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Big Entry Seen for Spring Drag

Drag racers from at least four western states will compete in the Spring Championship drag races at the White City Strip June 9 and 10.

The speed festival, sponsored by Southern Oregon Timing association, is expected to draw some 300 drag racers who will run for over \$1,000 in cash awards.

SOTA officials said last week that advance reservations have been very high and they anticipate twenty or more entries in the dragster division alone. At least five of these acceleration machines will be from the San Francisco area.

Based upon advance entries and interest officials expect this two-day meet to be Oregon's largest drag race of the spring.

Gates open at noon Saturday for early entries making times runs over the one-fourth mile track. Many of the sleek supercharged entries are expected to register speeds in excess of 160 miles per hour on the concrete raceway.

Sunday action will get underway at 8 p.m. with stock car eliminations beginning at 10:30 a.m. and eliminations in the other classes slated to highlight the afternoon action.



SCHROEDER HONORED—Medford's Stewart Schroeder, a senior in business and technology, is the first winner of the Louis C. Wachsmuth memorial trophy, given annually to Oregon State University's outstanding golfer. The \$250 sterling silver bowl was presented by the sons of the late Wachsmuth, who founded the Oregon Oyster Bar in Portland and who was a golfing enthusiast. Schroeder was voted the most valuable player by his teammates and coach. Captain of the Beavers this year, Schroeder has played the number one position on the team for three consecutive years. In 1960 and 1961, he was Far West medalist and acclaimed the best collegiate golfer in the Pacific Northwest. He clinched his 1962 season with a fourth place finish in the Western Inter-collegiate championships at Santa Cruz, Calif., this spring among 222 entries from 41 colleges and universities and led the Beavers to a fifth place among teams—best showing of all northwest schools. After finishing his studies, he plans a career in professional golfing.

Howard Hobson Visits Southern Oregon College

Ashland—A former coach at Southern Oregon college and one of the nation's all-time authorities in basketball, Howard (Hobby) Hobson, visited the campus Monday, May 28.

Hobson, who coached the SONS as SO teams were then called, to victories over some of the major college and university teams of the era, was on the faculty from 1932 until 1935. During that time the SONS had a dozen players exceeding six feet and a quarter of 6-6 "giants," as they were called in the sports pages of the day, making them the tallest team on the Pacific coast.

During the season of 1934, Hobby's team trounced the University of Oregon 3 games out of four, beat the strong Multnomah club of Portland 39-26 and 55-29, Union Oil of Portland 33-27 and mopped up a touring Harlemites team from New York 47-33. For his three years as coach at Ashland, Hobson's teams racked up a win-loss record of 57-14.

Classed as youthful threats were Bobby Marshman, co-rookie of the year with Jones last year, starting from the outside of the front row with the third fastest qualifying speed; Dan Gurney, driving an engine-in-the-rear creation powered by a stock engine, and Jim McElreath, who also qualified over at better than 148 miles per hour.

Others in the pack who rated mention as potential winners included Eddie Sachs, runner-up last year, Dick Rathmann, Jim Hurtubise and Len Sutton.

Giants Open Busy Slate Of 18 Tilts

Philadelphia—(UPI)—The San Francisco Giants today met Philadelphia in a Memorial Day doubleheader to launch a busy schedule that will see them play 18 games in 16 days.

Manager Al Dark named Juan Marichal (7-3) and Billy O'Dell (5-2) to hurl for the Giants against the eighth place Phils.

The Giants, a game and a half ahead of persistent Los Angeles, would seem to be in good position with series coming up against the lowly Phils, New York Mets, and Chicago Cubs.

But two doubts arise. One is the fact that the Dodgers also are battling the tail-enders; the other is the fact that Giant teams in recent years have been able to murder the tough clubs, only to lose crucial decisions to teams just like the Phils and Cubs.

The Giants moved into today's action in healthy shape. Felipe Alou still has a sore elbow, but his slugging Sunday showed that his brief lay-off did not affect his batting eye. Marichal went to the post with a heavily bandaged left knee. But otherwise all men are in top condition.

Philadelphia planned to start veteran Cal McLish (4-1) and young Jack Hamilton (3-4) against the Giants today.

The Giants were heartened by the announcement that Elio Chacon of the New York Mets had been fined \$100 for his part in Sunday's fracas between the Mets and Giants at Candlestick Park.

Roger Craig of the Mets and Giants Orlando Cepeda and Willie Mays also were in the dispute, but Chacon drew the fine for starting the row.

Cotton-Johnson 2nd Fight May Be Held at Stockholm

Stockholm, Sweden—(UPI)—The proposed second fight between Eddie Cotton and National Boxing Association light heavyweight champion Harold Johnson may be held here this summer instead of in Seattle as previously hoped.

The announcement came Tuesday from George Chermers, Cotton's adviser, and local boxing promoter Carl Hillqvist.

Cotton, the second-ranking light heavyweight from Seattle, is in training for a 10-round bout here with Pekka Kokkonen, 175-pound champion of Finland, June 3. Johnson is in Europe to defend his title against Gustav Scholz in West Berlin June 23.

Tokyo—(UPI)—World flyweight champion Pone Kingpetch of Thailand retained his crown for the third time tonight by scoring a unanimous 15-round decision over Japanese challenger Kyo Noguchi.

A crowd of 7,000 at the covered Kuramae Sumo Arena watched the 112-pound Kingpetch make a punching bag out of Noguchi, 110½, late in the bout.

The two fighters were fairly even during the first 11 rounds but Kingpetch staggered the challenger with hard right uppercuts to the chin in the 12th. Noguchi was bleeding badly and only the bell saved him.
