Cow Belles Promote Beef For Fathers' Day Dinner

Jackson County Cow Belles are again supporting the annual beef promotion program in cooperation with the Oregon and county cattlemen's association. The program was outlined at a meeting in Eugene earlier this month.

As in past years, the Cow Belles are promoting the use of beef for Fathers' Day dinner in the hope that this will become as much of a tradition as turkey for Thanksgiving. With this in mind, a new recipe for Spiced Pot Roast was developed and copies of the recipe are being mailed to thousands of southern Oregon residents with the cooperation of banks of the area.

In addition, a beef roaster will be given to the father of the first baby born on Fathers' Day.

Jackson County Cow Belles, an auxiliary to the Jackson County Stockmen's association, now has 60 members. Associate members are women who are also interested in promotion of the cattle industry, although not directly connected with it.

Mrs. Richard Hein, Jacksonville, is beef promotion chairman for the Cow Belles this year, and Mrs. LeRoy Offenbacher, also of Jacksonville, is chairman of the beef for Fathers' Day project. Father's day is set for June 17.

For Spiced Pot Roast brown a five pound beef chuck roast on all sides in 2 tablespoons fat or salad oil. Combine 1 tablespoon cinnamon, 2 teaspoons ginger, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 2 cups tomato juice, 2 1/2 cups chopped onion, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt and dash of pepper. Pour this mixture over the meat. Cover and simmer for three hours, or until meat is tender. Thicken gravy.

Good Mixer - Keep corn bread mix on hand to use with leftovers. Prepare the mix and bake it according to package directions. Cut into squares and sit horizontally. Serve shortcake-fashion with filling made of creamed left-over turkey, chicken or ham seasoned lightly with thyme or curry powder.

Pizza on Rye - Grilled pizza on rye bread makes a meatless lunch dish. Mix 1 (8 ounce) can of tomato sauce with 1/4 teaspoon of basil and 1/4 teaspoon of oregano. Spread on 5 or 6 slices of rye toast. Divide 8 ounces of sliced mozzarella among the pizzas, and top with contents of 1 (4 1/2 ounce) can of shrimp, drained and rinsed in label directions. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Broil until bubbly.
