Poppy Day Is Announced Here

The American Legion auxiliary of the Medford post will sell handmade poppies on May 25 and 26 in downtown Medford.

They have been designated Poppy day and permission has been obtained by the auxiliary from the City of Medford to sell the flowers. The Home Appliance company, 115 East Main street, will be headquarters for the poppy sale.

Distribution of the poppies is handled entirely by volunteer workers serving without pay.

All money received from the sale goes directly for aid to disabled veterans or members of their families. Most poppy funds remain in the communities in which they are raised, being spent by local posts and auxiliaries for community relief work. A small percentage may be used for rehabilitation and child welfare through the state level.

Traditionally, there is not a fixed price for the poppy. Donations of any amount are acceptable.

Tomato Crust

Use canned tomato sauce instead of egg for breading fish fillets, and serve with more of the sauce. Season fillets with salt and pepper to taste, dredge in flour, dip into tomato sauce, then roll in bread or cracker crumbs. Chill fillets in single layer for 1 hour before frying. Fry in preheated 350-degree deep fat. One (8 ounce) can of sauce makes enough for 1 (1 pound) package of frozen fish.

Biography Of Bach Club Topic

Ashland - "The Music Master," biography of Johann Sebastian Bach by Theodore Kleinhaus, was reviewed by Mrs. Angela Sharyon at the last meeting of Ashland Study club. A 1 o'clock dessert luncheon preceded the program at the home of Mrs. Faith McCullough.

Kleinhaus spent many years in research to authenticate his fascinating story of the famous musician and succeeded in bringing to life one of the most lovable characters in musical history.

The Bach biography throws a new light on the German composer, showing him as a delightful family man, a tender husband and generous father, and withal a man irked by the harassments of town councils and musical committees. Despite disappointments and sorrows he maintained a dauntless spirit of optimism.

Bach received little recognition during his lifetime but is now acknowledged to be the master composer of all time. Several of his works were played on the stereo-hi-fi during Mrs. Sharyon's talk. Among them were parts of the Brandenburg concerto, Air for G string, Concerto in D Minor, and organ preludes played by Albert Schweitzer.

At the conclusion of the book review Mrs. J. W. McCoy, a guest and former club member, added several interesting facts about the Bach family. Last summer she made the musical festivals tour in Europe and visited many historic centers.

Following a short business session conducted by the president, Mrs. R. Drew Lamb, she presented the half-hour selected subject, choosing to speak on "Japan, Past, Present and Future." The traditions and history of a people conquered and then rehabilitated and set on the path to economic recovery by their conquerors furnishes food for serious thought, she said. What Japan's role will be in world affairs should be of great concern to the United States as communism infiltrates the Orient.

Expert Lists Kitchen Needs Of Newlyweds

Planning a shower for a bride?

Why not make it a kitchen "wardrobe" - just what the well-equipped cook will need, suggests Miss Bernice Strawn, Oregon State university extension specialist.

Avoid embarrassment of receiving duplicates of some popular items and drawing "blanks" on others, she advises. Start with this basic list from which guests can choose. Two or more can double up on the larger items.

To start housekeeping, the bride will need: sauce pans with covers in these sizes: 1-pint for reheating leftovers, 1-quart for cooking vegetables, 2-quart or larger for use when she has guests.

A 3 to 4 quart Dutch oven is useful for stews, whole chickens, and spaghetti, says the home economist. Skillets and fry pans in 8 inch and 10 inch size are handy. The larger size should have a lid for frying chicken and skillet meals.

A good coffee maker - percolator, drip or vacuum type - is probably on the bride's list. Type depends on the couple's preferences. An electric one that makes at least 4 cups at a time is suggested.

For use in the oven, a bride can use an 8 or 9 inch pie pan which is also handy for rolls, biscuits and odd jobs. A 9-inch square cake pan is just right for many cake mixes and baked desserts, reminds the OSU equipment specialist. For casserole dishes, the 2-quart size in a pretty design is always a pleaser.

Miss Strawn says every kitchen should have a roasting pan about 12 by 9 by 2 inches. Add to this a cookie sheet and perhaps a small tea kettle and the bride will be cooking on all four burners.

For those with limited money to spend for shower gifts consider these items - measuring spoon set, measuring cups, set of four measuring cups, lemon juicer, rotary beater, long handled fork, narrow spatula or pancake turner.
