Water Main Planned From Barneburg Hill To Stewart Avenue

The Medford water commission has authorized Medford Water Superintendent Robert L. Lee to proceed with the design and acquisition of right of way for installation of a 24-inch water main from Barneburg Hill to Stewart Avenue via Garfield St.

Funds for the installation have been allocated in the department's 1962 - 63 fiscal budget, Lee said, and tentative plans are to call for bids and let the contract by late summer this year.

This would allow for completion of the project by the summer of 1963 so it would be available to provide improved water pressures for heavy summer usage, Lee noted.

Result of Studies

The decision to go ahead with the project comes as a result of two studies of Medford's water distribution system. The first was completed in 1947, and on the basis of it an extensive feeder main system was constructed.

The second report was compiled this year by Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, consulting engineers, and was recently presented to the water commission.

The latter study indicates storage capacity in the water system is at present deficient by 5 million gallons. It also indicates that by 1966, the distribution storage capacity should be 23.6 million, or about 10 million gallons more than the present capacity.

Three Requirements

The storage needs of the Medford water system, according to the report, are made up from three requirements:

1. The storage used for meeting the peak demand;
2. The reserve storage for extinguishing of a major fire;
3. Sufficient emergency storage to meet the needs of the system on a reduced demand basis in the event of a partial failure of the supply system.

Among the conclusions of the study is the opinion that the storage to be constructed in connection with the planned future water supply from the Rogue river will be sufficient until the new supply becomes the principle source of water for Medford. When that will occur is not known since the need is premised on expanded population growth within the area.

Effective Location

Another conclusion from the study is that the most effective location for the additional storage facilities would be in the vicinity of Dark Hollow rd. near its intersection with South Stage rd. Estimated cost of the project is \$412,360.

Components Plant Slated at Portland

Portland - (UPI) - Plans for an aircraft components manufacturing plant here have been disclosed by the firm which recently acquired control of Iron Fireman Company.

The proposed 250,000-square foot plant would be located at an industrial tract near the Portland airport. Final approval is expected next week at a meeting of the Electronic Specialty Co. board of directors. The Los Angeles firm recently acquired control of Iron Fireman, a spokesman indicated the firm had the plant in mind before the merger with Iron Fireman was completed.

Union, Grocers Continue Meeting

Portland - (UPI) - Negotiations continued until 10 a.m. Tuesday between representatives of Food and Drug Clerks Local 1092 and the Oregon Independent Retail Grocers association.

The dispute involves most of the food stores in the Portland metropolitan area. Federal Mediator Leroy Smith said the meeting Tuesday was recessed subject to a call to reconvene within a day or two.

Union members May 9 voted to reject a contract offer made by employer groups and voted also for authority for the negotiating committee to call a strike if considered necessary.

Morse Foreign Aid Amendments Voted

Washington - (UPI) - Four amendments by Oregon Sen. Wayne Morse were among changes made in the \$4.6 billion foreign aid bill before it was approved Tuesday by the Senate Foreign Relations committee.

One Morse amendment was added to the extensively discussed section of the bill that would suspend foreign aid for countries that seize American property without taking steps toward fair compensation. The Morse amendment provides arbitration as alternative means of settling the dispute.

Another Morse change says funds for the Latin American Alliance for Progress after 1963 will be allocated only for loans, instead of loans and grants.

A third Morse amendment calls for maintenance of aid to India at present levels. The final change by the Oregon Democrat cut President Kennedy's request for contingency funds from \$400 million to \$300 million.

The final foreign aid measure was approved by the committee 14-3.

Prineville Paper Plant Vandalized

Prineville, Ore. - (UPI) - Police are investigating an act of vandalism at the weekly Central Oregonian.

Police said that sometime Sunday 15 or 20 large chunks of broken concrete and rock were thrown through the rear pressroom window of the newspaper. Shattered glass was thrown through the main press on which the newspaper is published but no major damage was inflicted.

Recently the home of Ron Swift, young editor of the newspaper, was heavily damaged by fire that police said had been deliberately set.

Volume of Tourist Mail Sets Record

Salem - (UPI) - The Oregon Highway Department said today it has received the largest volume of mail in its history from out of state visitors asking for information.

State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said Monday's mail included more than 5,500 letters and cards from prospective tourists. Most of the inquiries came as a result of national newspaper, magazine, radio and television advertising telling about attractions of the state, Cooper said.

EGYPT BANS TWIST

Cairo, U.A.R. - (UPI) - The twist, the Western world's answer to the Egyptian belly dance, has been banned in dance halls in this country. The Egyptian National Guidance Ministry ordered vice squads Tuesday to enforce the ban.

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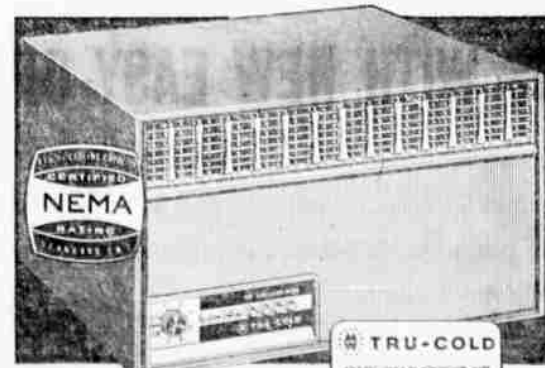
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Mysterious Shootings Unnerve Community

Walla Walla - (UPI) - Life has been pretty uncertain the past few months for a resident of the Dixie-Dry Creek area of the Blue Mountains east of here. His neighbors, sharing his apprehension have asked for additional law enforcement protection.

John Tracy, 59, has lived in fear since last October when he began dodging bullets from the gun of an unknown assailant and receiving threatening telephone calls.

Tracy, who lives with his brother Martin on a farm near here, has twice been wounded in the leg and on one occasion went into hiding for a brief period.

Other residents of the Dixie-Dry Creek area complain that their region was rapidly becoming one of "frayed nerves."

They claimed only one deputy sheriff had been working on the case.

Howard Reser, chairman of the county commissioners, said, "if the sheriff needs an emergency appropriation, we'll go along with it."

Meanwhile, the shooting has continued and apprehension mounts in the little community.
