Complaint Filed In Circuit Court

A complaint has been filed in Jackson county circuit court by Dr. John R. Porto, Medford, against The Oregon Bank, seeking money the bank had paid the doctor's former bookkeeper.

According to the complaint, Helen J. Hopkins, was employed as a bookkeeper and medical assistant for Dr. Porto between May, 1960, and Oct. 30, 1961. During that period, it states, that she took a number of checks payable to the doctor to the East Medford branch of the bank and instead of depositing them to the account of her employer, she received cash.

The complaint states that the exact number of checks cashed is not known, but the full amount received from the checks "is believed to be \$5,358."

Dr. Porto charges in the complaint that Helen Hopkins had no authority to cash or endorse such checks and had not authorized the bank to allow her to do anything with the checks other than deposit them. He seeks the full amount of money believed paid to his employee plus 6 per cent interest.

Terrorists Shatter Holiday in Algeria

Algiers, Algeria—UPB—Terrorists in Algiers and Oran today shattered the solemnity of the Roman Catholic Feast of the Ascension with a flurry of attacks that left eight Europeans dead. One Moslem was wounded.

The toll brought the 1962 terrorist casualty total to 5,303 killed and 10,049 wounded.

A new law went into effect today enabling the draft of European youths into the army to prevent them from joining the outlawed Secret Army Organization.

Bus Plunge in India Leaves 69 Persons Dead

Bombay, India—UPB—Sixty-nine persons were killed Wednesday when an overloaded bus plunged 40 feet down a gorge into the Mahor river near Ahmedabad in western India.

Most of the victims, including many women and children, were believed trapped in the bus under water. Eighteen survivors were taken to a hospital.

TAPS CUT TELEVISION

Rochdale, England—UPB—Television sets in the neighborhood of the Dog and Partridge Pub are back to normal now that they discovered that the trouble was caused by beer. Electronic Check Approval Service Developed in LA

Los Angeles—UPB—A 25-year-old business school graduate stands today as one of the foremost fighters against an epidemic that annually costs U.S. businessmen an estimated \$1 billion and possibly more.

Some 70-80,000 persons in Los Angeles county alone are afflicted—either deliberately or negligently.

The ailment, bum check writing, Roland Katz, youthful cofounder and vice-president of Telecredit Inc., while he was an assistant to the dean of students at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Katz parlayed his idea and \$400 with Robert Goldman, a 35-year-old engineer, and International Business Machines to come up with his electronic check approval service—a reality to him and a nightmare to would-be bad check passers.

Today Telecredit Inc. operates out of a new building with \$500,000 worth of computers and electronic equipment, a staff of 28, and 400 clients in southern California.

What appears to be the key to the company's success is that it can virtually wipe out back check losses for merchants within seconds by either validating or rejecting the check passer's credit.

It works on the principle that driver's licenses are the most widely accepted identification for persons paying by check.

The procedure begins at the checkstand or cash register. When the customer presents a check, the clerk then calls Telecredit for clearance.

Within four seconds, Katz said, special memory discs in computers analyze the customer's driver's license and past check record. If negative, a check is made to see if the customer is wanted by the police.

The impact of the electronic check approval system, on which the company has a patent pending, is keenly felt in the food industry, where for each rubber check passed the market must take in 130 times the bad check amount in good business to erase the loss, Katz said. For example, a bad \$100 check requires \$13,000 in sales to make up the loss.

Since November of last year, Katz said, 40 passers have been arrested and six convicted through the computer.

Katz said the company will set up operations in San Diego next, then San Francisco, before moving into Dallas. He said the company is making plans to explore the New York area in the near future.

Katz envisions the day when the system or comparable ones will be used nationwide, once small, medium and large scale businessmen accept the aid of the electronic device.

Five-Year-Old Lad Gets Unusual Advice

Three in Line For President of Oregon College

Salem—UPB—The search for a new president of Oregon College of Education at Monmouth has narrowed to three candidates in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Colorado, an Oregon higher education official said today.

OCE, a state teacher's college with about 1,100 students, has been without a president since last December when its chief, Dr. Roy E. Lieuallen, was elevated to chancellor of the Oregon system of higher education.

For the past six months, OCE has been headed by Ellis Stebbins, who holds the title of administrator.

Lieuallen said the three candidates for OCE president were screened from 100 names.

The three were listed as Dr. Donald Orton, president of Wesley College, Cambridge, Mass.; Dr. Leonard Rice, professor of humanities at Rhode Island College in Providence, and Dr. Kenneth Hanson, education professor at Western Colorado State College at Gunnison.

Lieuallen said Dr. Orton met with the Oregon Board of Higher Education over the week end, and spent two days at OCE. Dr. Rice and Dr. Hanson will be interviewed by the board June 7 and June 9, Lieuallen said.

Methodists Vote To Oppose Gambling

La Grande—UPB—A resolution opposing legalizing of gambling in any form was among those adopted at the Idaho Conference of the Methodist Church here.

About 120 persons from parts of Idaho, Washington and Oregon are attending. The conference was in its second day today.

Another resolution encouraged Methodists to promote viewing of television programs which present good moral entertainment such as educational and cultural subjects. It opposed programs which "degrade the human personality."

Methodists favored universal, enforceable disarmament and urged cessation of nuclear testing by all nuclear powers. They also urged that the government take steps to make all necessary food available to feed refugees from Communist and other areas where starvation is rampant.
