Tuesday night before he came home the winner with some help in the last two frames from the relief specialist, Stu Miller.

But the Giants shelled St. Louis' Curt Simmons from the mound in the third inning and had a 6-0 lead before the Cards got into the game.

It was the first time that Simmons had failed to go the distance this year. He now has a 5-1 record.

The Giants combed him for four doubles and three singles during the time he worked. They got two runs in the first on Harvey Kuenn's double, Chuck Hiller's single and an error; they got another in the second on Jose Pagan's double, an infield out and Pierce's perfect squeeze bunt.

Morehead Pitches 3rd Seattle Win

Seattle's bonus baby pitching brigade is keeping the Rainiers within hailing distance of the Salt Lake City Bees in the Pacific Coast league chase.

Tuesday night it was 18-year-old Dave Morehead who

picked up his third win of the campaign without a loss as the Rainiers pounded Spokane, 7-3.

Morehead, who cost the Boston Red Sox \$85,000, and 19-year-old teammate Bill McCleod, a \$60,000 prize, could lead Boston back to its heyday of 1945-55, in a few years, but right now they would settle for helping the Rainiers pick up the Pacific Coast league pennant.

Morehead needed help from Merlin Nippert Tuesday night and also was backed by a 13-hit attack from his teammates. Archie Skeen got three of them.

Meanwhile, Salt Lake City continued three games ahead of the Rainiers with a 6-5 victory over San Diego. The Bees and Rainiers are the only teams over .500 in the league today.

Other scores Tuesday night found Portland thumping Tacoma, 6-3, and Vancouver blanking Hawaii, 2-0.

Salt Lake's win was its fifth straight. Bill Dailey picked up his fifth win in six decisions as the Bees built up a 6-0 lead and then hung on.

Hal Jones' grand slam homer gave the Bees a good start and they picked up a couple of others before the Padres dented the plate in the sixth. In the ninth, the Padres collected a walk, five singles, and four runs before reliever Dave Gerard finally put out the fire.
