

Greek Money Survives Foul Claim To Win Preakness Over Ridan

Baltimore — (UPI) — Greek Money survived a torrid stretch battle, and a foul claim that backfired, to win the \$188,300 Preakness Stakes Saturday. The stewards recommended that Manny Ycaza, who claimed the foul, be suspended indefinitely.

Since the Pimlico meeting ended with the running of the ninth race Saturday, the stewards were powerless to act against Ycaza although they first took action. Instead they recommended Ycaza's suspension to the Maryland racing commission, which will take any necessary action.

The stewards said Ycaza tried to hold back Greek Money while riding Ridan. It recalled the 1933 finish of the Kentucky Derby in which Herb Fisher and Don Meade crossed the finish line slugging at one another with their whips. However, Greek Money's jockey, intent upon getting Greek Money home, apparently did not realize Ycaza was trying to elbow him back.

Greek Money charged home a nose in front of Ridan in one of the most dramatic finishes in the history of the Maryland classic.

The two horses battled all alone for there was a big gap of five and one-half lengths back to Roman Line, who finished third in the field of 11.

Decidedly, record breaking winner of the Kentucky Derby two weeks ago, started a big move from far back in the field on the final bend but he had no punch in the stretch and trailed home a poor eighth.

Jaipur, who wound up a co-favorite with Ridan, also ran out of gas and finished even farther back, in 10th place.

This was the third win in four races this year for Greek Money, who carried the blue

and gold silks of Donald P. Ross' Brandywine stable. In his previous races this year, Greek Money had not run against standout horses.

He remained in the east while Decidedly lowered

Whilaway's Kentucky Derby record by a full second but he was ready for the touring triple crown hopefuls Saturday at old Pimlico.

Greek Money battled his way to the front with an

eight of a mile to go in the mile and three-sixteenths race. He dug in courageously to stay there, for Ridan refused to give up and fought back desperately.

Lady luck rode with Rotz, who finished second aboard Globemaster in this race a year ago when Carry Back came from out of the clouds to win.

Greek Money paid his supporters \$23.90, \$9.40 and \$6.00 across the board. He won \$135,800 to raise his life time earnings to \$190,206.

Ridan returned \$5.00 and \$3.20 while Roman Line paid \$5.80.

Vimy Ridge was fourth, followed by Sunrise County, Greek Hornet, Crimson Satan, Decidedly, Flying Johnny, Jaipur and Prego.

Thigh Tear Suffered By Mantle

New York — (UPI) — Pain-wracked Mickey Mantle was back in the hospital Saturday with a muscle tear in his right thigh that could mean he'll be lost to the Yankees until at least June 1 — or maybe even longer.

"There is no way of knowing how long he'll be out," said Dr. Sidney Gaynor, the Yankees' team physician. "We won't be able to tell much for a day or two."

Nevertheless, officials at Lenox Hill hospital, where Mantle spent the night, said his injury "appears to be reasonably severe," and Yankee manager Ralph Houk was resigned to the loss of his star center-fielder for an indefinite period.

Mantle suffered his latest injury with dramatic suddenness during the ninth inning of Friday night's 4-3 defeat at the hands of the Minnesota Twins.

There were two out and the Yankees had the potential tying run of second base when Dick Stigman relieved winner Don Lee for the Twins. Mantle swung at Stigman's first pitch with all he had. The ball was hit so sharply it nearly knocked down shortstop Zoilo Versalles.

Versalles fumbled the ball momentarily, then made a fine throw from deep short to first base. Mantle was streaking down the base line for all he was worth.

Yankees Move Back Into 1st Place Tie

The New York Yankees moved back into a first place tie with the Cleveland Indians in the American league race Saturday by edging the Minnesota Twins, 2-1, behind the three-hit pitching of Ralph Terry.

Terry, now 5-4, struck out seven, did not walk a batter and drove in the Yankees' first run. Harmon Killebrew accounted for the Twins' only run with his seventh homer of the season in the fourth inning.

The Detroit Tigers scored five runs in the ninth inning to wallop the Indians, 9-3. Don Mossi limited the Indians to seven hits and struck out seven but he needed relief help from Jim Bunning in the eighth after Chuck Essegian and Gene Green homered to cut Detroit's deficit to 4-3.

Ed Charles collected three hits, including a home run, and drove in three runs to pace the Kansas City Athletics to an 8-4 victory over the Washington Senators. Norm Bass relieved Art Dittmar after the Senators gained a 3-0 lead in the third inning and limited Washington to six hits the rest of the way.

A three-run homer by Boog Powell and a two-run blast by Charley Lau in the seventh inning carried the Baltimore Orioles to an 11-8 triumph over the Chicago White Sox. Dick Hall, who took over for Baltimore starter Steve Barber in the fourth inning, was the winner. The loss went to Russ Kemmerer.

The Los Angeles Angels downed the Boston Red Sox, 6-5, on a run-scoring single by Bob Rodgers in the 10th inning. Rookie catcher Bob Tillman of the Red Sox homered in his first major league at-bat. Other homers were hit by Leon Wagner and Billy Moran of the Angels and Boston's Carroll Hardy.

McCormick Comes Through for SF

Southpaw Mike McCormick returned to winning form and Willie Mays snapped out of a batting slump with four hits Saturday to help the San Francisco Giants bomb the Houston Colts 10-2.

McCormick, relegated to the brief relief appearances since losing his only 1962 start on April 17, won his first decision although retiring for a pinchhitter after hurling eight innings. He walked only two batters and fanned five while scattering nine hits.

McCormick's task was made easier by three tremendous home runs that produced five tallies in the seventh inning to put the game out of sight.

Mays and Orlando Cepeda each hit his 11th homer of the season and catcher Ed Bailey blasted his eighth as the Giants carved out a 9-0 lead.

Mays, who went into the game batting only .262, knocked in the first Giant run in the four-run third inning with a double. He singled in his next time at bat and then in the seventh added his homer, a 380-foot shot over the right field fence. In the eighth he singled again, driving in his

third run, as the Giants scored their final run.

Frank Thomas hit a homer, triple and single to lead the New York Mets to a 6-5 victory over the Milwaukee Braves. Thomas' triple touched off a four-run eighth inning rally which wiped out a 5-2 deficit.

Art Mahaffey's first major league homer produced the decisive run as the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Chicago Cubs, 7-5. Mahaffey pitched an eight-inning and struck out eight to win his third game.
