At a previous meeting of the Medford unit, Mr. Webster presented the unit a birchwood altar as a gift from Mrs. Webster.



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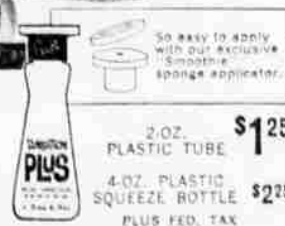
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
