Woods, Water, Wildlife

The Oregon State Game Commission has recently published a statement of its economic problem in attempting to carry on a program of meeting the expanding needs of the hunters and fishermen of the state. The statement is entitled, "Revenue vs. Needs," and in it the commission attempts to define the problem clearly enough so that those concerned may help in achieving some solution to it.

ACHIEVEMENTS — The existing program has been developed over the past 15 years and has some positive results to indicate that it is on a sound basis.

The yield of deer has tripled, elk doubled, the total yield of upland birds has diversified as well as increased, and resident fisheries have substantially increased. It should also be pointed out that declines in antelope and certain stocks of fish have occurred.

Through careful and biologically sound introductions, the total resource base has been broadened and diversified by establishing species not previously available to the Oregon hunter and angler. Habitat not previously supporting important populations is now doing so. These accomplishments have not just happened—they are the result of careful, planned, and systematically executed management practices of a varied and complex nature.

Furthermore, since 1960 the number of hunters and anglers has increased from 388,000 to 670,000. Accelerated land and water use activities for other purposes have taken place throughout the state which have posed formidable problems to the maintenance of fish and game stocks.

NOT ENOUGH — The accomplishments of the commission cost money, and the primary source of money is the license monies from the hunters and fishermen of the state. In projecting the needs of a program that must maintain and increase the available fish and game resources, the commission finds that present revenues will not meet the needs. Since it is not the policy of the commission to operate in the "red," it feels that an additional source of income is necessary. An increase in license fees is felt to be the easiest solution to the problem, but the commission realizes that this decision

Marks in last week end's qualifying meets point to the possibility that records could tumble in at least four events on Saturday in the District 6 A-2 track and field meet on Saturday at Southern Oregon college's Fuller field in Ashland.

Times in two races in the Rogue league meet and two in the Umpqua valley loop affair last week were better than district standards. Paul Elliott, St. Mary's high, ran the high hurdles in 14.95 and the lows in 20.4 at Ashland. Ed Cadman, Myrtle Creek, ran the mile in 4:30.6 and the 880-yard race in 2:01.25 at Winston.

Records for the respective events are 15.3, 20.8, 4:37.3 and 2:01.9.

12 Schools Represented — Athletes from 12 schools, headed by St. Mary's and Myrtle Creek, Rogue and Umpqua league champs, respectively, will contend on the college field. Other schools will be Rogue River, Phoenix, Eagle Point, Lakeview, Henley, Sutherlin, Glendale, Douglas, Riddle and Glendale.

Lakeview high is defending team champion of the district. The Honkers, who nosed out Myrtle Creek by one point, for the 1961 toga, were third in last week's Rogue meet.

The athletes tomorrow, however, may have their sights set more on qualifying for the state meet rather than on the team title. Those who place first or second in district meet events or who equal or better certain standards will get trips to Corvallis next week end.

A fifth record seems threatened Saturday if Eagle Point high jumper Lew Whipple is

healthy. He has cleared 6 feet 1 inch this season in the high jump. District mark is 5-11.

Defending

Cadman in the mile, Jim Griener, Lakeview in the 100-yard sprint, Barry Frantz, Rogue River, in the 440 and 220, and Larry Taylor in the 880 are 1961 individual district titlists who will be defending. In last week end's subdistrict engagements Griener had the best 100 time. Taylor's time was third best in the 880 and Frantz had the second best marks in the 440 and 220.

Frantz, who set a district quarter-mile record of 30.7 last season, has a 51.7 clocking this season, which is better than last Saturday's 52.3 by Bob Lucas in qualifying for Myrtle Creek.

Thincleds who took seconds last year in district to qualify for state and who are aiming for return trips to Corvallis in the same events include Charles Cossey, Lakeview, in the broad jump, Whipple in the high jump, Theron Stehl, Rogue River, in the shot put, Gary Reynolds, Lakeview, in the discus, Griener in the 220, Cadman in the 880 and Lakeview in the relay.

Participants in the 6 A-2 meet are those who placed first, second or third in the subdistrict meets, or who placed lower but are alternates for qualifiers who for reason can not take part this Saturday.
