AFL Future Bleak After Suit Fails

San Francisco - (UP) - The future of the American Football league looked bleak, indeed, today in the wake of the failure of the anti-trust suit against the seasoned National league.

So bleak, in fact, that it would appear that some of the men involved must be specifically trying to get rid of their money. How else can one account for some of the statements from American league club owners?

"We have high hopes of breaking even during the 1963 season," says Baron Hilton, owner of the San Diego Chargers.

Hilton claims that his club failed to meet expenses during the 1962 campaign despite the fact that the team's home attendance averaged nearly 30,000 per game, which was near capacity.

While About Raiders
And if Hilton can't break even with that attendance, what is going to happen at Oakland this year? The Raiders are planning to play in a new, temporary park seating 22,000. If they fill home dates then they, ostensibly, would still be losing a bundle of money. Last year they averaged only about 5,000 per game attendance, playing mostly at Candlestick in San Francisco.

Robert L. Osborne, treasurer of the club, announced that the team dropped \$619,283.38 last year. He owned 17 per cent of the controlling interest (of 51 per cent) and his personal losses for the year were \$139,808.26. And he has sold his interest for \$10,000.

It is probable that the Raiders were the biggest financial dud in the league last year. But the Denver Broncos, New York Titans, Boston Patriots and others must be taking a financial wallop, also.

If the league had won the \$10 million suit against the NFL, and the clubs had split up the proceeds, they still would have lost money, over the two-year period. Osborne figures his two-year excursion into the land of sports cost him, personally, more than \$200,000.

Oregon Staters Aim at Mark

Oregon State University, Corvallis - Oregon State's sprint medley team will be out to establish a new world's record at the Modesto relays next week end, Coach Sam Bell said Monday.

The existing mark is 3:17.8, set by Illinois in 1959. Last year Oregon State recorded a 3:18.4 at Modesto, second best ever run.

Bob Johnson, Far West champion, will run the 440, Lynn Eves and Gary Comer will each run the 220 and Norman Monroe the 880. Chief competition there will come from Texas Southern, Santa Clara Youth Village and the Southern California Striders.

George Kerr, former Olympian who is doing graduate work at OSU now, was on that Illinois team in 1959 that broke the world record in the sprint medley. Kerr will enter the open 880 at Modesto, along with Norm Hoffman from the Staters Track and Field team and Ian Colpitts from the OSU Rooks.
