Hal Griggs Proves PCL Show Stopper

Hawaii pitcher Hal Griggs is a show-stopper, although Salt Lake City worked hard to steal the scene.

Hawaii came from a 5-5 tie to beat the Bees 7-6 Thursday night at Salt Lake City. Hal Griggs broke the stalemate with a two-run homer in the top of the tenth, but Salt Lake

nearly tied the score again and sent the game into more innings.

Griggs was able to hold the Bees after they scored one more run in the bottom of the tenth. He allowed five hits in the seven innings he pitched.

Hawaii had taken an early lead with three runs in the second inning. Salt Lake's Max Alvis hit a two-run homer in the fourth to lead the Bees into a 3-3 margin. Then Hawaii scored two runs in the sixth to tie the score.

In other league games Thursday night Vancouver downed San Diego 5-1 and Spokane defeated Portland, also 5-1. The scheduled game between Seattle and the Giants at Tacoma was postponed because of rain for the second night in a row.

At Spokane pitcher Dick Scott allowed five hits and was supported with a 13-hit attack by the Indians. The win gave Spokane two out of three games in their series with Portland and also their first series win of the season.

Scott, whose record is now 3-3, struck out only two and walked three. Portland's only score came when Bill Kern doubled home Tony Furlio in the first inning.

Bill Pleis went nine innings and allowed seven hits to lead the Mounties to their victory at Vancouver. Sam Ellis took the loss for San Diego.
