

# Mike Glines Bat Leader Of Comets

Central Point-Mike Glines was the batting leader for the Crater High school baseball team during the season just passed.

The Comet third baseman and shortstop, who appeared in 22 games, compiled a .288 average on 19 hits in 66 times at bat.

His total at bats and hits, 17 runs, 17 stolen bases and four doubles were tops for the team. He tied for runs batted in honors, with seven, with two others.

Jeff Anhorn was second in hitting with a .255 average and Willie Jones was next with .250.

The Comets as a team hit .202 to opponents' .195. Pat Pepper topped the list in triples with five and Darryl Summerfield in home runs with three. The two tied with Glines in RBIs.

**Pitching Records**

In pitching Larry Pepper had a 3-1 record and Summerfield 2-1. Wayne Clay, the club's heavy duty pitcher, was 5-4. Gary Burns, with a 2-3 mark, had an 0.77 earned run average for 27 innings and Clay was 1.22 for 62 2/3.

Howie Tomlinson, first base and outfield, led the team in fielding average with .965. Anhorn, catcher had a .968 mark. Neil Rivenburg, outfielder-infielder, .963. Darryl Summerfield, outfielder-pitcher, .956, and Willie Jones, outfielder-first baseman, .952. Tomlinson and Summerfield were charged with just one error, each.

# Mays' 2 Home Runs Pace Giants; Detroit Tops NY; Kaline Hurt

United Press International — Willie Mays exploded his second home run of the game in the 10th inning Saturday with a man aboard to give the San Francisco Giants a come-from-behind 7-6 victory over the New York Mets and extend the Mets' losing streak to six straight.

It was the fifth home run in the last three games for the \$90,000 per year center fielder and his 16th of the season.

Mays had tied the score at 5-5 with a bases-empty homer in the eighth. But Felix Mantilla put the Mets ahead for the fourth time in the afternoon by lacing a home run in the top of the 10th.

Harvey Kuenn opened the Giants' half of the 10th with a single and pinch-runner Ernie Bowman was retired on a fielder's choice, leaving Charlie Hiller on first base.

Then up came Mays and he hit one over the left-center field fence off loser Jay Hook.

### Oregon Softball Tourney for Men To Be Held Here

Corvallis—Ralph Guynes of Oregon City was re-elected president of the Oregon State Softball association at the annual meeting in Salem last week.

Guynes will have as his assistants Garland Sprick of Corvallis as first vice-president, Bob Willis of Eugene as second vice-president, Jack Moore of Eugene as third vice-president in charge of girls' softball and Ken Kerr of West Linn as secretary-treasurer.

Bob Robertson of Corvallis was reappointed state softball director by the board of directors. The directors also awarded the state men's softball tournament to Medford for August 17-22.

The state women's tournament was awarded to Eugene for August 10-11-12. Eugene will also hold a women's "B" tournament July 13-14-15. This tournament is for girls' and women's teams that do not wish to enter the state tournament.

Corvallis and Albany submitted bids for invitational tournaments. They will be awarded later.

Managers were asked to send entrance fees to the state director before July 10 to allow the teams to be eligible for state playoffs.

The men's state tourney is reportedly planned for Memorial field, White City. The Aug. 17-22 dates have been reserved tentatively and will be confirmed and confirmed when the director of the Veterans Administration domiciliary receives a letter from the sponsors.

### OSU's Diamonders Surprise To Coach

Corvallis — (UPI) — Ralph Coleman puts it this way: "They really surprised me."

And the Northern Division baseball champion Oregon State Beavers have surprised a lot of other people.

The Beavers, with only two seniors on the team, had rolled up 26 wins in 28 starts and captured the division title with 11 triumphs in 13 decisions up to their two remaining regular-season games.

They enter the NCAA playoffs.

"I didn't look for such a good record," the 65-year-old Coleman said. "We started with a new group since we lost almost a full club from last year."

"But they're a fine bunch of kids and they play real well together."

The only seniors on the team are outfielders Larry Petersen and Brian Bailey, both regulars.

But the star of the club is junior left-hander Cecil Ira, a 5-8, 157-pound product of Portland's Franklin High School. Ira posted an 11-0 record this season with 7 of his wins coming in the division.

**Low ER Average**  
The little hurler, whose main pitch is a dancing curve ball, has gone in the distance in 11 starts to gain the wins. In division play, his earned run average is 1.13.

"He's one of the top college pitchers in the nation," says the enthused Coleman, who is in his 32nd year as baseball coach at Oregon State.

