

BOB GIBSON STOPS GIANTS

Former Globetrotter Bob Gibson has become the "stopper" of the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff because he's discovered a "new pitch."

It's called a strike.

The 6-1, 190-pound right-hander struck out 166 batters last season but had only a 13-12 record largely because he led the National league with 119 walks. He's shed the "wild man" role this year, however, with his strikeouts out-numbering his walks, 46-17, and his won-lost record improving in record fashion to 5-2.

But what's more important to the Cardinals is the fact that Gibson has been the "stopper" of three-game losing streaks.

Score in Ninth

Gibson turned in the most important victory of his big league career Thursday when he beat Billy O'Dell and the San Francisco Giants, 1-0, with a six-hit, two-walk, 10-strikeout performance. The

victory snapped both the Cardinals' three-game losing streak and the Giants' four-game winning streak.

The Cardinals scored the game's only run in the ninth on Red Schoendienst's single, pinch-runner Julian Javier's stolen base and error and Charlie James' infield hit. It was only the Giants' third loss of the season in San Francisco's Candlestick Park.

The Los Angeles Dodgers crept to within three games of the first-place Giants with a 5-4 victory over the Houston Colts, the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Cincinnati Reds, 9-6, and the Milwaukee Braves beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-2, in other NL games.

Stars for Dodgers

In the American league's only games, the New York Yankees shaded the Boston Red Sox, 2-1, and the Baltimore Orioles scored a 6-4 triumph over the Los Angeles Angels.

Wally Moon's bases-filled single in the bottom of the

10th gave the Dodgers their dramatic victory after they rallied for four ninth-inning runs to tie the score at 4-4. Houston's Jim Golden had held the Dodgers to two hits until the ninth when Moon's two-run double was the key blow of the game-tying rally. Ed Roebuck, who pitched the last two innings for the Dodgers, gained credit for his second win.

The Phillies ended their five-game losing streak and the Reds' six-game winning streak with a nine-hit attack

featuring homers by Ted Savage, Sam White and Don Demeter. Cal McLish yielded 12 hits and two walks in eight innings but won his fourth in a row for the Phillies.

The Braves routed Bob Friend with seven runs in the first inning and went on to beat the Pirates behind the eight-hit pitching of Bob Shaw. Howie Bedell's triple and Roy McMillan's double were the key blows of the Braves' big first inning.

6 A-1 Cindermen In District Meet At Klamath Falls

Southern Oregon conference athletes gather at Klamath Falls Saturday for the annual District 6 A-1 track meet. And, Grants Pass high's Cavemen are figured to run off with the lion's share of the laurels.

The Cavemen of the Climate city have run roughshod over southern Oregon opposition this spring, gaining a stature in the state which places them among the favorites in the Oregon big school titular quest. Grants Pass is the choice not only to regain the district banner it lost to Medford last year but to collect the largest number of 6 A-1 state meet berths.

Medford, Crater and Klamath Falls each have contenders for spots in the Oregon A-1 meet but GP looks to have much wealth in runners, jumpers and throwers to be seriously challenged for the district team prize.

Preliminaries are set for 10:30 a.m. and finals for 2:30 p.m.

Much of Medford's success depends on the condition of sprinter and broad jumper Jim Hill who pulled a muscle two weeks ago. And, how well Crater does will depend on how much the Comets have shaken off a bugaboo of colds and sore throats.

Toews Beats State Mark

Best performances by Southern Oregon conference athletes this season show six district records to be threatened. These are in the high and low hurdles, the half-mile, the high jump, the pole vault and the javelin. Respective district marks are 14.6, 19.6, 2.01, 6 feet 2 inches, 12-11 1/2 and 208-8.

There could be a wholesale assault on the half-mile standard. Steve Toews, Medford, ran the 880 yards last week in 1:56.3. Medford's Jim Snodgrass has toured the half in 1:59.2 and GP's Rod Waterman has a 2:00 flat time.

Times of both Toews and Montgomery are better than the 50-year-old state track meet record. The mark of 1:56.8 was established in 1912 by Ven Windnagle, Washington, high, Portland. Toews today was treating a sore spot on one foot.

The Cavemen's Bob Wilson has run the high hurdles in 14.4 and Gil Smith of Grants Pass has a 19.5 clocking in the lows. Also for the Cavemen Bob Shephard has high jumped 6-3 1/2, Gary and Vic Van Koten have cleared 13 feet in the pole vault and Steve Ausland has a 209-foot javelin heave in the early season.

