Silverton Woman Ordered To Trial

Salem—(UPI)—Mrs. Josephine Goodwin, 38, Silverton, has been ordered held for trial on a charge of first degree murder for the sledge hammer slaying of her husband Archie in 1959.

Circuit Judge Val D. Sloper ordered the woman transferred from the State Hospital to the Marion county jail after he ruled that Mrs. Goodwin is now legally sane.

Mrs. Goodwin is charged with fatally beating her husband June 8, 1959. She was confined to the state hospital immediately after the slaying.

Three psychiatrists testified that the woman now is legally competent to stand trial.

Senses of Smell, Taste Said Better on Tuesday

London—(UPI)—You smell better at 11 a.m. on Tuesday morning.

With your nose, of course. Your sense of taste also is better at that hour on that day. And this odd item of "organolectic" information, as it is called, is due to the curiosity of a group of chemists as to how we identify tastes and odors.

Frederick Wells, one of the expert "noses" of the perfume industry, told about experiments in the Naarden chemical laboratories in Holland and their rather surprising results.

The experiments were intended to show whether the nose and tongue can identify odors and tastes by themselves or whether they need each other—and the help of the eyes as well.

"Neither the nose alone nor the taste alone were particularly reliable," Wells said. "It seems astonishing, but 15 out of 25 participants could not identify the smell of tobacco when they were blindfolded."

"Some of the wrong answers were coffee, cocoa, tea, water and barley."

Family Court Plan For Oregon Studied

Portland—(UPI)—A possible system of family courts for Oregon will be explored in a study ordered by the State Council on Crime and Delinquency.

Chairman William J. Moshofsky said the study will be made by the national council. Family courts would combine under single jurisdiction all cases involving family controversy, divorce and juvenile delinquency.

Moshofsky said the 1963 legislature will be asked for study funds.

Portland Collision Leaves Three Dead

Portland—(UPI)—Three persons died after a three-car crash in north Portland Tuesday night. Six others were injured. All were of Portland.

The victims were Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Curfman, 55 and 53, and Patti Ann Seller, 17. Mrs. Curfman and the younger girl were pronounced dead on arrival at a hospital. Curfman died several hours later.

Miss Seller and three of the injured were Roosevelt High School students returning from a high school dinner. Mrs. Curfman's daughter, Glenna Marie Burgess, 34, was reported in serious condition.

In fair condition were Kenneth Oliver, 18; William Hubert, 18; Jack Elliott, 24. Gary Waterman, 22, and Bonnie Rae Clark, 18.

Police said the injured were scattered over the street at the scene of the accident and it took several hours to determine in which cars the victims had been riding.

Gen. Clay's Son Wounded in Action

Saigon, South Viet Nam—(UPI)—Lt. Col. Frank B. Clay, son of Gen. Lucius D. Clay, President Kennedy's special Berlin adviser, was wounded today in action against Communist guerrillas.

A U.S. military spokesman said three other Army officers also were wounded in the same action on the Plain of Reeds in Kieng Phong Province 75 miles southwest of Saigon.

The spokesman said that an Army master sergeant was wounded in a separate incident when he stepped on a Communist-planted land mine while leading a group of South Vietnamese rangers on a "training exercise" about 20 miles northwest of Saigon.

The sergeant's name was not given.

None of the wounded men was reported injured seriously.

Portland—(UPI)—Award of a \$1,000 scholarship to Ronald LeRoy Daley, a sophomore at the University of Portland and a graduate of St. Mary's High School of Medford, was announced Tuesday by the Jackson Foundation. Daley's parents now live near Yakima, Wash.

Zorin Says Action Could Lead To War

Geneva—(UPI)—Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin said today the dispatch of American troops to Thailand "could lead to war—and not a small war either."

Commenting on a Swedish claim in the 17-nation Disarmament Conference that advance notification of troop movements could lessen tensions, he said:

"Mr. Kennedy gave us advance notice of the fact that he was sending troops to Thailand. Did that decrease tension? No. It could even lead to an explosion."

"This could lead to war—and not a small war either. We should not harbor any illusions that advance notification will stop war. Others will send troops."