The Beavers rolled up 18 wins in a row before dropping their first decision this year to Idaho in a division game. Fifteen of the wins came in pre-season play. Their other loss was to defending division champion Washington State.

"This team is one of my best," Coleman said. "I think in some respects, it is a better defensive and a better hitting club than most of them."

The other Oregon state starters are junior Dave Hayward, catcher; junior Harry Demorest or sophomore John Thomas, first base; junior Dave Long, second base;

sophomore Doug Stahl, shortstop, junior Gene Hilliard, third base, and Al Lehrer, an outfielder.

Bailey, a 150-pounder from Edmonds, Wash., leads the team in home runs. He drilled out two in pre-season games and hit four in division contests.

Oregon State will meet the winner of this week end's best-of-three Fresno State-Santa Clara series in another best-of-three series in California for the NCAA district 8 title. The winner represents the Pacific Coast in the eight-team NCAA world series in Omaha, Neb.

### Oregon Edges Oregon State In Baseball

Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — The Oregon Ducks came up with two runs in the bottom of the 13th inning here Saturday to edge Oregon State 3-2 in a final Northern Division baseball game.

It was the second straight victory for the Ducks over the Beavers, who clinched the league title earlier.

The Ducks, who nailed down second place with the victory, tied the score at 2-2 when Fred Pettinelli's single drove in Eric Hardin. Pettinelli scored the winning run on a single by Leon Hayes.

Bob Christianson went all the way on the mound for Oregon to register the victory. Jim Falk, who relieved Steve Clark in the 11th inning, was the loser.

Oregon State finished with an 11-4 record in the Northern Division. While Oregon was 10-5. The Beavers won 26 of 30 games during the season, Oregon won 29 and tied one in 39 games.

### Forman Runs 3.58.3 Mile

Modesto, Calif. — (UPI) — Keith Forman, sandy-haired junior from the University of Oregon, won the mile in 3:58.3 last night to share the spotlight with teammate Harry Jerome in the 21st annual California relays.

Forman, putting on a tremendous last-quarter surge, broke the four-minute barrier for the first time — and he was pushed across the finish line by Cary Weisger, former Duke star, who also broke the barrier with a timing of 3:59.3.

Oregon's great spring relay team, with Jerome running a great come-from-behind anchor lap, equalled the world record for the 440 in 40 seconds flat. The world mark was set by Texas in 1937. The Los Angeles striders finished second, followed by Texas Southern.

It was the fastest clocking ever recorded for the 440 relay around two turns.

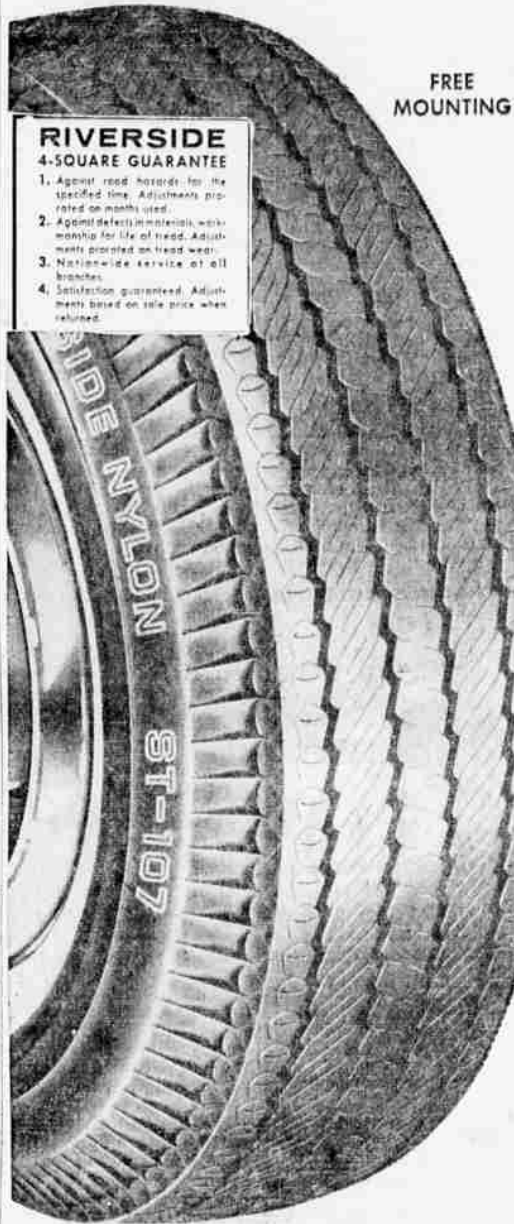
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
