

Grant Given OSU To Continue Study In Bacteria Work

Corvallis—Research at Oregon State University on radiation resistant bacteria and the possibilities for developing a radiation protective substance for man from them has drawn a \$15,000 grant renewal from the U.S. Public Health Service.

The new grant covers the period through August and will permit intensification of studies this summer. The Public Health Service has helped finance the work for the past five years.

Announcement in February by the OSU microbiologists of their work in protecting mice against radiation damage with a solution prepared from the bacteria drew international attention. Dr. A. W. Anderson is project leader. Working with him is Dr. Paul R. El-ther, chairman of the microbiology department.

Bacteria Discovered
The bacteria, discovered while OSU scientists were working on methods of preserving meat by radiation in 1956, can withstand 10,000 times the atomic radiation dose fatal to man.

White mice injected with a solution made from the bacteria are surviving doses of 800 reentgens of radiation in the OSU work. Fatal dosage for man, and mice, is considered to be approximately 650 reentgens.

Survival of injected mice ranges from 30 to 80 per cent, a variation that is one of the many still unanswered questions in the work. All mice not injected, however, die within a few days after radiation exposure.

Some protection is also produced in mice injected with the substance following radiation, Anderson reported.

He and Ellicker are cautious about predicting what may eventually come from the study. But they term results to date "promising."

Burbank, July 2-13; mathematics in the school, L. A. Siebenlist, July 2-13; Southern Oregon college choir institute, Jester J. Harrison, July 16-21; reading, Florence Allen and Evelyn Barker, July 16-27; art in the school, Dr. Janet E. Turner, July 16-27; education of the gifted, Dr. Loren Messing, July 16-27; study Shake-peare in action, Dr. Herbert Childs, July 30-Aug. 10; music in the school, Louise Hucks, July 30-Aug. 10.

For the post session, there will be a workshop in methods and materials, social science, language arts, science and arithmetic in the elementary school directed by Mary Helen Swain and Neil A. McWhorter, and a natural history of Oregon field trip.

Collage Grove Gas Purchase Disclosed

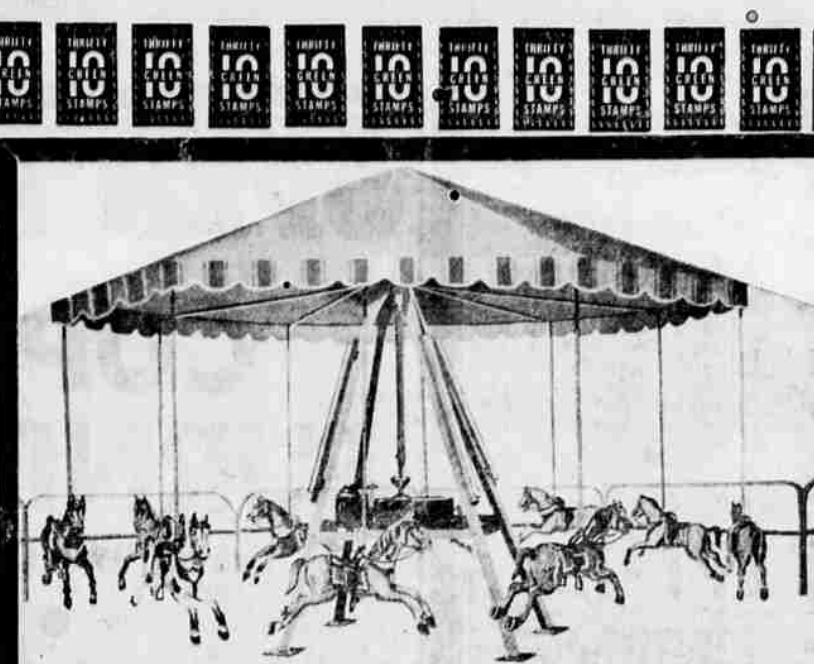

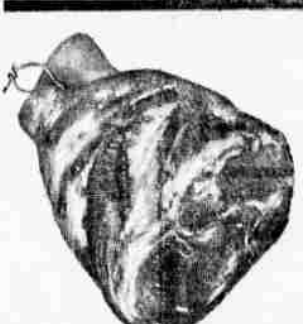

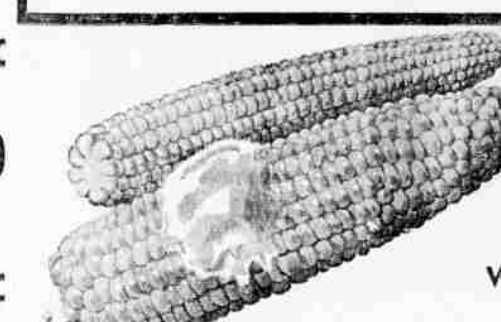

Gambling Probe In Washington Due To Continue

Seattle—A federal investigation of gambling in Western Washington may continue for several months before a grand jury here.

U.S. Attorney Brock Adams revealed the scope of the investigation when the operators of three raided downtown establishments pointed out dozens of similar operations were still in business.

Nine persons accused of using Western Union wire facilities for illegal gambling purposes appeared before a U.S. commissioner Wednesday and were released on their personal recognizance.

Indictments returned. The grand jury has returned indictments against the men accusing them with violation of the federal gambling laws.

Adams said he was not singling out the three establishments raided Tuesday. "We simply don't have the manpower to do it all," he said.

Ticketing betting systems operate throughout Western Washington, Adams said. Olympia has 18, he explained, and there are one each in Bremerton and Tacoma.

The nine men arrested by FBI agents are Meyer Fox and Allen A. Goldberg, co-owners of the Turf Center; John Wicklund, manager of the Turf Center; Milton Hyatt, co-owner of the Turf; Clifford T. Ward, manager of Green's Cigar Store; Joseph J. Burbaum, owner of Green's; H. E. O'Keefe, John M. Schwartz and Robert Lapan, co-owners of the Pennylane Arcade.

Chaplain Lawrence Sakay will give the invocation and offer benediction, followed by the Salute to the Dead by the domiciliary firing squad. Taps will then be sounded.

The massing of colors by service organizations follows the invocation. In the event of rain, the ceremonies will be held in the domiciliary theater.
