

Numerous Candidates, Two Statewide Measures Await Voters Friday

Candidates for Friday's Oregon primary election took part in their next to last day of campaigning today.

Oregon will nominate candidates for one U. S. Senate seat, the state's four U. S. House seats of Representatives, governor, labor commissioner, and for the state legislature.

Voters also will elect a new Supreme Court justice and a tax court judge, decide on two

measures and vote on numerous local issues and candidates. Circuit Court Judges Arno Denecke of Portland and Lyle

Wolf of Baker are competing for a State Supreme Court berth. Tax Judge Peter Gunnar is opposed for that non-partisan position by Raymond

L. Jones. One candidate for governor declared Tuesday the Democrats can and will unseat Gov. Mark Hatfield, and another insisted he is the man to do it.

Atty. Gen. Robert Thornton and State Senator Walter Pearson hit away at their familiar campaign themes as they shared the stage in Portland.

Thornton said the Democrats can win, even though Hatfield will "take time out" from his campaign for vice president to wage a publicity-flooded fight for reelection in Oregon.

Pearson asserted he is the man to beat Hatfield on a program to increase industry and jobs, "keep taxes down, and put the go in Oregon."

Politics: Porter Claims Substantial Lead In Fourth District Congressional Campaign

The race for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the fourth district continued today to be one of the hottest campaigns in Oregon with the election less than 24 hours away.

Former U. S. Rep. Charles O. Porter said in Eugene today that he holds a substantial lead over his three opponents for the Democratic nomination for Congress. Porter said the lead was revealed in a poll of Lane county Democrats conducted by a bipartisan group of University of Oregon political science

students under supervision of the Oregon Research Institute.

Bryan Hodges, chairman of the fourth congressional district council of the Young Democratic Clubs of Oregon, said the tele-conducted poll

shows Porter is preferred by 41 per cent of the Democratic voters. Another Lane county man, State Sen. Robert Straub, trails with 37 per cent. State Rep. Robert B. Duncan of Medford is favored by only 12 per cent, and Pat Flynn, Eugene, by 7 per cent. Five per cent of the poll participants remain undecided.

Hodges said the pollsters made telephone calls to Democrats in every precinct of the county. Names were selected on a scientific basis from lists of registered voters, he added. Meanwhile, Duncan said in Medford that there is no es-

caping the fact that the lumber industry is the key to the economic health of the fourth district. "Further diversification into other industries is highly desirable, but until that is achieved we must face the fact that we are largely a one-industry area," Duncan said.

The Democratic candidate said "the industry and the federal government each have their role in improving this industry and your congressman must give this problem primary consideration."

Straub said in Eugene that he backs the administration plan for medical care through the Social Security system, that he would seek revitalization of the lumber industry, work for fair prices to farmers, development of recreation and highway facilities to

Timber Workers To State Demands

Portland, Ore.—UPI—Timber operators and the International Woodworkers of America start marking out their stands today on a proposed union wage increase.

Negotiators for the union and the Timber Operators Council, representing employers from California to Alaska, open a three-day meeting on the union's request for an increase of 30 cents an hour.

The IWA announced earlier it wants a substantial wage increase. The timber operators replied such an increase seems unjustified in view of the present sag in the lumber industry.

IWA wages now run from \$2.09 to nearly \$4. The region's second big lumber union, the Lumber and Sawmill Workers, will spell out its demands for wage increases June 6.

Carpenters Open Contract Parley

Portland, Ore.—UPI—Carpenters and contractors sit down here today to try to break their contract stalemate.

Carpenters and joiners of Oregon and Southwest Washington rejected a negotiated three-year contract last week after the Pledrivers and Southwest Washington Carpenters units voted against it.

That contract, to cover some 12,000 men, had been reached after a week-long strike in parts of Oregon. Although the overall union membership approved it, rejection by the two units meant rejection by all.

Federal Mediator George Walker was to attend today's session.

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Foreign Briefs

NATIONALIST CHINA, LAOS ESTABLISH TIES
Taipei, Formosa—UPI—Nationalist China announced today it has established full diplomatic relations with the Laotian rightwing government.

It was Nationalist China's most forthright pledge of support to date for the Royal Laotian government's stand against joining a coalition which would include the kingdom's pro-communist faction.

U. S. TO AID EQUADOREAN PROGRAM
Oito, Ecuador—UPI—The United States will contribute \$100,000 to a program to provide 150 schools for 6,000 Equadorean children in 50 rural communities, under an agreement signed here Wednesday. Ecuador's share of the school building cost will be \$125,000.

HUNGARIANS KILLED IN COAL MINE BLAST
Budapest—UPI—The official Hungarian news agency MTI said Wednesday that seven coal miners were killed in a mine explosion at Tatabanya last Friday.

DJILAS ACTIVITIES WILL BE LIMITED
Belgrade—UPI—Former Yugoslav Vice President Milovan Djilas will be banned from all public activities for five years after completing his nearly nine-year jail sentence, a court spokesman said Wednesday.

Djilas, 51, was convicted Monday of revealing state secrets in his new book, "Conversations with Stalin."