Ausland injured a foot a few weeks back and has come back gradually to the point where he appears ready to exceed 200 feet again.

One thing that must be considered in the quest for records—what effect the Klamath Falls higher altitude and colder climate will have on performances. Jerry Acklen of the Grants Pass Daily Courier says that "performances at Klamath Falls will probably be less than they have been in meets on this side of the mountain."

Medford's Hill has tied one of the two oldest district marks in the books with a 22.2 in the 220. Since injuring a hamstring muscle he has just been taking it easy, building toward the district meet.

Fischer Bolsters Beavers

Portland's Bill Fischer doesn't take first prize, but he deserves an honorable mention for versatility in pitching three scoreless innings and cracking a three-run homer in the same game.

Starter Bob Colligan won the credit for Portland's 11-3 victory over Tacoma Thursday night. Fischer came to the mound and hit the only home run of the game, both in the seventh inning.

The Beavers batted 15 hits at Portland Thursday night, compressed nine runs into the sixth and seventh innings and ended their three-game series with Tacoma.

Ron Herbel took the loss for the Giants.

Spokane's Thad Tillotson made a more conventional and probably more needed contribution than Fischer's exploits when he pitched Spokane to a three-hit, 2-0 victory over Seattle. Bobby Prescott slammed a solo homer in the seventh inning to end a scoreless battle between Tillotson and Seattle's Pete Smith.

The league-trailing Indians picked up another run in the eighth inning on a single, an error, an intentional walk and a sacrifice fly by Nate Oliver.

Thursday's win gave the Indians two of the four games in their series against second-place Seattle. Spokane is scheduled to play at Salt Lake City today and Seattle goes to Portland.

Performance standards not previously mentioned, for state meet entry if not placing first or second in district are: 15.0 in the high hurdles and 20.1 in the lows, 51.5 in the 440, 2:00 in the half, 4:30 in the mile, 1:31 in the relay, 53 feet in the shot put, 150 feet in the discus, 190 feet in the javelin and 6 feet in the high jump. No more than two athletes from one school can qualify in one event.

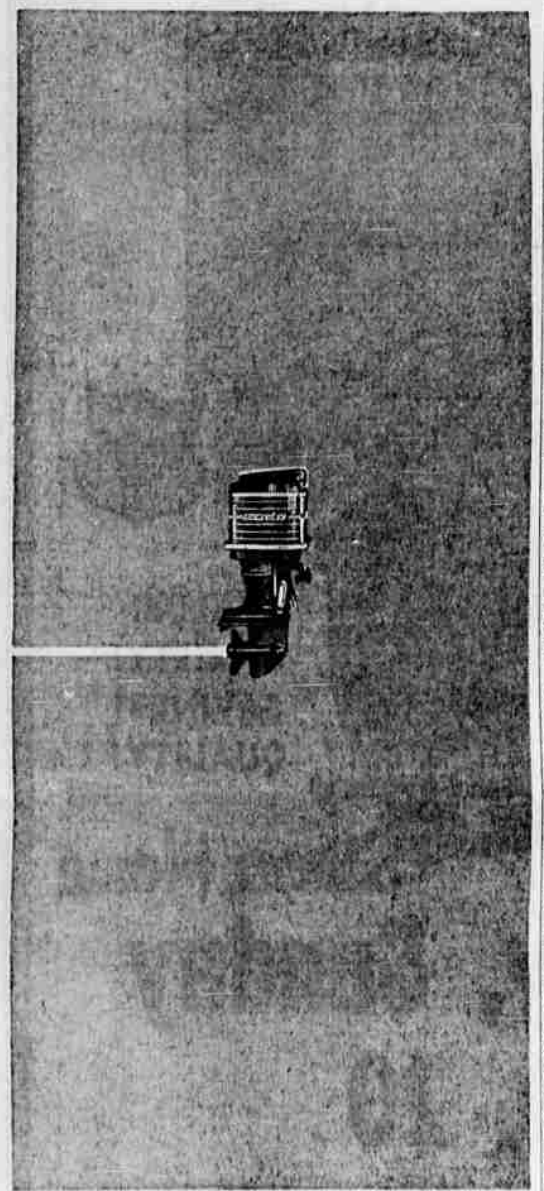
