Historical Society Takes Field Trip Along Rivers

Yreka - Members of the Siskiyou County Historical society and their guests went on

a field trip Sunday, May 20, along the Klamath river. Some 157 persons were on the trip.

The caravan of 22 cars and two buses left the museum at 9 a.m. It was noted that north of Yreka where Yreka creek and the Shasta river join was originally known as Joe Lane's Bar. Joe Lane was governor of the Oregon territory. He passed through this section returning to Oregon from Sacramento after being appointed governor and saw this region where gold was discovered. He thought it was a part of Oregon and returned to mine, while in reality the boundary is near its present location.

Gottsville was originally settled by Kanakas, people of Hawaiian and Indian descent, who were miners and the town was originally named Honolulu. Tom Bigelow gave a talk about the early history of this settlement.

The caravan moved on down the Klamath river to Oak Bar where Chester Barton, who was born there when it was a thriving mining town, reviewed the history of that community. His father owned a store there.

From Hamburg the trip took members up the Klamath to the mouth of Scott river where George Noonan related some early day stories and displayed an 1852 ledger showing business transactions and a marriage record book.

At Hooperville, on Indian creek, a stop was made at an Indian's home. On a rail fence hung many deer antlers, hanging from the porch was an old bird cage that had dozens of feet of large birds hanging from it and in it. A large owl with a huge wing spread was tacked to the side of the house and snake skins hung from the porch along with a hornets nest.

On Scott River From Scott Bar the group continued up the Scott river to the U. S. Forest service camp at Bridge Flat where they ate lunch.

The tour then took them through Quartz valley, past the Morrison-Carlock mine, on to Mugginsville and Oro Fino where Mrs. Hazel Rider, the secretary of the Historical society, said she was born.

At Deadwood the party saw a miner retort gold.

Insufficient time prohibited exploration of all the caves, but the group visited petroglyphs, Captain Jack's Stronghold, the museum, Golden Dome, Catacombs, Merrill Ice Caves, Monument Headquarters, Devil's Homestead, Fleener Chimney, and three of the caves near the headquarters.

Mr. Collier pointed out facts of nature to the group while Mr. Swinney, an authority on the historical background of the caves, briefed the group historically.

The group arrived home at 7:30 p.m.

Tuna Rice Soup Makes Warming Lunch Dish

New York - UPI - Tuna rice soup is a warming main dish for a lunch. Combine 2 (6 1/2 or 7 ounce) cans of tuna, drained and flaked, with 3 vegetable bouillon cubes, 3 cups of boiling water, 1 cup of cooked rice, 2 cups (1-pound can) of diced carrots with their liquid, and 1/4 teaspoon of basil. Heat to serving temperature, stirring occasionally. Makes 8 servings of 123 calories each.

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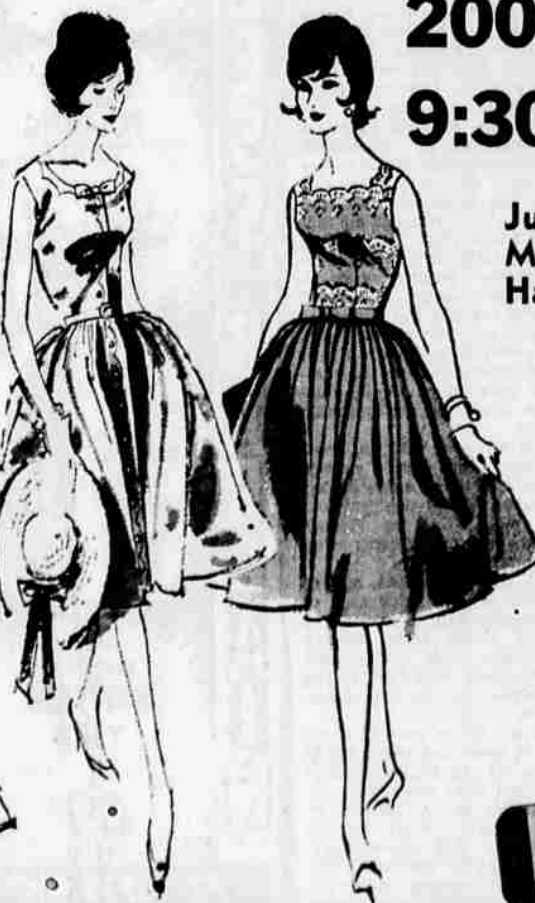
