Ways to Stop Mildew Problems Told Homemakers

Corvallis—Restore newness to clothes and furnishings stricken with mildew over wet winter months with two effective weapons—sun and fresh air.

Western Oregon homes usually are hardest hit with mildew problems in the spring, says Bernice Strawn, Oregon State University home management specialist.

As soon as mildew appears on clothing or upholstered furniture, brush it off before it has a chance to weaken or rot the material, she continues. Then sun and air fabrics thoroughly.

If mildew spots remain on washable clothing, wash in hot sudsy water. Rinse and dry in the sun. For persistent stains use lemon juice and salt, sodium perborate bleach (the powdered type) or a dilute solution of liquid chlorine. Dry clean non-washable items.

Upholstered articles, mattresses, rugs and carpets should be taken outdoors and brushed. Vacuum to draw out all mold. Use an electric heater and fan to carry away moist air.

If mildew persists, sponge lightly with a thick suds of detergent and wipe with a clean, damp cloth. Sponge mildewed rugs and carpets with soap suds or a rug shampoo. Dry in sun, if possible.

Leave doors open in damp closet areas and add a fan to keep air stirring. Heat from a small light bulb will also help dry air. An electric dehumidifier helps remove dampness and prevent mildew, says the specialist.

Mold-causing mildew thrives in damp, warm, poorly-ventilated places.
