

Baltimore, Detroit Managers Square Off Over Ball Nicking Charge, Jim Bunning Accused

When two big league managers square off against each other, that's really news!

Bob Scheffing of Detroit and Billy Hitchcock of Baltimore squared off in a way, it's a shame the umpires kept them apart. Both men are in fine condition even though they're in their 40's and it probably would have been a while of a scrap.

The trouble all came about during the ninth inning of a game which the Tigers won, 5-4, on Oriole catcher Charlie Lau's passed ball in the 11th.

Hitchcock had complained from the eighth inning on to plate umpire John Schwartz that Tiger starter Jim Bunning was using his belt buckle to put nicks in the baseballs he was throwing.

Finally, in the ninth, Hitchcock went out to the mound to examine Bunning's belt buckle along with Schwartz and first base umpire Charley Berry.

Scheffing came charging out of the Detroit dugout to join the discussion and in no time, the umpires had to pull the two managers apart.

"They were accusing him, Bunning of cheating," Scheffing said later. "I don't think the opposing manager has any business being out there with my pitcher, arguing with him or picking a fight."

"I told Hitchcock to get the hell out of there. But I never touched him and he never touched me," Schwartz said. "We can't do anything unless we catch the man in the act."

Bunning denies tampering. Bunning, who left the game with a blistered finger in the 10th, insisted "I don't know what it was all about."

Hitchcock, still burning after the game, said "I don't

blame Bunning for not talking about it, either."

Baltimore President Lee McPhail had the last word. He said he was going to send some of the balls Bunning used in the game to Joe Cronin so the American league president could see the nicks for himself.

At any rate, Al Kaline, Rocky Colavito and Bill Bruton each hit homers and the victory was credited to reliever Ron Nischwitz. Hoyt Wilhelm was the loser.

In the American league games, the first-place New York Yankees defeated the Kansas City A's, 9-4; the Boston Red Sox downed the Minnesota Twins, 7-5; and the Los Angeles Angels walloped the Washington Senators, 7-4. The Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox were idle.

Over in the National League the San Francisco Giants beat the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-4; the Los Angeles Dodgers nipped the New York Mets, 4-2; the Cincinnati Reds blanked the Houston Colts, 5-0; the Pittsburgh Pirates subdued the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-2; and the Chicago Cubs climbed out of the cellar with a 4-3 decision over the Milwaukee Braves.

Peppone Continues Slugging

Yankee rookie Joe Peppone continued his hitting heroics with a home run and a triple against the A's. The Yankee shelled Ed Rakow for five runs in the third inning and coasted thereafter as Bud Daley picked up his second victory with Jim Coates' help. John Blanchard and Manny Jimenez also homered.

Ed Bressoud's two-run double in the fifth gave the Red Sox their winning margin over the Twins. Reliever Mike Fornieles was the winner and rookie Joe Bonikowski the

Hartman Recipient Of Award

Ashland — Howard Hartman, senior from Healdsburg, Calif., was chosen as student athlete of the year at Southern Oregon college, it was announced by Dr. Ted Schopf, athletic director.

Hartman, two-time all-conference end in the Oregon Collegiate conference and OCC champion in both hurdle events in last week end's conference track meet, has an approximate 2.8 cumulative grade point average while attending Southern Oregon the past three years.

He will be honored at the District 2 NAIA awards banquet in Monmouth on Saturday evening, May 26.

Jean Eberhart, one-time SOC basketball coach and athletic director, will also be honored at the district awards banquet. Eberhart, now in the sporting goods and hardware business in Ashland, is a former University of Oregon athlete and was for seven years head coach and athletic director at Southern Oregon.

South Eugene High Axemen Blast Medford 10-1 in Quarterfinals

Eugene — South Eugene High school's Axemen took a giant stride in the defense of their Oregon Class A-1 baseball championship here yesterday by thumping Medford 10-1 at University of Oregon's Home field.

The teams clashed in a state playoff quarterfinal game.

Employed by the Axemen in their triumph were the strong left arm of pitcher Don McNeal, some healthy hitting and Black Tornado errors.

McNeal, overpowering Tornado batters at times, chucked a three-hitter, striking out batters nine times and issuing three free passes. Bob Officer with three hits in three times up, Jim Jordan with a single and a triple and Jack Willis with a three-baser, led a 10-hit South assault. Jordan knocked home four runs.

To Semifinals

South Eugene will advance into the semifinals next Tuesday against Pendleton or North Salem who play tonight at Pendleton. The loss completed the season for the Tornado crew.

Two of Medford's hits were in the initial inning when the Breeze pushed over its lone score. Dan Miles singled. Mike Barnes sacrificed him to second base and Mike Neathamer singled Miles across the plate. The chance for further run-making was stemmed when Gary Miller hit into a double play.

South Eugene tabulated in the second inning often enough to win. Three runners crossed home plate. Just four of the Axemen's 10 markers were earned. Medford miscues allowed in one of the second inning tallies and opened the door for one counter in third and four in the fourth.

Willis Triples

The markers in the second panel were on a walk to Dave Callentine, a triple by Willis, singles by Tom Westfall and a throwing error by outfielder Dick Deffley. In the third session Officer singled to right field. Randy Goin laid down a bunt and beat the throw to first base. Pitcher Stuart Young's throw was bad, however. Officer was able to go all the way home. Goin trying to get to second base was

thrown out, rightfielder Deffley to shortstop Miles.

In the fourth frame with two out McNeal singled. Medford second baseman fielded a blow by Duane Brown but dropped the ball trying to grasp for a throw. Wayne Smith singled home McNeal. Walks to Officer and Goin pushed Brown across the plate. A hit by Jordan scored Smith and Officer.

Officer singled in the sixth panel. Goin walked and Jordan tripled.

The Tornado had a threat going in the sixth inning when Dan Miles got on base on shortstop Smith's error, the only one by South. Barnes singled. Mike Neathamer slashed a liner which looked like a sure hit but second baseman Brown snared the ball and threw to second base to catch Miles off for a double play. Miller walked and Medford had two on base again but Tim White fanned.

Pitched Good Game

Medford's Schroeder made a similar catch of a liner by Smith in the second inning. Shortstop Miles went back deep to take a fly by Willis in the fifth.
