Protests Bill on Young Farm Labor

Salem—A five-man delegation from the Western Oregon farm community of Dayton has appealed to the governor's office to help kill a bill in Congress that would restrict the employment of teen-agers on farms.

The bill has passed the Senate and may come up in the House next week.

One of the five-State Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton)—said enactment would be "a disaster to Oregon farmers."

The bill would require that children between the ages of 12 and 14 work only on farms within 25 miles of their permanent homes.

Also, parents would either have to work at the same farm, or youngsters would have to have written permission from the parent if the parents didn't work there.

Hubert Wilson and L. F. Bourland, Dayton farmers, said many youngsters between 12 and 14 come from Oregon and from the Portland coast to help with the strawberry and bean harvests in Yamhill county.
