## Eagle Point Sets Sewer Assessment

Eagle Point — Eagle Point property owners who are subject to assessment for sewer use will get a letter next week advising them how much they must pay.

Included in the letter will be statements of the owner's front footage, the total he owes and how much he has already paid into the fund each month along with his water bill.

According to City Attorney Gregg Hornecker, the assessment will come to \$1.21 per frontage foot, lower than the original estimate. Construction of the sewer system is now complete.

The Eagle Point City Council also approved the budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year at the meeting Tuesday. No vote will be required again this year as the amount of the estimated budget is still within the limitation.

An estimated \$69,188 budget is proposed for the city's use this year with \$20,278.75 being an estimated amount not to be expended in 1963 but used for the sewer and water fund payments needed the following year.

Receipts estimated to be taken in by other than 1962-63 taxes amounts to \$54,281.69, leaving \$14,906.31 needed to balance the budget. It is estimated that approximately \$1,490 will not be collected in taxes or a total tax levy of \$16,396.94. The budget will be posted in three

public places in downtown Eagle Point prior to the public hearing June 5.

The public hearing will be held in conjunction with the next regular council meeting at the library room in the city hall at 8 p.m. on June 5 at which time anyone opposed or in favor of the budget will be heard.

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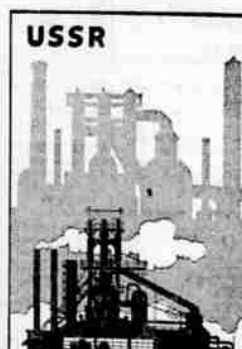
