Redman and Pocahontas Plan District Meeting

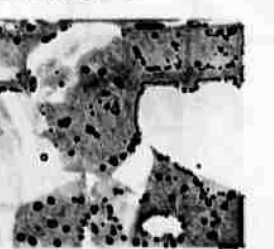

Starting Salaries for Graduates Highest Ever

Minneapolis—UPI—A king-size wallet figures as the most suitable gift for a June college graduate.

A survey of college placement offices shows new egg-heads never had it so good in the starting salary department.

Current offers for bachelors in engineering range from \$565 to \$580 a month. Majors in math and physical sciences command at the same rates.

Accountants are expected to top a medium of \$500 a month. Business administration grads as a group are averaging around \$475, with offers for management and sales trainees, whether from business school or liberal arts, generally ranging from \$450 to \$500.

The 27th annual college placement survey, by Northwestern National Life Insurance Co., showed that final averages for the class of '62 may turn out even better than present figures.

The report shows increases from last year's salary levels average \$20 to \$30 a month, instead of the nominal \$10

This seventh annual workshop in physical education, offered by the department of physical education for women, will be held June 18 to July 6. Work in nine areas will be covered—basic movements and conditioning activities, contemporary dance, fencing, field hockey, folk dance, golf, rebound tumbling and tumbling, tennis, and track and field.

The program is primarily designed for women who are "teaching at the junior and senior high school and college levels. Men, however, are invited to enroll in the dance and fencing areas.

Merce Cunningham, recipient of this year's Dance Magazine award for outstanding achievement as an innovator and performer in the field of contemporary dance, will appear as guest artist and instructor in the workshop from June 18 through 29.

Bonnie Prudden, physical fitness expert, is the founder and president of the Institute for Physical Fitness in New York City. She also is the Fitness editor for Sports Illustrated. She will conduct the basic movement and conditioning activities program during the last week of the workshop July 1 and 6.

Warm Weather Dangerous Time for Playing Children

New York—UPI—A patio seems safe enough at cocktail time. But add playful toddlers in flowing dresses and tresses, let up on safety rules and supervision—and you have the ingredients of tragedy.

Trouble brews when a youngster's hair gets too near the grill. Ditto for the dress. More than one child has gone to eternity on the wings of flame accidentally started at a cocktail.

Dr. Bruce W. Everist, chairman of the Accident Prevention committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics, cited the cocktail catastrophe as one warm weather booby trap endangering children's lives and limbs.

Everist's list of warm weather dangers makes one wonder how children ever manage to grow up unscathed. He's thought of so many things to worry about.

"That's precisely why parents must worry and keep safety on the tips of their minds," the pediatrician said. "A lot of children never get the chance to grow up."

Among them are the cocktail victims—and the youngsters who merrily roll along to death on a bicycle. Others include the playful water babies who drown when they accidentally fall into water over their heads—or fall the wrong way in knee-high water.

The list includes boys and girls who spring into the street after a ball and are plowed down by a car that couldn't stop in time.

Everist said the only course is to make the environment safe for youngsters and to supervise them when the danger is more than they can comprehend.

"Children like fences—real and psychological ones—because fences limit them," the pediatrician said.
