Klamath Wildlife Dispute Heard by Governor Hatfield

Salem - (UPI) - A deep old reclamation versus wildlife refuge struggle between farmers, sportsmen and others and the federal government over the upper Klamath Basin spilled into Gov. Mark Hatfield's office Monday. The basin is in Southern Oregon and Northern California.

Private landowners from Oregon's Klamath county attacked the Klamath-Tulelake bill sponsored by Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.). They asked Hatfield and his state natural resources committee to back amendments that would take some of the federal bite out of S. 1988, Kuchel's bill.

Richard Henzel, Klamath Falls, president of the Klamath Drainage District, complained that the legislation which carries some U.S. Interior Department amendments would "forever" keep the basin in public ownership. This isn't denied by federal officials, and the bill was immediately defended by Paul T. Quick of Portland. He is regional director of interior's Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife.

The bill would change the 57-year-old concept of the basin from that of reclamation to wildlife conservation. Various refuges could be enlarged.

Violations Charged

George Proctor, Klamath Falls, attorney for the drainage district, said the proposed change in basic concept violates a number of federal-state-district agreements. The district was formed in 1915, only 13 years after passage of the U.S. reclamation act.

Henzel urged Hatfield's committee to get behind two amendments proposed by the district that would:

1. Convert a number of acres of public land within the district to private ownership, either by sale or by exchange. This would include Klamath Straits, and the Miller Lake area, a 2,811 acre tract.
2. Require the federal government to "promptly pay its just debt" of about \$180,000 to the district for cost of building irrigation and drainage facilities for public lands in Klamath Straits.

Reported Favorably

These same proposals were rejected by the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs committee last February. Since then, the committee has reported S. 1988 out favorably, with the U.S. Interior Department amendments.

The Basin contains the biggest concentration of waterfowl on the North American continent. It lies along the key Pacific Flyway and is loaded with ducks and geese.

Hatfield said the matter is "beyond the jurisdiction" of Oregon "at the present time." But he added that considerable misunderstanding exists in Oregon about the situation, and he called the combatants together so his committee could hear the facts.

Medford Is Listed In New Northwest Travel Guide

Medford is listed in the 1962 Mobil Travel guide for the Northwest and Great Plains states, a 430-page book recently published for the nation's travelers.

TouVelle State park, Prescott Memorial park and Crater Rook museum are featured in the listing. Medford appears on page 289.

Oregon receives 51 pages in the new guide, the state's history, population and area are included, and there are special sections on local fishing and hunting, and on parks and forests.

A statement by Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges introduces the new edition. The introduction also contains a history of the area, border crossing regulations for travel in Canada and tips on how to save money while traveling. Car care hints are provided as well as auto safety suggestions. A section for camera fans offers information on film, subject matter, and the use of filters.

Ten States

The Northwest and Great Plains states edition of the guide covers ten states: Idaho, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Washington and Wyoming.

About 14,000 establishments in 42 states and the District

of Columbia are listed in the 1962 guide.

Each hotel, motel and restaurant was visited by a trained representative who made a thorough inspection. His comments and recommendations were reviewed by nationally known food and travel experts, who assigned the final ratings.

Hotels, motels and restaurants are rated by a star system, which ranges from "good, satisfactory in every way" (one star) to "one of the best in the country" (five stars). In addition, some establishments receive a check mark, which denotes an "unusually good value, relatively inexpensive."

Historical Facts

Besides listing accommodations and eating places, the guide contains sections on what to see and do in various areas. It also lists population, altitude, radio and television stations and local historical facts.

The guide is sponsored by Mobil and published by Simon and Schuster. It accepts no advertising or payment for listings and is sold at Mobil dealer stations and most book stores.

The 1962 Mobil Travel guide is published in six editions: Northeastern states, Middle Atlantic states, Great Lakes area, Southwest and South Central area, Northwest and Great Plains states, California and the West.

Thornton Urges Time Signatures

Salem - (UPI) - The Democratic nominee for governor, Robert Y. Thornton, Monday urged citizens to sign petitions that would put on the November ballot one or more anti-daylight saving time measures.

Since there already is a measure on the November ballot calling for statewide daylight time, Thornton said the initiative petitions against fast time are the only way for people in Oregon to "get a fair and square vote" on the issue this fall.

The state attorney general noted that the fast time measure put on the November ballot by the 1961 legislature would not repeal the controversial split time law if statewide fast time fails.

The 1961 split time act is the one that lets Multnomah and four other counties go on daylight time in the summer.

"In other words," Thornton said, "even though a majority of the voters vote against daylight saving time in the 1962 election the law giving local option to the five counties will still stay in effect." Therefore this doesn't give the voters a clearcut choice between daylight and standard, he complained.
