

Regional Roundup

Those of us who have been to natural history museums in the major cities of the country probably recall seeing displays of stuffed animals portrayed in their natural setting. These displays, called habitats, usually are composed of a painted backdrop and foreground foliage designed to resemble a particular scene. Stuffed animals of the sort usually found in that part of the world are then assembled on the stage.

In many museums these habitats portray scenes from faraway places, but shortly a museum is scheduled to open here in the Rogue Valley which will portray habitat scenes that are very close to home. It will be known as the Southern Oregon Museum of Natural Resources and it is scheduled to open June 16 in the community building of the Lithia Park Auto court in Ashland. We were privileged to take a tour of the place with the Ashland Chamber of Commerce membership yesterday.

Three habitat scenes will be produced originally, one now almost complete of a scene near Mt. Ashland in summer. It will show a bobcat which has just caught a mountain quail. Other birds will be shown scolding the bobcat. A second habitat will show a scene along Bear creek in winter while a third is scheduled to be a scene of the Ashland burn, to show how it is growing back.

Two other habitats are proposed for sometime in the future, with completion perhaps two years from now. One would show a scene of beavers with Mt. McLoughlin in the background, the other a moonlight scene of a mountain lion and two deer in the Siskiyou. Farther in the future is planned a spectacular 150-foot panoramic habitat showing all of southern Oregon from the coast to the Snake river.

Other displays at the museum will include glass cases of stuffed birds and insects that are found in the area and also minerals. In addition, a live beehive has been placed in a glass case for display.

Artist and Taxidermist. Founders and proprietors of the museum are David Hagerbaumer, an artist, and L. I. Haptonstall, a taxidermist. Hagerbaumer has been in museum work since 1947. He previously was with the state museum at Carson City, Nev. and the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. He moved to Oregon five years ago and felt a desire to portray this area in museum form. The two men are financing the entire project themselves. They expect that there will be an admission charge to the museum but emphasize that school children in groups during the school year will be admitted free.

Hagerbaumer and Haptonstall certainly appear to have put in an enormous amount of work on the project. To preserve some tree branches in one of the habitats, for instance, they had to take each individual needle off the branch, preserve it and put it back on, a job requiring something like 150 hours.

Stadium Drive Tops \$19,000

Central Point — The Crater High school stadium fund drive has reached \$19,000. Francis C. Ayers, chairman of the finance committee revealed yesterday.

This amount is enough to pay for the grandstand, not including the roof, Ayers indicated, and so backers of the project are getting ready to secure bids on construction of the stadium itself.

Goal for the fund drive was set originally at \$30,000.

Funds are being raised in two ways, through outright donations and through sale of season tickets at \$50 good for three years.

Donations have been the more popular, Ayers said. "We've just about reached our original goal on donations," he explained. Over 200 tickets have been sold, but this figure is only about half of what was originally anticipated.

A huge mound of earth has already been assembled in preparation for construction of the grandstand on top of it. Moving of the earth accomplished an additional purpose. In order to get it, workmen leveled a hill north of Crater High school, giving the school room for additional parking space.

Youth Building Said Too Costly