"A satellite employing a Blue Scout combination was launched today by the Air Force," the two-line announcement said.

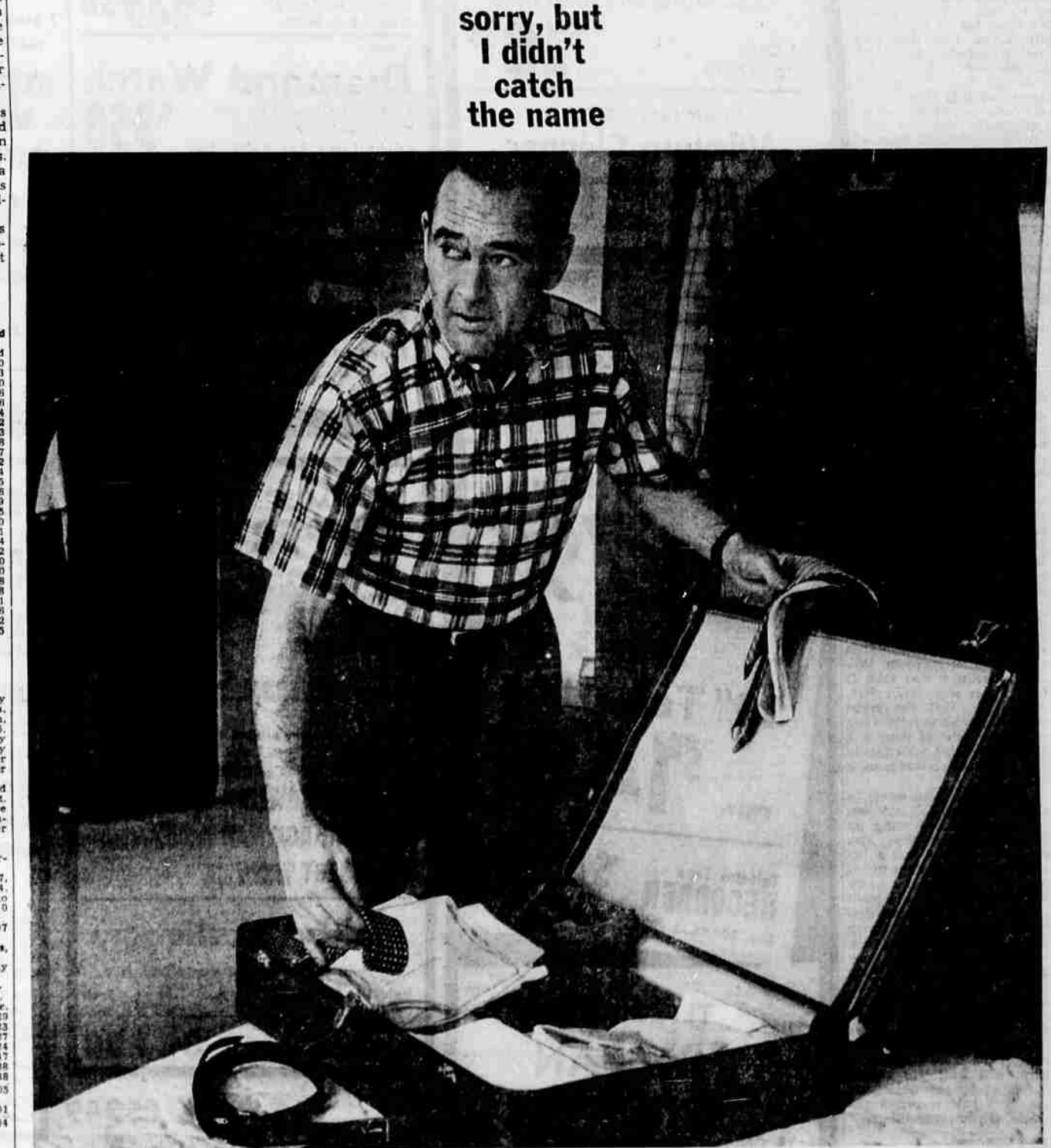
The Air Force would add only that the launch was made from this Pacific naval mis-
