Science Teaching in High Schools Said Making Advances

Corvallis—Science teaching in American high schools is making dramatic advances but it is also undergoing some significant changes, according to an Oregon State university leader who recently was named president-elect of the 20,000-member National Science Teachers association.

Most any parent can testify that students are going faster and farther in science than be-

fore, but studies are different in many ways too, according to Dr. Stanley E. Williamson, head of the department of science education.

The laboratory, more than ever before, is the "heart" of the high school science program. And in the laboratory, students do more—or should—than just repeat standard experiments that verify scientific principles, Williamson said. They do experiments in which the answers are not known, but have to be found out.

Not An Experiment
If the student knows the answer before he gets into the laboratory, it isn't much of an experiment, Williamson commented.

A higher percentage of high school students are electing to take science courses than in past years, he pointed out, a fact that is perhaps most encouraging of all to science educators.

The dread of science is slowly being replaced with an awareness of the importance and excitement of science and a feeling that science is for everyone, Williamson believes.

Science courses are being constantly upgraded, Williamson pointed out. New course materials have been developed by selected college and secondary teachers under grants from the National Science Foundation.

Tested in High Schools
These are tested in high schools in various areas and the wrinkles ironed out before being made available to all schools, Williamson explained.

The big problem is getting enough well-trained teachers to teach the classes, and getting adequate science teaching facilities in the schools. The demand for good teachers far exceeds the supply, Williamson reported.

Teachers must have excellent preparation to handle the advanced new materials and to challenge the science-conscious students, he observed. Night, summer and academic-year teacher institutes sponsored by the National Science Foundation are helping out greatly in this respect, Williamson noted.

Under the institute program, the teachers get special study grants to help defray the costs of the advanced training.

The science teachers themselves have shown great enthusiasm and determination in improving science in the classroom, Williamson added.

Foundation Grants \$88,000 for Study

Eugene—A unique, collaborative study aimed at reconstructing the total environment of ancient mammals in southeastern Oregon and adjoining areas has attracted an \$88,000 National Science Foundation grant for Dr. J. Arnold Shottwell of the University of Oregon.

Dr. Shottwell is assistant director of the University's Museum of Natural History and associate professor of biology and geology.

Included in the grant is \$40,000 for the construction of a new laboratory building, which will be used for the analysis of fossil pollens and sediments. The one-story, 30-by-75-foot structure is tentatively planned for the northeast corner of the physical plant area, across the millrace from the main campus.

The remaining \$48,000 of the grant will be used for a new intensive three-pronged approach to Dr. Shottwell's long-range study in paleoecology—recreating the total picture of the world in which the early mammals of the Northern Great Basin lived. The university is contributing \$30,000 in matching funds for the research program.

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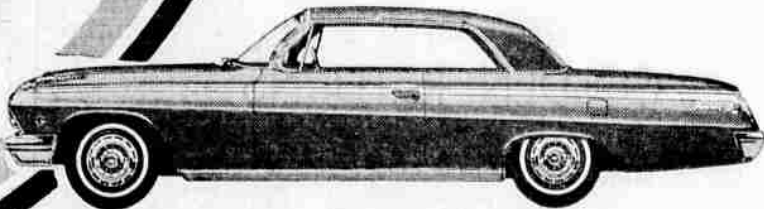
