

North Eugene, Cresswell Win A-1, A-2 Track Championships

Oregon State University, Corvallis - North Eugene and Cresswell won the championships in their classes here Saturday in an Oregon state high school track meet featuring the greatest half mile race in the state's athletic history.

North Highlander, paced by Dave Duebner, who set two new standards, tabulated 44 points to capture the Class A-1 trophy.

Cresswell, led by one-man gang Denny Ellis, scored 40 points for the Class A-2 honors. Ellis won three events and smashed records in two. Grants Pass, power from southern Oregon, was second in Class A-1 with 39. Corvallis was third with 35, while Hillsboro scored 30 and Grant of Portland, North Salem and South Eugene tied for fifth with 24 points each.

After Cresswell in A-2 came Reedsport with 38. St. Mary's which moved into A-2 class this year after three consecutive State B titles captured third with 32. Sierra Catholic scored 23 and Oakridge 22, shading a 21 3/4 tally by Myrtle Creek.

Wins Half-Mile

Duebner won the miracle half-mile in which all six placers bettered the old standard. Record time of 1:53.6 beats the record he established in the preliminaries Friday of 1:55.3. In the Saturday final, Wendell Cox,

Hillsboro, was second in 1:55.0, Jim Price, South Salem, was third 1:55.4, and Mike Curtis, North Eugene, was fourth with 1:55.8. Steve Toews, Medford sophomore, placed fifth, also in 1:55.8 with Don Aaherg, Beaverton, right on his heels.

On Friday, in the qualifying event, Duebner had smashed a 50-year-old record of 1:56.8 set by Vere Windagle, of Washington of Portland. Duebner also won the mile in record time of 4:14.2.

In all, eight records were shattered and one was tied during the meet. Five marks fell in the class A-1. In the 220-yard dash Butch Lumby, Grant, tied the standard with his 21.8. The records which fell included Gordon Payne's time of 48.6 for South Eugene for the 440 yard dash; Don Angevine's six foot, 5 1/2 inch high jump for Hillsboro, and South Eugene's relay time of 1:29.2. On the relay quartet for South Eugene were Tom Lichty, Payne, Jerry Strand, George Hadley. In the high jump, John Franz, of North Eugene also bettered the old standard by one inch. He took second place with 6-4 3/4.

For Cresswell, Ellis set new records of 199-10 1/2 for the javelin and 52-2 1/2 in the shotput and he took first place, also, in the discus at 159-4. He was the meet's only triple winner.

Double Winners

Lumby joined Duebner as a double winner in Class A-1 by taking the 100 yard dash along with the 220. Double winners in A-2 were Doug Manning, of Yamhill Carlton, in the 100 and 440 and Faircloth who took the half mile along with the mile.

A champion from southern Oregon in A-2 was Paul Elliott, of St. Mary's of Medford, with a victory in the high hurdles and time of 14.8.

Grants Pass and St. Mary's topped the southern Oregon performances in the meet. Elliott also won third for St. Mary's in the low hurdles, hitting the next to last hurdle in the race. Jim Calhoun was second in the javelin for the Crusaders with a heave of 197-1/2. The St. Mary's relay team of Tom Darland, Jim Webb, Joe Kaiser and Elliott was second in the relay.

For Grants Pass, Gary Van Koten and Dan McIntire tied for first in the pole vault at 12-11 1/2. Bob Wilson took second in the high hurdles, Steve

Ausland took fourth in the javelin with 205-11. Dennis O'Leary was fifth in the broad jump and sixth in the low hurdles and the relay team was third.

Crater High, of Central Point, scored 19 points to place tenth in Class A-1. George Jannusch, senior competing in his first year of track, was second in the javelin with a heave of 212 feet, 7 inches. Paul Ransom was third in the broadjump with a leap of 21 feet, 10 inches. John Champ was fourth in the low hurdles and Dwight James took sixth in the high jump at 6-1.

Medford placed fifth in three events; Toews in the half mile, Scott Eaton in the high hurdles and Paul Bower in the shotput at 51 feet, 1 1/2 inches. That gave Medford six points. Klamath Falls picked up its lone tally in the meet on a sixth place

finish in the 100 yard dash by Paul Noel.

In Class A-2 Rogue River scored 14 points on a second in the 440 by Barry Frantz and a third by Chris Jones in the 220.

Phoenix high scored nine points with three placers. Ron Williams tied for third in the pole vault at 12 feet, 1/2 inch. John Granby fifth in the shotput at 49-7 3/4. Curt Harris fifth in the high hurdles.

For Eagle Point, Lew Whipple picked up seven points with a tie for second in the high jump at 5-8.
