Williams — Improvements on the Sparlin and Gocher (Blodgett) cemeteries have spruced up the entrances before Memorial day this year.

Heretofore, there were no signs to designate the Sparlin or Gocher cemeteries. There is a memorial plaque at the Hartley and it is surrounded by a heavy wire fence. Relatively minor improvement had to be made there.

Steps Outlined On Starting Bank In Shady Cove

Shady Cove — A new bank should cover a wide area both in sale of stock and in representation on the board of directors, two businessmen from Canyonville told a Shady Cove audience earlier this month.

Oscar Haverson, executive vice president of the South Umpqua State Bank, and D. W. Gill of Gill Insurance and Real Estate, both of Canyonville, met with local residents and businessmen May 16.

The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the necessary steps toward the starting of a bank in Shady Cove. The two men addressed both a Rotary club dinner and then a public meeting attended by about 60 persons.

Haverson and Gill told of their experiences in starting the South Umpqua State Bank, which has now been in operation eight years and is reported doing well.

Sale of Stock
The men urged sale of stock and representation on the board of directors covering a wide area.

They said a minimum of \$50,000 capital and \$25,000 guarantee fund should be raised before a bank is opened and that it should be raised through the sale of stock to area residents.

In the case of the South Umpqua State bank, the stock was sold at \$100 par value per share and there were 62 stockholders covering a wide area.

Petitions Out For Establishment Of Eagle Point Residents who are interested in having a bank established in Eagle Point may express their voice by signing petitions at two Eagle Point establishments before Friday noon.

The petitions are at Olsen's Gift and Confectionery and Regester's service station. They were placed there by U.S. National Bank officials to determine if there is sufficient demand for a bank in this area.

The petitions allow room for each signer to express a preference on which bank he would like to see come to Eagle Point, however. The petitions will be available for signing until Friday noon.

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Regional Roundup

We were saying several weeks ago that southern Oregon appears to have its share of phenomena. Among other things, it is the home of what appears to be one of the most pronounced oddities in gravity in the world. Throughout the world there are various areas where the pull of gravity "leans" to a certain extent. A man can stand on one of these mystery spots or vortices and feel that he is standing erect, yet to an observer he will appear to be leaning somewhat. Then if he stands so that he appears to be perfectly erect, he feels as if he were leaning.

Such a place is the Oregon Vortex on Sardine creek near Gold Hill. Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Cooper, who bought it in 1960, don't claim that it's the only spot of its kind in the world, but they do feel that the gravitational deviation there is more pronounced than at most other mystery spots. They believe theirs is one of the three most pronounced in the world. They say, for instance, that the Oregon Vortex has 11 Terralines while the Callif, another such place, has only seven.

Yetter has visited the Santa Cruz mystery spot and would be willing to go along with that statement.

The Indians were the first to notice the Gold Hill Vortex. They referred to it as forbidden ground. The first white man to notice it was William McCullough, Cooper says.

He was called upon by John Lister in 1930. According to Cooper, the Oregon Vortex is not the only place in southern Oregon where gravity leans. There are several others, including two in the Siskiyou, he states.

These vortices are electromagnetic fields of force,



spherical in shape, where the gravitational pull leans to one degree or another. In the case of the Oregon Vortex, it leans by about 7 1/2 degrees. In other words, if one wanted to draw a perfectly level horizontal line inside one of these vortices, he would have to draw it at a slant.

A demonstration of the oddities that occur inside such vortices is shown in the picture with this column. As the boy and girl change places, their height appears to change. The girl is almost as tall as the boy in the upper shot, while she is much shorter in the lower shot.
