Per Capita Income In Oregon Highest Recorded in State

Corvallis—Per capita income in Oregon in 1961 was the highest ever recorded for the state and above the national average for the third consecutive year, according to Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist.

Last year, the state recorded a total personal income of \$4.1 billion or an average of \$2,280 per person. This was a gain of \$21 or nearly 1 per cent over 1960. However, retail prices moved up a little more than 1 per cent, leaving a loss of about \$5 per person in terms of purchasing power, she noted.

Oregon's per capita income last year was \$15 above the national average of \$2,265, also a record high, based on reports from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Mrs. Horrell said.

Average Nationally

Nationally, a average per capita income last year varied from a high of \$3,059 in the District of Columbia to a low of \$1,233 in Mississippi. Delaware led all states, excluding the District of Columbia.

Other top-ranking states with per capita incomes over \$2,600 were, in order, Nevada, Connecticut, New York, California, Alaska, New Jersey, Illinois and Massachusetts. Oregon tied with Pennsylvania for 18th place among the 50 states.

The first part of 1962 finds incomes continuing to rise throughout the nation, including Oregon, Mrs. Horrell said. Reliable unofficial estimates place Oregon's personal income for the first two months of this year nearly 8 1/2 per cent higher than for the same months last year, while the average rise for the nation is about 7 per cent, she stated.

Spending has kept pace with income so the rate of savings is not much different than in the spring of 1961, she noted.

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Traffic Safety Is Feature of 4-H Summer School

Corvallis — Traffic safety, leadership education for teenagers, and special classes will be features of the 47th annual 4-H Club Summer School June 11 to 16 at Oregon State university.

Nearly 1,800 youths, between 13 and 18 years old, attend 4-H summer school each year on scholarships provided by organizations and individuals.

Sgt. William Colbert of the state police, Newport, will speak at the opening assembly June 11 and teach special classes on traffic safety to 14 and 15-year-olds during the week.

Senior 4-H members, those at least 15 years of age, will be offered a choice of 15 classes in agriculture and home economics, camp counselling, economics and communications.

Art Appreciation Class

Emanuel Piladakis, OSU artist, will conduct a 90-minute class for 15-year-olds in art appreciation. Well known in the Northwest, Piladakis has a painting on exhibit at the Seattle World's Fair. John O'Connor, OSU music professor, will work with teenagers in music appreciation.

During the week, members will attend two to four classes each day and afternoon assemblies. Officers will be elected in the living groups.

Girls will live in campus dormitories; younger boys will be housed in fraternities. Eighty-five college students and adult 4-H leaders will act as counsellors.

Instructors for the 4-H schools come from the OSU staff, commercial firms, and departments of government. Assembly speakers will include Gov. Mark Hatfield, OSU President James Jensen, and Gene Lear, associate director of the OSU extension service.

Parents Asked To Pre-Register Children

Parents of children who have not pre-registered first graders who will attend Willson school in September have been asked to contact the school officer, Robert L. Baccus, principal, has announced.

The school does not conduct a pre-school clinic, he noted, but does pre-register first grade students in the office. Baccus said pre-registration is desirable to determine the number of first grade students in September.

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
