Biblical 'Family Tree' Contains Eight Versions

New York—One of history's most ambitious Bible publishing dreams has become a reality.

Called an "Octapla," it is a Biblical "family tree," tracing the evolution of the Scriptures as known to the English-speaking world from their roots in 18th Century England to 20th Century America.

The development of the Bible is told in words, rather than in drawings and diagrams of the usual family tree, however. This is a 1,300-page volume with the official title of "The New Testament Octapla," containing eight parallel versions of scriptures, from the Tyndale New Testament of 1525-35 to the Revised Standard Version of 1946-60.

Fancy Pages
Between the two, on facing pages, are the Great Bible of 1540, the Geneva Bible of 1562, the Bishops' Bible of 1602, the Rheims New Testament of 1582, the King James Version of 1611 and the American Standard Version of 1901.

There have been many other English-language versions and translations of the New Testament during these centuries, but for purposes of genealogy and scholarship, these are the Bibles that are regarded as being in "the Tyndale-King James tradition." The King James Version grew out of the earlier efforts and in turn inspired the later ones included in the Octapla.

Only once before has there been an Octapla. A portion of the Old Testament was produced in the 3rd Century with a Hebrew text and seven Greek versions. A Hexapla appeared in England in 1841, containing a Greek text of the New Testament and six English translations.

Dream of Minister
The Octapla was the dream of the Rev. Dr. Luther A. Weigle, dean emeritus of the Yale University Divinity School and chairman of the

Standard Bible Committee of the National Council of Churches.
Dr. Weigle took his idea to William R. McCullay, president of Thomas Nelson and Sons of New York, soon after Nelson had published the revised standard version. McCullay saw in the Octapla an opportunity to produce a volume for posterity and put a staff of experts at Dr. Weigle's disposal.

Dr. Weigle supervised the laborious work that went into the Octapla. Much of the task was performed by Mrs. Bernice Rich Nelson's Bible editor. She copied the text of the Tyndale New Testament from a tiny volume in the rarebook room at the New York Public Library, owner of the book, and served as chief proofreader of the entire Octapla.

Verses Coordinated
Every verse and every page had to be coordinated so they were absolutely parallel. To give an idea of the subtle evolution of much of the Biblical language, here are the eight versions of the beginning of "The Lord's Prayer":
Tyndale: "O our father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Let thy kingdom come."
Great Bible: "Our father which art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Let thy kingdom come."
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Dr. Weigle said he undertook the new Octapla because the English "Bible," while still useful, does not complete the picture of the evolution of the New Testament.
"The significance of the present Octapla lies in its dramatic presentation of the development of the Tyndale-

King James tradition," he said. "It is a very significant and fruitful commentary upon the Scriptures to trace the efforts of the successive translators to put into English, for their day, the meaning of the Scriptures."

Despite differences, Dr. Weigle believes the Octapla will impress the reader and student with the general continuity of the wording of the Scriptures. The basic structure given to the English translation by Tyndale has endured all changes, he said.

The book costs \$20.
