Jay Herbert Takes One Stroke Lead Over Player

Memphis, Tenn. - (UPI) - Dapper Jay Herbert, veteran Lafayette, La., shotmaker, fired his second straight five under par 65 Saturday for a 198 and a one-stroke lead over Gary Player at the three-quarter mark of the 1962 Memphis Open.

The 39-year-old former PGA champion caught Player on the back nine, then streaked past him. Player, the second-round leader, carded a 68 to go with his 65-66.

Herbert's brother, Lionel, supplied the low round of the day with a sizzling 64. His 29 on the par 36 backside followed a one over par 35 on the front nine, to give him third place at 200.

Young Bruce Crampton of Sidney, Australia, who shot the lowest round of the tourney with a 63 Friday, stayed in a three-way tie for fourth place at 201 with national champion Gene Littler and Tommy Jacobs. Julius Boros and first-round leader Gay Brewer Jr. were another two strokes back at 203.

Fort Worth, Tex. - (UPI) - For only the second time in 22 years, the National Open golf tournament galleries will not have a chance to pull for their sentimental favorite, Don Hogan - the "wee wee man" who has won the coveted crown four times.

A painful attack of bursitis has forced the 49-year-old Hogan to notify the U.S. Golf association that he would be unable to compete next Monday in the sectional qualifying rounds at Pittsburgh, Pa.

The only other time the talented Texan has had to forego a chance at the Open crown was in 1949 while he recuperated from a near-fatal auto accident.

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Santa Clara Defeats OSU, To Represent West in NCAA

Santa Clara - (UPI) - Santa Clara, storming from behind with a four-run rally in the seventh inning, defeated Oregon State 7-5, Saturday and earned the right to represent the West Coast in the NCAA baseball tournament.

Trailing 5-3 when they came up in their half of the seventh, the Broncos sent nine men to the plate as they routed left-hander Cecil Ira with a five-hit attack.

Relief pitcher Dan Korbel singled across two runs with

the bases loaded to tie the score. Then John Giovannola cracked a double that brought home Tom Arietta with the winning run. A single by John Boccabella sent across an insurance tally before Jim Falk took over for Ira and got the side out.

The winning pitcher was Korbel, who replaced starter Pete Magrini in the fifth inning. Bob Garibaldi, who fanned 16 Beavers Friday night

as Santa Clara won the first of the best of three game series, 8-1, finished up.

Oregon State, with Brian Bailey crashing a home run and triple, twice took the lead before the Broncos broke loose in the seventh.

Santa Clara, Calif. - (UPI) - The hard-hitting Santa Clara Broncos proved they were plenty tough Friday night.

Just ask the Oregon State Beavers.

The Broncos, behind the 4-hit pitching of Bob Garibaldi, walloped the Beavers 8-1 in the first game of a best-of-three series for the NCAA district 8 championship.

The Broncos collected 11 hits off three pitchers, including the Beavers' star junior left-hander Cecil Ira.

Shortstop Ernie Fazio led the way for Santa Clara with a 410-foot solo home run in the seventh inning, a run-scoring triple in the third and a single in the fifth.

Tim Cullen hit a two-run homer in the fifth for the Broncos.

Oregon State scored its only run in the seventh inning and it was unearned. Dave Long, who had doubled, came in from second base on an error of a fly ball hit by John Thomas.

Garibaldi registered his

eighth victory in nine decisions for the season. The win upped Santa Clara's record to 34-6.

Ira, who was removed after four innings after allowing three runs, took his second loss in 13 decisions. The Beavers suffered their fifth loss in 31 games.

2 Fans Die at LA-Yanks Game

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Two baseball fans died Friday night of apparent heart attacks suffered during a game at Dodger Stadium in which the New York Yankees defeated the Los Angeles Angels, 6-2.

The coroner's office said Byron Rector, a 65-year-old mechanic from Portland, Ore., toppled from his seat shortly after the game got underway.

The second victim, Lewis Farwell, 63, of Brea, Calif., also was stricken at the stadium and died at the ballpark dispensary shortly before midnight.

Both men suffered apparent heart attacks, the coroner said.

