

Flame Going Out Under Oregon's Political Pot as Election Day Approaches

United Press International Campaigning for Friday's Oregon primary ends today as Democrats and Republicans prepared to pick their November candidates in an election which has sparked heated interest in only a few cases.

Sen. Wayne Morse, seeking his fourth term, is running for the second time as a Democrat since he bolted the Republican party in 1952. It will be the first test of Morse's voting strength since he lost the 1960 Oregon presidential primary to President Kennedy.

But his real test, should he win nomination Friday, will come in November. Morse is opposed in the primary by Charles Gilbert, a Portland labor union member.

Republican Senate candidate R. F. Cook, Scotts Mills,

the endorsement of Unander by the Oregonian.

Gov. Mark Hatfield, who has opposition from George Altwater of Portland, has done little campaigning in his bid for nomination for a second term. State Sen. Walter Pearson and Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton seek the Democratic nomination for governor, along with Dan Cox of Springfield and M. A. Yeage of Eugene.

The Thornton-Pearson battle, the six-way race for the Republican Senate nomination and the fight for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the fourth district have had the most fireworks.

All six candidates for the GOP Senate bid have been critical of Morse, who was elected as a Republican in 1944 and 1950. GOP voters will choose among Unander,

Durno, Dr. Harold Livingston, Jim Bacaloff, Cook and Glenn Brixy. Both Durno, who has been in the state for three weeks, and Unander, have hit hard at Kennedy Administration policies.

Much of the hottest battling in the late stages has been between ex-Congressman Charles O. Porter and House Speaker Robert Duncan, two of four candidates for the Democratic congressional nomination in the fourth district. State Sen. Robert Straub and Eugene Fireman Patrick Flynn round out the four-man race to oppose State Rep. Carl Fisher (R-Eugene), unopposed on the GOP ticket.

Rep. Walter Norblad is unopposed for nomination in the first district. Willis West, a Multnomah county deputy attorney, and Blaine Whipple, former executive

secretary of the Democratic party, seek the bid to oppose him.

In Eastern Oregon, Rep. Al Ullman is unopposed for nomination on the Democratic side. Bend Publisher Robert Chandler, a surprise entry on the GOP ticket, is opposed for nomination to Congress by Everett Thoren of Elgin.

Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.) has primary opposition from Mrs. Audrey Henry, a conservative, and druggist Howard Steinbach. Republicans seeking the third district nomination are Stanley E. Hartman, Steinbach's drug store business partner, and Wint Blackwell.

Voters also will choose between Circuit Judges Arno Denecke of Portland and Lyle Wolf of Baker for a Supreme Court position; between Peter Gunnar, incumbent, and Ray

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Foreign Briefs

PLANES PATROL THAI-LAOTIAN BORDER
Vientiane, Laos—American jet fighters and fighter bombers apparently have begun patrolling the Thai-Laoian border to guard against a pro-Communist invasion of Thailand from this divided kingdom.

Two planes which military observers here said appeared to be U. S. Navy or Marine Corps jet fighters flew over Vientiane this morning and then headed north along the Thai border.

POLIO-INFECTED GUINEA PIGS STOLEN
Stockholm—Police said today that 23 guinea pigs infected with live polio virus were stolen from a state medical laboratory Wednesday, apparently by someone who wanted to sell them as pets.

Authorities issued an emergency warning to prevent the infected animals from getting into the hands of unsuspecting persons.

COLOMBIA POLICE BATTLE STUDENT RIOTERS
Bogota, Colombia—Police and police in two Colombian cities Wednesday battled student rioters who punctured the tires of parked cars or set them afire.

No casualties were reported, but at least 24 rioters were arrested.

'REPORTING IN AFRICA' PRESS TOPIC
Paris—The International Press Institute today turned its attention to the problems of "Reporting in Africa" in its third and final day of the 11th assembly here.

New York — (UPI) — Stocks cut down their losses in late trading today but closed substantially lower.

Late trading features were Lockheed up about 1/2 on news it had received a contract possibly worth \$180 million for work on a nuclear rocket and Consolidated Electronics up roughly 3/4. Texas Gulf Sulfur slashed its dividend and slipped nearly 2.