SOC's Mike Hanby Ties For Third in NAIA Pole Vault

Sioux Falls, S. D. - Mike Hanby of Southern Oregon college tied for third in the pole vault Saturday night and was the lone southern Oregonian to place in the 11th annual NAIA Track and Field finals here.

Hanby registered a mark of 13 feet, 7 1/2 inches in the event, which was won by Kentaker of Ft. Hayes State, Kansas, with 14 feet, 1 inch.

Dan Bulkeley, SOC track coach, reported by phone after the meet that cold, windy weather caused many of those in the meet to register below par performances.

Two other SOC representatives placed just out of the running in their respective events, Bulkeley said. Spike Gordon was seventh in the pole vault at 13 feet, 1 1/2 inches, and Fred Thomas was seventh in the hop, step and jump at 44 feet.

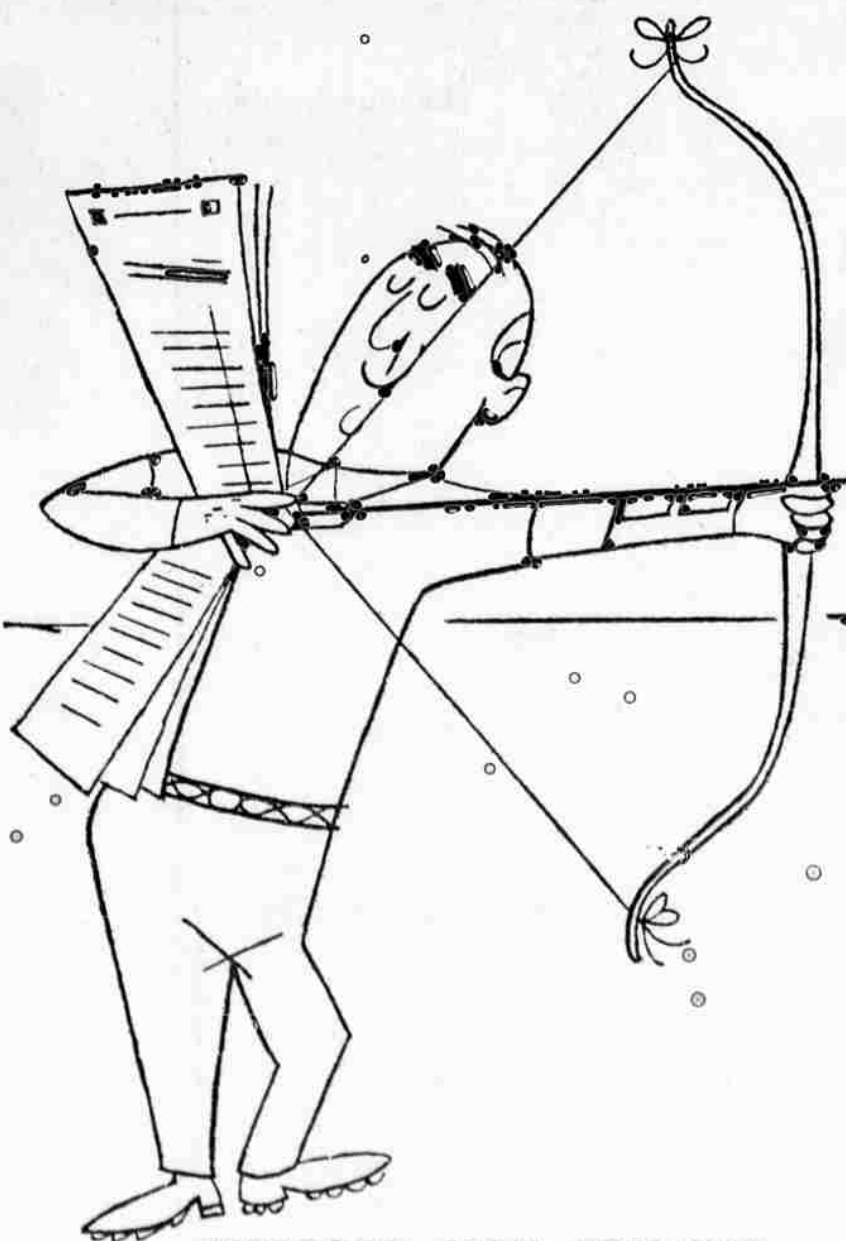
